Hudspeth went to the treasury department to present to Governor Harding letters and telegrams in which it was alleged that the recently organized Agriculture and Livestock corporation of Fort Worth has passed under packer control and that it is impossible for a cattleman to obtain a loan unless the packers are willing that he shall have it.

Hudspeth told Gov. Harding that he knows nothing about the Fort Worth Company but that the charges of packer control have been made by reputable cattlemen.

These letters, Hudspeth said, are from some of the best men in Texas and their burden is that the Fort Worth Company has been turning down the very kind of loan that congress intended to relieve when it passed the amendment to the war finance act.

The government maintained inspectors in 892 establishments in 265 citcarried to Washington by Mrs. Yaji- ies and towns which compares with 897 establishments in 262 cities and towns in 1920. Inspection was inaugurated at 62 plants and withdrawn from 61 during the year. It was disintinued at 47 of them because of the stopping of slaughtering or of interstate business, at 5 by request, at 5 on account of being consolidated with another official establishment, and at 4 on account of violations of the meat inspection regulations or insanitary conditions.

> During the year the government inspectors examined 62,252,442 animals at packing plants, including cattle, calves, sheep, goats, swine and horses, and 189,874 were condemned. Of the animals slaughtered at these plants 8,179,572 were cattle, 3,896,207 calves, 12,452,435 sheep, 37,702,866 hogs, 20,027 goats, and 1,335 horses. The horse meat goes to supply a small demand from certain classes of foreigners. Most of the horses are slaughtered in New York, New Jersey, and Ohio.

The promoter takes good care to see that his account books, if he keeps any, never record the full amounts which have been extracted from the sympathetic public. And if he makes a pretense of accounting for the way the money is expended, this accounting is only a clever construction of falsities, intended to protect the promoter, if he is made the subject of inquiry by public officials. The system by which he operates precludes





The original post of the American ty diamond field of Arkansas. Legion, George Washington Post No. lost no time in signing Marshal Foch as a member. The generalissimo was met at the station at Washington, D. C., on the day of his arrival in America and presented with a membership card and a ceremonial badge of the Legion.
