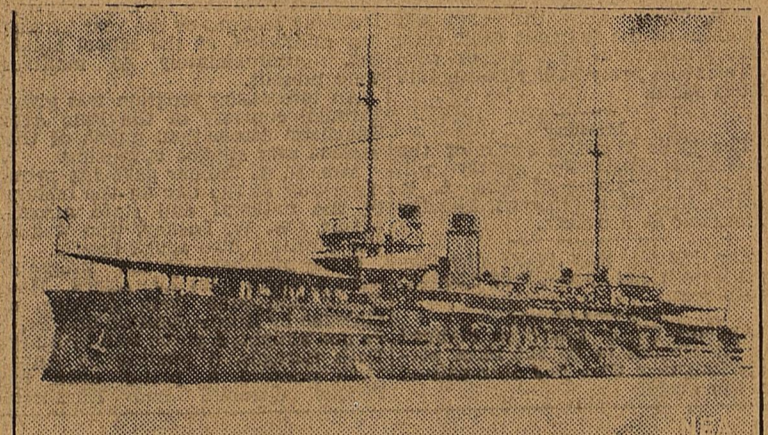

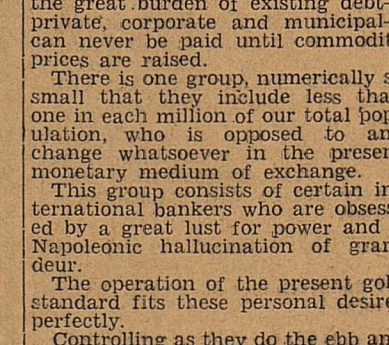

DESPERATION KNOWS NO LAW

An Illinois constable descended on a farm the other day to seize machinery and livestock mortgaged for \$2750. As you probably don't need to be told, he didn't get far. Farmers swarmed to the scene, bought the whole outfit for \$4.90, and sent the constable on his way in a hurry.

EUROPE DRIVES TO ATTAIN TO NEW MARKETS

WASHINGTON, (UP).—While the American public and many politicians speculate on the feasibility of "a self-sustaining national economy" predicated upon a minimum of imports, commercial powers of the world are making a relentless drive for export markets now or recently held by the United States.

The disparity of commodity price levels in different countries—caused by currency depreciation in those countries while the United States remains on the gold standard—has given to non-American traders a favorable opportunity to "muscle in" former Yankee commercial precincts.

Japan is driving for the cotton textile trade of the Orient. The British imperial preferential pacts have pre-empted a large share of the world market, so far as American traders are concerned. France can trade as a member of colonial

Psychology Aid To Dentistry

CLEVELAND, (UP).—Psychology has made the business of having teeth pulled more of a lark for Cleveland school children than a painful ordeal.

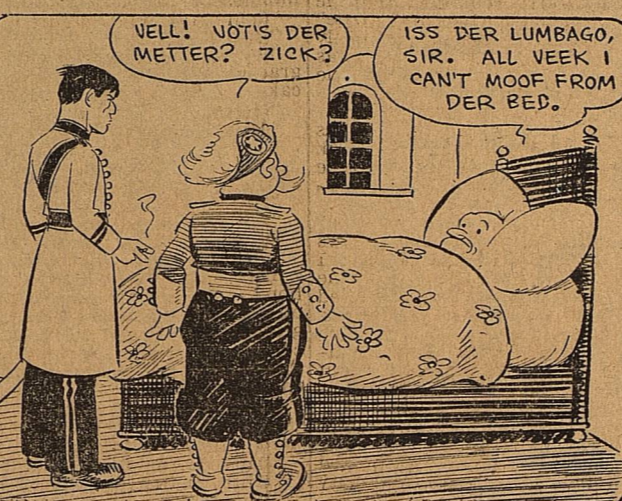
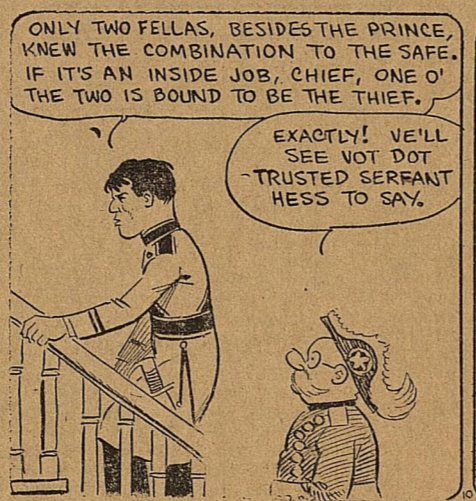
Annually, approximately 20,000 children have teeth pulled in the school dental clinics. They are taken to the dispensaries in fairly large groups. At the hospitals, they are taken into a smaller room in groups of about a dozen.

