



This is the first known instance since the World war of any civilian seeking to buy a gas mask here, although since the Armistice nervous peasants in frontier towns and villages have been known to spend their savings on protection against gas attacks.

The Paris purchaser was an aged woman, who went to one of the large department stores near the Opera and asked a clerk where she could find a gas mask. She was considerably surprised when the clerk directed her immediately to the department exhibiting gas appliances. The model, copied after the military type, cost about \$9. She hurried home, the mask under her arm.

Directors of the store revealed that in recent weeks they had received numerous requests for masks. To supply the demand they asked the army gas division to provide them with them, but the request was refused, as the military models are designed solely for army use.
