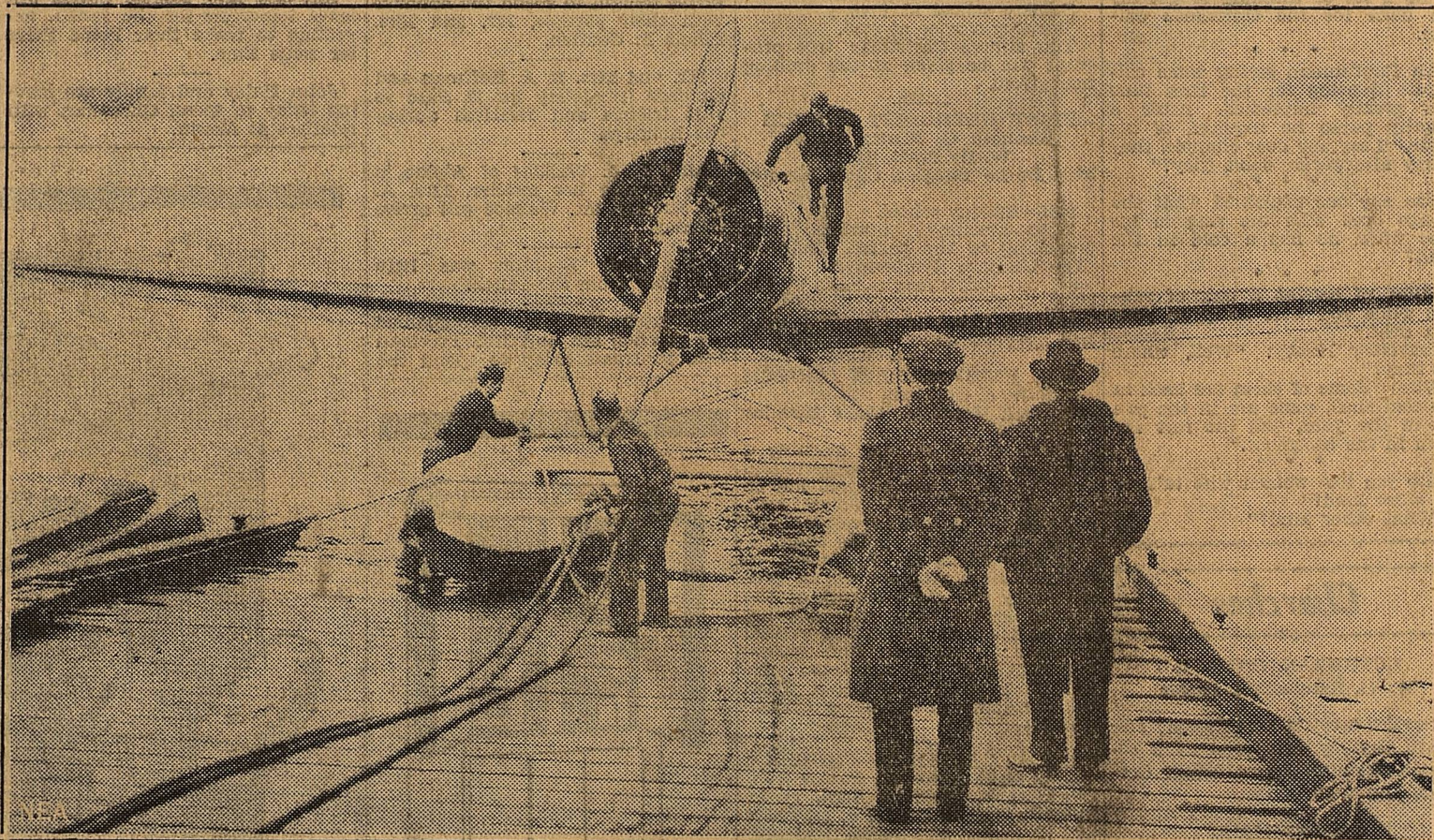

HOUSTON, Dec. 22. (AP)—Jackie Westrope, leading American jockey, announced today he would leave Saturday for Hialeah park, Miami, after he was suspended here for five days for rough riding.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22. (AP)—New York and Oklahoma were the only states today with unfilled civil works employment quotas, Administrator Hopkins announced.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22. (AP)—Oil Administrator Ickes announced today the organization of an impartial oil labor board and explained that the change was prompted by "ability of certain representatives of organized labor to participate in the board's activities."

