One blow had sufficed for each antagonist; and he pointed out that the bodies of his victims would be found "right under an ellum tree." And the little girl substantiated his statement, remark-

ing that he had been a considerate defender and had done all of his killing behind a tree, where she would not One is moved to hope that when these youngsters were

delivered to their parents they didn't get paddled for telling tall tales.

Adults very seldom really understand the motives that prompt children to spin such yarns as these. They give the children credit—or discredit, rather—for being un-It may sound wrong in principle, but after all there's not much use in suing anybody right now. truthful, deceitful and boastful, whereas the truth of the matter is that a child who tells such a story is seldom in the least conscious that he is relating anything but an accurate description of actual facts.

The dream world into which imagination can conduct one can be, to children, quite as real as the regular world of every day. The borderland between the two worlds is not plainly marked. It is possible to slip from one to the other almost without knowing it; and it is because grownups seldom understand this that some children get chided for fibbing.

This child, who slew a man with a black beard and three carnivorous felines beneath a tree in a Brooklyn park, is a little lad to be envied. The shadows of the prison house haven't yet lengthened about him.

SISTERS UNDER THE SMOKE

When Gov. Herbert Lehman of New York revealed recently that he had quit smoking, he made a little explanation which reveals that governors, after all, are very much like lesser folk.

"My wife got after me," he said. "In fact, Mrs. Lehman quit smoking for me. And I must admit she was right. I do feel a lot better."

It is one of the inalienable rights of all women to feel that their husbands are smoking too much. As the late Bert Leston Taylor once remarked, even if a man was cut down to one cigar a week by his doctor's orders, his wife would be sure to say, after a while, "It seems to me you're smoking more than you used to"; and this, after all, is much as it should be. A world in which wives never worried for fear that their husbands were smoking themselves to death would be a flat and unexciting place indeed.

THE SIX-YEAR PRESIDENCY

Senator Pittman suggests that the next bit of governmental reform, following on the lame duck amendment, might well be a new amendment limiting presidents to one term of six years each; and it is quite possible that a lot of his fellow-countrymen will agree with him.

"A president serving his first term," says the senator, "no sooner gets his policies into operation than he is faced with the need of beginning to plan a campaign for re-election, in order to gain another four-year term in which to carry them to completion.'

As a result, he points out, the first term is very often only a period of preparation during which little of a permanent nature can be done.

This is a point worth extended consideration. The president would be relieved of a great strain and he would be at least partly removed from the field of partisan politics. The change might be extremely desirable.
