The last heard from Livermore was when he phoned his wife at that time. She understood he had had intimation that he was marked by criminals. Police phoned when he failed to return home late

yesterday.

Information from his wife to police was not revealed, however it caused police to accept kidnaping as explanation for his disappearance. Contrary to reports that Livermore was making money in the market, he was near the bottom of his purse it was revealed.

His sons were under guard in connection with a kidnaping threat in which \$25,000 was demanded. The

same year, a fortune in jewels was stolen from Livermore.

James Walsh, escaped convict, was arrested in California last September and confessed details of a plot to kidnap Livermore and Edward L.

Doheny, oil magnate. Livermore was known as the "boy plunger," and wizard of wall street. He had been bankrupted several times and had regained millions.

MONTEVIDEO, Dec. 20 .- A temporary peace was proclaimed in the bloodstained Chaco Boreal Tuesday as Paraguay and Bolivia, hereditary enemies, agreed to a Christmas season armistice.

The fighting, which has claimed tens of thousands of lives in the last 29 months, will cease at midnight tonight for a truce which will last to midnight of Dec. 31. Members of the peace commission of the seventh Pan-American conference, in session here, said they hoped the peace could be made permanent.

## AN OLD DOGMA PASSES

It is interesting to notice that the old legal technicality by which a wife was not allowed to testify in defense of her husband in a criminal case at last has been swept aside by the U.S. Supreme Court.

The decision came on the appeal of a North Carolinian who had been convicted of conspiracy to violate the dry laws. At his trial his wife was not allowed to testify for

This ruling was in accord with the ancient common law provision that a wife, in such case, would be an interested witness and hence not deserving of credence.

Very properly the Supreme Court sweeps this aside. The test of cross-examination of witnesses, the increased intelligence of jurors, and other considerations, says the court, have changed things.

Hereafter a man accused of crime may call his wife as a witness—and an archaic and illogical quirk of criminal law has been abolished.

One. Failure to protect Chinas sovereignty against Japanese aggression;
Two. Failure to lead the world to Two. Failure to lead the world to the major successful military adventure in Manchuria immediate.


