Fifteen Midland automobiles are needed to transport army officers and enlisted men of the 8th pursuit group into the city this afternoon. The group will spend the night.

Conservative estimates are that the present crop will be grown at one-third the costs of the 1931 crop. Memphis (Reporting from Ten-nessee, Mississippi and Eastern Ark-ansas)—Planting has been hindered by flood waters of the Mississippi and tributary streams but farmers hope to be able to plant by June 15 and still make a crop. Probably 50 per cent of the crop is in normal condition. The estimated acreage increase of 8 per cent in this area conforms to the estimated United States' cotton acreage in-crease. Diversifications is practiced but a shortage of feed crops is seen. Fertilizer sales lag but in North and South Carolina and Georgia sales are reported good.
