Back to Grant The term apparently was first us-ed in politics by delegates support-ing Grant for a third term at the Republican convention of 1880. They borrowed the "dies but never sur-renders" slogan from the famous reply of Cambronne, commander of Bonaparte's Old Guard at Waterloo, to the British troops when they de manded surrender. Napoleon's Old Guard was cut to pieces—and so was Grant's. The Old Guard dominated, or nearly dominated, Republican con-ventions from that time on. The steam-rolling of Roosevelt in 1912 and the "smoke-filled room" nomi-nation of "Harding in 1920. A new defense line is being established at Chao-yang along the hills overlooking valley through which the invaders must pass.