Included were William Leiserson of Yellow Springs, O., chairman; James Mullenbach of Chicago and George Stocking of Austin.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22. (AP)—The house ways and means committee formally voted a liquor tax bill carrying a levy of 22 per gallon today. It was estimated that the tax would yield approximately \$220,000,000 in the treasury annually.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22. (AP)—Administrator Johnson said that he expected to send the construction, graphic arts and newspaper codes to the president today. He said a practical agreement on the codes had been reached and what he hoped to put them through today.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22. (AP)—The rubber tire industry code was approved by President Roosevelt today.

AUSTIN, Dec. 22. (AP)—Subscription to Texas' first issue of relief bonds had grown today to \$1,500,000, with various state agencies carrying on a campaign to get buyers for the remaining \$1,250,000.

Official said federal funds for relief hardly would last through December 25. Why the bonds had failed to attract buyers was a puzzle, they said.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22. (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Wallace laid before farm organization leaders today a proposal for a fund of \$200,000,000 to finance production adjustment programs for the dairy and beef cattle industries.

HAVANA, Dec. 22. (AP)—Cuba's tumultuous political situation neared a crisis today with accompanying Communist propaganda. Three members of the cabinet announced resignations.

CHICAGO, Dec. 22. (AP)—Search for John Dillinger, outlaw, continued to be intensified today as result of the slaying of three gunmen identified as members of his gang.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22. (AP)—The dispute over congressional currency inflation appeared to have been postponed today and perhaps avoided by an order of President Roosevelt, or limited coinage of domestic silver.

Before this was done the sentiment for inflation was spreading at a rate alarming to the administration.

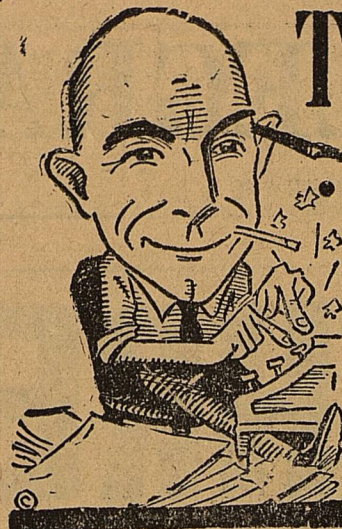

Midland county's quota of 64 head of cutter cows was shipped to San Angelo, Monday and Tuesday of this week. They represented a good class of cattle and gave us a chance to dispose of some non-productive livestock. There is a possibility that we will get another quota some time in the near future, which will be an outlet for some more of these cattle. The plant at San Angelo which is employing about 150 people, is putting this meat into cans in the form of roast, stew, and chili for the use of the relief forces this winter. From the present promise of success, it is likely that this program will be extended and will be of marked benefit to the livestock men of West Texas.

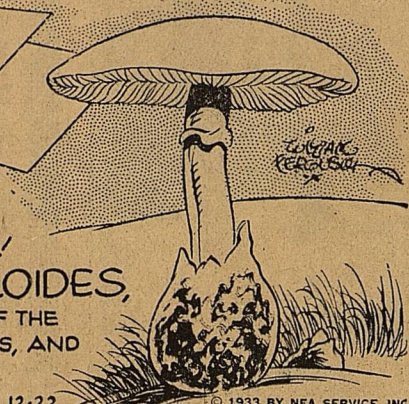

"SKIN" ROAD TO AID ARMY

Oklahoma City Favored As Next Convention City

LONDON. (U.P.)—A "skin" road is the latest device to be adopted by the British army to aid operations in hostile territory.

This new method of mechanized high-speed roadmaking is characterized as the greatest military advance since the war. With its aid roads can be constructed on any sort of ground at the rate of eight miles a day.

A bituminous emulsion forms a hard skin over the surface of the ground that will make a roadway strong enough to bear an almost unlimited number of motor trucks. And it can be laid rapidly.

In laying the ordinary road for hard usage, it is necessary to provide a foundation of large stones upon which is placed a surface of light metal. By the new method the process is made infinitely more simple.

