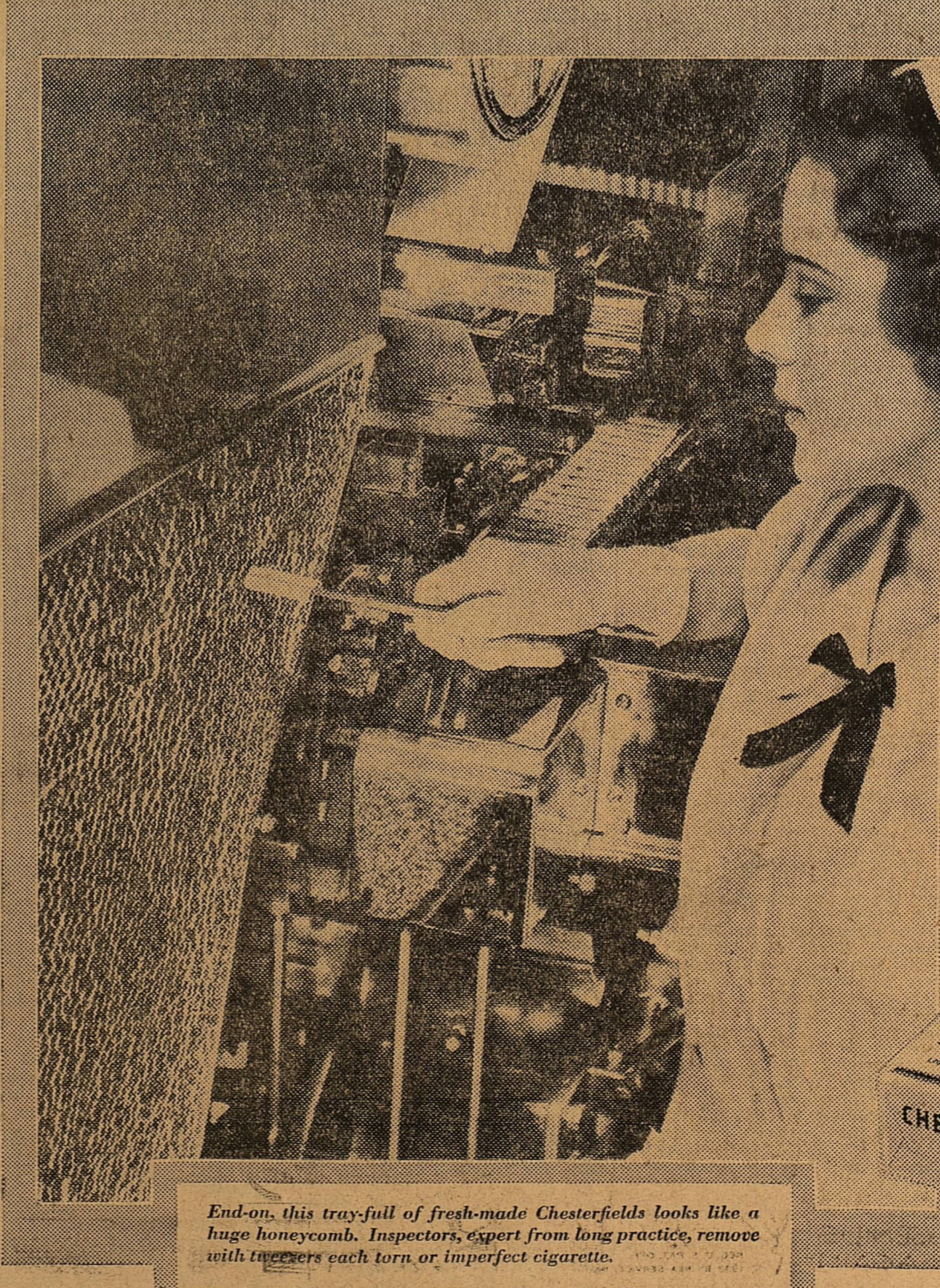
Christian Endeavor Has Sword Drill
