NOT ABLE TO ATTEND RITES OF BROTHER

General's Condition Not Disturbing, Says Bulletin

General John J. Pershing was confined to his room in the Scharbauer today with an attack of bronchitis and laryngitis, which prevented his leaving Midland with his sister, Miss Mary Pershing, last night upon notification his brother, James F. Pershing, had died in a New York hospital from a heart ailment. The brother's death had been expected

A bulletin issued shortly after noon today said General Pershing's condition was not disturbing and that he was not abed, but that his condition warranted his remaining in his room. He was attended by Dr. W. E. Ryan, a captain in the reserve corps.

General Pershing said he had been with his brother for an entire month before leaving for Arizona, where he expects to undergo treatment, and that he had left his brother about three weeks ago. His soldierly bearing remained, though

He was the younger son of Mr. and Mrs. John Fletcher and Ann Elizabeth (Thompson) Pershing. He was a great-grandson of Frederick Pfersohin, who emigrated from Alsace, France, in 1749, and settled in Pennsylvania, where the name was anglicized to Pershiperson was presented in Pershiperson. the name was anglicized to Persh

Upon attaining manhood, Persh Upon attaining manhood, Pershing's father moved from Pennsylvania to Missouri, where he worked as a railroad section foreman, married, and later conducted a store and the post-office at Laclede. Pershing attended the district grammar and high schools at Laclede, and upon graduation from the latter secured employment with a Missouri construction concern.

He succeeded rapidly in the construction field and when a young man in his early 20's went to Texas, where he supervised the local end of construction of the Texas and Pacific railroad.



EDITOR'S NOTE: The following letter written by Frank Elkin of Midland was published under the head of "Evils of Ad Valorem Tax" in this morning's Dallas News. It is republished through request and because of the unusual clarity of expression employed by the writer.

Doubtless the editorial, "Consensus of Confusion" in The News, Feb. 5, will inspire many letters from sources near the soil. I have been reading your editorials and letters diligently, hoping some scribe would champion an undiluted and perfected controllies. gently, hoping some scribe would champion an undiluted and perfected capitalism. Instead, most of all suggestions have a bias toward Socialism, or at least seem so to me. America is not ready for socialistic regulation. Not yet. We have been busying ourselves with our most obvious and pressing troubles, trying palliatives and haifmeasures; and have not really reached the main source of these troubles, our ad valorem tax system per se.

To begin with, this system of value tax is incompatible with our other taxes. It is a growth and development from the feudal system of land tenure. In its original form it served well, as it was levied on large baronial estates with fairly constant income and in ratio to such income. Whereas, now, if you will look over any ad valorem list, you will find that fully half the items are small and a great majority of these parcels produce no revenue or very small revenue to the owner. We have lost sight of income and now make these levies from a hypothetical sale value of the property; or we are guided more often by the needs of society

levies from a hypothetical sale value of the property; or we are guided more often by the needs of society for tax, with little regard for either income or sale value.

In direct antithesis, you will find the tax policy of the ancient Egyptians, Babylonians and Hebrews rested directly upon a part of the production of the soil, including live stock as well as crops. This varied roughly from 10 to 20 per cent. But the amount is beside the point. From such origins sprang our idea of such levies as income, gross receipts, sales production and severance tax on natural resources.