First of all the surface is scarified. A track is levelled off by means of a grader, and the bituminous emulsion is then mixed with the earth on the surface, forming the "skin." Requirements of labor, transport and water are minimized by this new method which assures the maintenance of communications between any punitive force and its base, and does away with the necessity for railways and other costly and difficult means of transportation.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla. (U.P.) Oklahoma City ranks next to New York and Chicago in number of conventions scheduled for 1934, according to the December issue of World Convention Dates.

This official publication shows 181 conventions scheduled for Oklahoma City, making it third in the nation. Denver was fourth with 102.

LONDON. (U.P.)—A famous painter did the portraits of two sisters 60 years ago. He labelled the results "Yes" and "No." The painter was Millais.

One sister portrayed by the eminent artist was the wife of that Lord Stanley who made famous the expression "Dr. Livingstone, I presume?" when he came upon the explorer in the interior of Africa. She was the subject of the picture entitled "No."

Before and since the death of Lady Stanley, her sister, has been trying to bring the portrait into the family. It took Mrs. Myers, the subject of Millais' "Yes," 60 years to achieve her purpose.

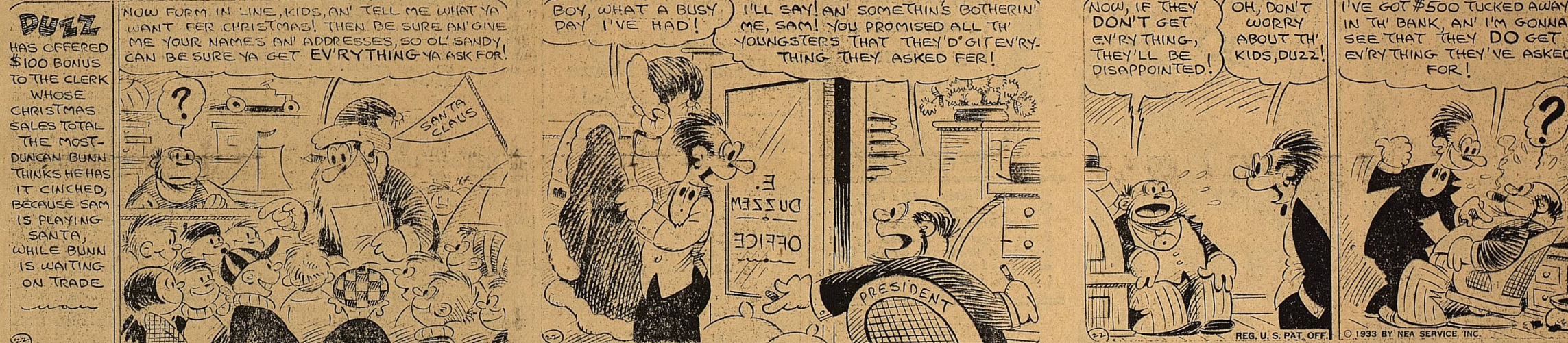

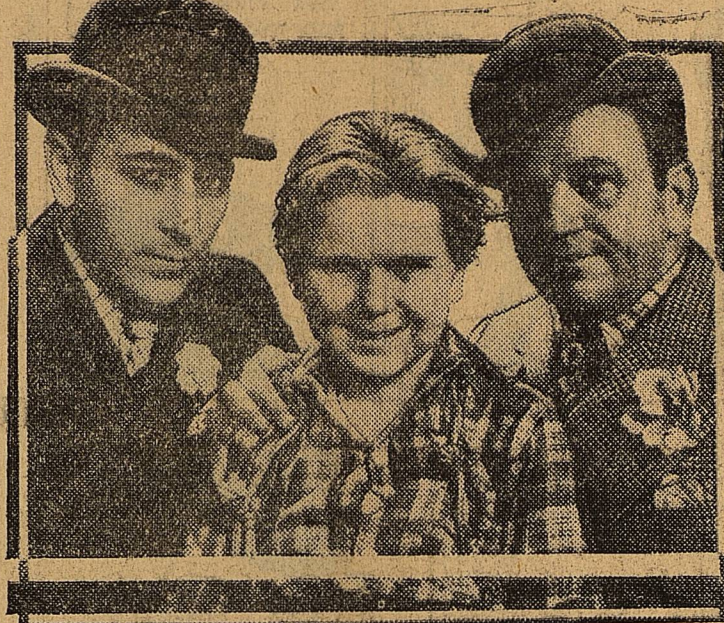

Under the Dome Of the Capital

AUSTIN (U.P.)—Ed Glenn, Republican, Bosque county legislator, boasted that he made the race for governor last time at the cost of 85 cents postage and a hound dog, will run again next summer.