Here a nurse asks them to practice smelling imaginary roses. After she has got them into the habit of taking deep breaths, she asks a volunteer to sit in a dental chair. He is equipped with all the paraphernalia, including a gas inhalator. The child is asked to take a deep breath through it. He does and smiles and says it smells like orange. It does. The nurse has sprayed a little orange perfume in the inhalator after sterilizing it with alcohol.

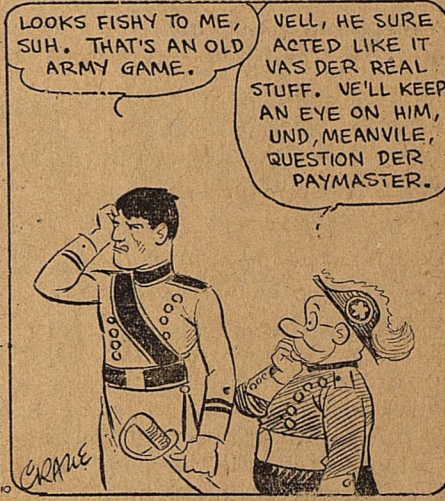
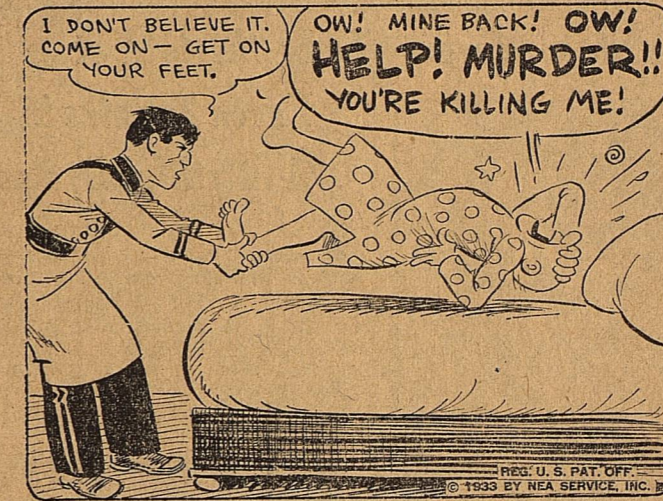
One by one, the children then go to the extraction room, each expected to smell the odor of roses when the gas inhalator is put on them.

