NEW YORK, March 24. (UP).—The federal grand jury today indicted Charles E. Mitchell, former chairman of the City National bank, on charges of evading payment of \$573,000 income tax in 1929.

Election and installation of grand officers will mark the conclusion of the conclave at 9 a. m. April 27. Several affairs will be given to honor or visiting ladies, including a musicale and reception, an informal luncheon and a morning coffee.

Midland Girl Gets Volume Published

Midland has a new author. She is Miss Kathleen Eiland, author of "School Day Programs," a book published by the Fitzgerald Publishing Co. of New York.

Taxation of university lands in 17 counties in West Texas in which the land lies is being vigorously sought by an organization of school superintendents and school boards.

B. P. Haag, state representative from Midland, and T. P. Metcalf, representative from San Angelo have introduced House Joint Resolution No. 30 proposing a constitutional amendment to permit school districts containing university lands to levy a tax on these lands.

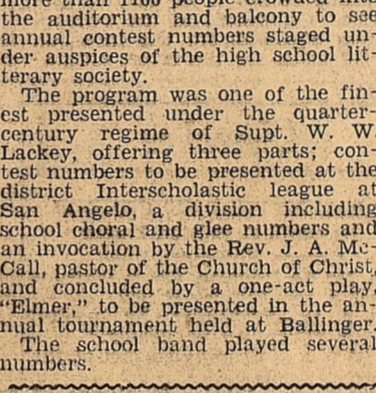
FAMILIES TRANSFERRED

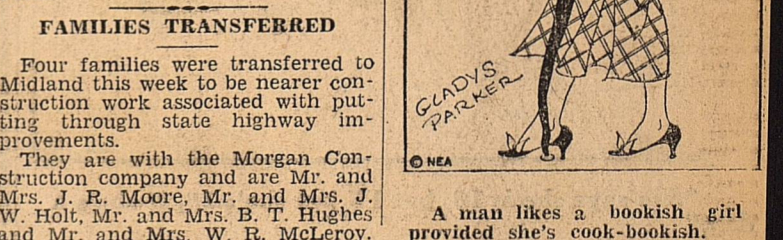

Church Magazine Praises Schools

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following story on the public schools system of Midland appeared in a recent issue of The Southwestern Advocate, publication issued by the Methodist Episcopal church, South. It was written by the Rev. Edwin C. Calhoun, former pastor of the Midland church, and praises the assembly period exercises of the Midland system.

Possibly the highest type of religious services held anywhere in our public school system in Texas are the chapel services held in the Midland public schools. When someone thinks of a chapel program religious leaders are usually disappointed in such services because they turn out to be pep rallies, stunt shows or group singing that have very little cultural value for the students participating in them. The following program that is given in the Midland high school. Three hundred and eighty high school students march into the auditorium and take their appointed seats. The group is sectioned into the four parts for singing; tenor, soprano, alto and bass, while Mrs. De Lo Douglas, director of music, assumes her position on the stage. She is the grand daughter of Rev. E. W. Solomon of the Texas Conference. She leads the group in singing such anthems and choruses as: "Benedictus," by Gounod, "Grant Us Thy Peace," by Vivaldi, "The Pilgrims' Chorus," by Wagner, from "Tannhauser," by Wagner. The group is then directed in reading any of the following selections from the Bible; The Beatitudes; 1st Corinthians, 13th chapter; Deuteronomy, 6:4-10; 1, 19, 23, and 100 psalm; Isaiah 1: 16-18; and Luke 2: 7-14. All of the songs and all of the Bible readings are given in the auditorium from memory. No books are used at all. To see and hear nearly four hundred students reading in unison such passages from the Holy Bible creates a wonderful impression upon any visitor who might be present.

Following this service in which all the students participate a minister appointed by the ministerial association brings a prepared message to the student body. The Rev. Edwin C. Calhoun, pastor of the Methodist church, is president of the minister's association.

Mr. W. W. Lackey is superintendent of the Midland public school system and has held this position for twenty-seven years. During these many years he has led the citizens of Midland to develop one of the finest types of education that can be found anywhere in Texas. He has the ability of creating a character building program that is making a fine impression not only upon the students of the school but on the entire city. Mr. Lackey is a fine Christian gentleman, and possesses high scholastic attainments. He is most loyal to his church. He finds time to teach an adult class of women, and directs the choir of his church. He is loyal in assisting any of the ministers of the city when funeral services are held. Not only does Mr. Lackey take active interest in his church, but he insists on all of his teachers becoming identified with the activities of the church of their choice. Mr. Lackey holds his membership in the Baptist church of Midland, but has a keen interest in the activities of all churches.

BEST HEALTH YEAR

AUSTIN.—The worst year of the depression has been the best health year, according to Dr. John W. Brown, state health officer, in commenting on the low death rate during the past year.

Of great importance was the almost entire freedom from epidemics, such as the influenza epidemic in December. Weather conditions throughout the year were good. The depression, undoubtedly, has curbed over-eating and over-drinking. Then, too, there have been fewer deaths charged to motor traffic, because there has been less such traffic. Accidents in industry have been fewer as the outcome of curtailment of employees and hours of work. The people, although against their will, had more leisure and more outdoor life. All these factors have evidently more than counter-balanced the ill effects of worry incidental to unemployment and difficult circumstances.

But perhaps more than any other single factor, the protection given by the effective functioning of the health departments, by the generous treatment of physicians, and by splendidly organized relief work has operated to conserve life and health.

Whatever economies must be effected in view of economic conditions, there must be no further radical curtailment of the support required to permit adequate functioning of health departments. The unfavorable aspects of the 1932 health record are increases in the number of deaths from heart disease, cancer, diabetes, and suicides.

WOODEN CIGARETS GET MEN A JAIL SENTENCE

DETROIT. (UP)—Wooden cigarettes and not wooden nickels caused Louis Bromberg and Julius Hackman, partners in a grocery store here, to run afoul of the law.

A friend of Bromberg's approached him with an offer to sell cigars at a bargain price, claiming they were bankrupt stock.

Bromberg found several grocers and wholesale tobacconists willing to assist in the purchase.

With delivery of the cigars, Bromberg received phone calls from the wholesalers. They said that the cigars were smooth strips of pine wood instead of paper and tobacco.

While police investigated, Bromberg rested in jail.

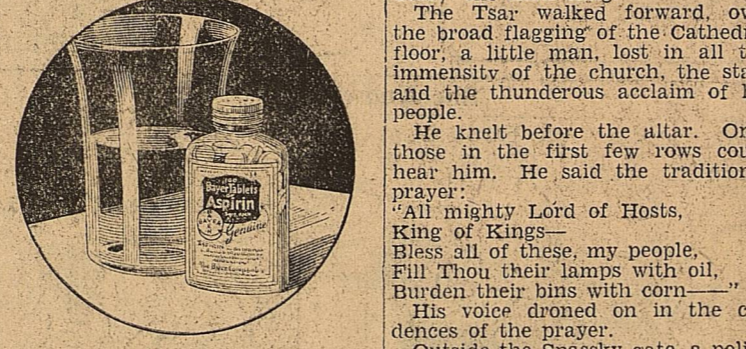