"A winner never quits and a quitter never wins," he said.

As qualifications for office, he cites that he is "honest and Irish; intelligent enough to be honest and Irish enough to fight for what is right."

"I'll 'lone wolf' it, and wear no man's brass collar," he writes. His platform still is unfinished. This much of it he lets out: "I favor an amended constitution to provide that one half the state legislature and one half the representatives in Congress shall be women."

Women, he says, must be drafted to take a hand in political affairs. To put theory into practice, he confides, he now is seeking contact with an able woman lawyer to run for Attorney General. He also is seeking women candidates for at least two other state offices.

He is cheerful about making a showing in the race without his hound dog, which died during the last campaign. He received 2,039 votes in his first primary, finishing last in the race.

Preservation but not restoration of the numerous Spanish missions in Texas is one of many projects proposed by Gutizon Borglum, noted sculptor, who heads a state beautification board. His plans call for Spanish plantings about the missions' grounds. He also is making plans for beautification of spots connected with the history of the Texas War for Independence. These plans are in part preparatory to the proposed Texas centennial of 1935.

State relief headquarters this week received the resignation of one of its \$65-a-month employees. He sent the following message:

"I hereby tender my resignation as county relief administrator."

A few departments will have Christmas trees and exchanges of gifts. No elaborate ones are planned this year. Recent revelations before state investigating committees have put a damper on the elaborate Christmas donations that some department employees have made in the past year will be modest.

Housewives who like to festoon the home with leaves, holly and what not face a new prohibitive law for the first time this Christmas. The "wildflower bill" of the last regular session of the legislature includes the holiday plants within its protecting phrases.

The act forbids taking plant life from any enclosed land or from any state park or preserve. The protected plants include holly, yonpore, redbud, all evergreen trees and mosses.

Mistletoe is not named. Whether it can be considered included in a reference generally to "decorative shrubbery" is doubtful. Gardeners say it is a parasite.

Violators may be fined \$1 to \$16. Like most laws it has a loophole. Children under 17 may pluck at will.

Approximately 65 per cent of all persons on state payrolls are related to some other person also on state pay. Chairman Ben Cathey of the legislative committee studying nepotism makes the estimate. Tabulations for all departments have not been completed. Some run as high as 80 per cent, Cathey said.

State law prohibits nepotism only within certain degrees of relationship. Several appropriation bills specify that only one member of a family shall be paid from that appropriation.

Unpaid taxes in 72 counties of the state amount to more than the tax payments in those counties. C. A. Jay, Dallas, has discovered in a study of the tax delinquency.

To the tax-payers, Jay says: "If your county collected \$500,000 in taxes and had \$500,000 delinquent, you payers of the \$500,000 paid twice as much tax as you would have to pay if your tax officials were able to make all pay." Jay says tax dodgers pay their federal taxes and with proper urging also can be made to pay the state and local taxes. To back up his contention he has issued a list of the tax payments and tax delinquencies in every county for the past fiscal year.

Novel CWA employment has been found at the state library for a small group. They are repairing the old newspaper files which have been torn by much handling.

Early opening of the state political campaign is being reflected in county and district. The San Marcos News already has its candidates' announcement column running with several local entries. A flat rate is charged city and precinct candidates; a little more for county candidates, and more prospective congressmen. A fee write up goes with every announcement.

England's War of the Roses may pale into insignificance beside the war that is brewing in Texas over panning the highways. The Texas Civil Works administration named Gutizon Borglum Stone (mountain sculptor) to head a committee for the purpose. The state highway department promptly pointed out that it already had employed Jac (cq) Gubbles, noted landscaper for the same purpose. Without mentioning any names Borglum and his committee were given notice to keep their noses off the state highways. The highway commission has control of the highways. The CWA has control of the beautification finances.