The first of the new Ford V-8 cylinder, 112-inch wheelbase motor cars will be displayed here tomorrow in the showrooms of Cowden-Epley Motor Company, local Ford dealers. It was announced today, a coach model will be on the floor. The new V-8 is the largest and most powerful Ford ever built. It has new and distinctively modern lines, a most attractive front end, longer wheelbase, larger and roomier bodies, faster acceleration, increased power and speed and is exceptionally economical in operation. With its 75-horsepower, V-8 engine, the new Ford is capable of a sustained speed of 80 miles an hour. The styling of the 14 body types expresses the new mode in motor car building. The modern nose is found in the sloping Vee radiator grill, the skirted fenders, newly-designed headlights, cowl lamps and bumpers, the curved hoodside ventilators, the 20-degree slant of the windshield, the curved roof header, the reverse curve of the rear quarter and the backward sweep of the apron masking the gasoline tank. The new all-steel bodies are materially wider, almost a foot longer and consequently much roomier. The attractive instrument panel is directly in front of the driver, with a large package compartment at the right side of the instrument board. Front seats in closed cars are fully adjustable. Interior fittings are luxurious. Options in upholstery and a wide choice of body colors are available. The improved V-8 engine is fitted with all-aluminum cylinder heads, one of the most noteworthy forward steps in motor design in many years. Because aluminum dissipates heat more rapidly, the use of the aluminum cylinder heads permits higher compression pressure and results in increased speed, power and smoothness, faster acceleration and added fuel economy. Smooth engine performance results from the basic 8-cylinder design and the 3-point rubber mounting. Crankshaft rods are set at a 90-degree angle. The crankshaft is fully counterbalanced and the crank throws are at 90 degrees. Opposing pistons and connecting rods are even in weight. All of these features combine to place all moving parts in natural balance, resulting in exceptional smoothness of operation. This maintains permanent alignment of the pinion with the ring gear under all driving conditions and results in extremely quiet axle operation. The frame is cushioned by four Houdaille double-acting hydraulic shock absorbers which are both automatically and thermostatically adjusted for every variation of weather or road surface conditions. The shock absorber links are insulated in rubber. The rear fuel tank has a capacity of 14 gallons. The transmission is of the syn-

like adjoining building occupied at a good rental. Ad valorem as practiced is often, and in its essence always, a capital levy. No just and equitable balance can ever be struck between it and production and income levies. It is totally vicious and disturbing. The national income, we are told, has been as high as \$90,000,000,000. Our annual expenditures, local, state and national, total around \$15,000,000,000. I submit that we have no right to attack property with a capital levy until we have first exhausted our income (unless, perhaps we levy on all capital of every form equally). We are doing this very thing. But the evil of this condition does not stop with the individual victim. That might be endured. It poisons all business. It is shot through our whole economy. The would-be lender is deterred from placing further loans on real estate and is calling such as he has. No real estate is being bought except at ruinous prices, partly from low prices for commodities of course (more on that later), but largely from fear of constantly recurring capital levies by unknown and multitudinous tax boards. And we have the anomaly of money going begging at 1 per cent, and the people crying for money at any rate you might name. Let us look at the picture with ad valorem taxes totally removed and outlawed. Farmers' tax would naturally be levied on a production basis. Other elements of society on the basis of income, gross receipts, sales, severances and such, all which are of the same nature and are capable of comparison and balance, and none need be confiscatory. But as to the farmer with his production tax: 1. The surpluses would automatically disappear, for he would not produce against such a tax except when it is profitable to do so, the penalty for his defaulting (ad valorem confiscation) being removed. 2. Marginal and submarginal lands would be dropped from cultivation, and the development of new agricultural areas retarded, both of which would contribute inestimably to the conservation of our soil. 3. With surpluses so greatly lessened or removed, prices would lit to a profitable basis. Production would not exceed demand for long. 4. Seeing security in real estate, with no threat of capital levies, money would flow freely into real estate investments and loans, liquidating many farm mortgages, and making easy the refinancing of most of those remaining and at a low rate of interest, for money loves safety. 5. With available financial aid a great horde of unemployed would seek a haven in the suburban and rural districts. Half the idle should be so allocated, much to their own and the country's good. This by free choice, however, and not any degree of duress, that they may be content in their new-found freedom and security. Would they not contribute to surpluses and break down prices again? No. A self-sustaining farm family is a much better cus-

tomor for other farmers than the same family in the city under present conditions.

