ATHENS, Dec. 15. (U.R)-Samuel Insull, 74, former American utilities magnate, was ordered today to leave Greece by January 31.

Insull was asked to leave as soon as possible and was told that he would not be permitted to remain after expiration of his residence permit December 31, but later was granted a month's grace upon re-

Place in baking pan with 1/4 cup hot water and bake 15 minutes.
