# Woolley Not Guilty of Murdering Wife, Jury's Verdict

# **VERDICT GIVEN AFTER 8 HOURS IN JURY ROOM**

Woolley Immediately Returns to Home At Lampkin

DALLAS, Dec. 13. (U.P.)-A verdict of not guilty was returned today in the Woolley trial. The jury de-liberated for eight hours after it had received the case at 1:30 o'cloc's this morning.

The court room was jammed un-til a late hour. Woolley was en route this morning to his home at Lampkin.

# WITNESS SAYS HE HATES WOOLLEY

DALLAS, Dec. 13.—Bitter denun-ciation of Toy G. Woolley, by his brother-in-law, Ralph Joynes, marked a dramatic finale last night to testimony in the trial of Wool-ley on murder charges for the shot-gun killing of his bride of three months, Dorothy Marie Joynes Woolley, last November 5. Joynes, the 113th and last wit-ness, brought testimony to a close when he turned to the jury and said, his voice shaking with emo-tion:

"Gentlemen, I am fully convince. Toy Woolley deliberately murdered my sister and I want you to know that I hate him with all my heart." Made a Statement With the the defense left it to tion

Plans were being made early this afternoon for extinguishing the well with mud and steam, and no help from the outside was planned, inasmuch as little gas volume was escaping through the master gate, which is tightly clamped around the line.
E. Winn, a workman, narrowiy escaped injury when the well ignited. He was on the derrick floor, but the well caught 30 feet above him and he managed to escape without injury.
Standard equipment was being used at the time, but rotary equipment, which had been used during earlier stage of drilling, was on the derrick floor and was destroyed. It was pointed out that it is possible to snuff out the fire quickly by cutting the line and completely closing the gate, but drillers wish to prevent a fishing job.