6. The influx of new capital and people to the countryside would create a great demand for all kinds of goods for use and improvements in the transition. Aside from supplies for the newcomers, there is now a potential demand for building materials and labor. I would say, far in excess of the total we have expended on buildings and betterments in cities and towns since the World War. Once we get this potential demand released, what won't and business for us all, and what great advance in our average standard of living. You say this is a State and local affair, as there is no Federal ad valorem. True. But it will require national guidance and concerted action to lead us out of this morass and restore real estate loan and sale values. Many plans are being put forward for financing farm loans. In such financing (and the financing of urban homes also) a difference could and should be made in interest rate in favor of such States as abandon the ad valorem policy. That is reasonable and fair for their securities nurture no insidious superior lien by way of ad valorem tax assessments, and so would be preferred and sell at a lower interest rate. Most of the States would fall in line. Many are now seeking a remedy by compromise, merely shifting part to other forms of tax, but holding on to the ad valorem tax policy. Vain and foolish. Half measures will not do. Potential lenders and buyers will not fall for that. If you were afflicted with a cancer you would not thank your doctor to remove a part and leave the rest to grow back as malignant as ever. The policy needs supplanting, not the amount lowered. Would not a shift from ad valorem to a tax on production or gross sales from the farm encourage monopoly, speculation and absenteeism in our land policy? Yes and no. Unrestrained it might in cases. Generally the owners of large bodies of land are glad to colonize when the demand or more intensive use of the land arises. Should monopoly threaten, we have a ready remedy in the right of eminent domain inherent in sovereignty. A difference has already been established from the standpoint of society or the State, between the homestead and land held exclusively for profit. Furthermore, society would be entitled to a tax, and a heavy one, on the unearned increment of land at the time of sale. This is the one sound tenet of the Henry George single-tax theory. You have it in the main, and as brief as I can make it. Let us dispel this revolution which threatens to encompass us, by the means

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Hogan-- (Continued from page 1) tends in a large measure over many newspapers, magazines and to some extent to radio programs, so they exercise a power in the creation of public opinion probably more detrimental to the welfare of this nation than all their other activities combined. To exercise wisely such Jehovah-like power would require superhuman wisdom but for three long years these men have been giving us a continuing demonstration of their own incompetency. Therefore, the advice which they are so free to give you members of this congress should be disregarded. Having agreed that an increase in the money medium of exchange is desirable the question then arises as to which of the several proposed methods of increase will be most beneficial to the great mass of our people, least injurious to the holders of mortgages and other evidences of indebtedness, and also which will least disturb existing financial institutions and insurance institutions. As I read the several proposed bills and hear the suggested plans they roughly fall into the following classifications: 1. Modify the banking and currency laws and the federal reserve bank law so as to permit a larger and more flexible issue of currency by or under the direction of the federal reserve bank. The present gold standard to be retained but the currency issue against gold dollars and gold bullion to be increased or decreased, within certain limits, through a system based in part on banking, business and commercial credits. 2. Retain the single gold standard but reduce the weight of gold in the gold dollar by fifty per cent, or some other agreed percentage. 3. Authorize the government to purchase a limited amount of silver produced in the United States. Pay for said silver with silver certificates. Make such certificates acceptable as part of the lawful reserve of banks and the federal reserve bank. Several suggested methods are modifications of this general idea. 4. Bimetallism. The free and unlimited coinage by the United States of both gold and silver at the ratio of one ounce of gold to 16 ounces of silver and making money so coined, whether of gold or silver, full legal tender for all debts, public and private, including interest on the

verbosity and complexities we find at the center of it all our ancient national debt, duties and imports. Let us attempt to analyze these several proposals, taking them up in the order of their enumeration above. If I have not stated the first proposed plan with sufficient clarity the fault is not mine but that of its proponents. Careful reading and study of everything said and written in its behalf will lose the student in a labyrinth of banking and financial intricacies. It is comparable to the nebulous theory of the creation of the universe, which we labored with in school in our youth only to find it abandoned as fallacious in our old age.
