Toll Is Four Dead; Stude's Plane Hits Laundry

AMARILLO, Oct. 30. (UP).—Art Stude, 25, of Woodward, Okla., died here today. He was the fourth victim of the airplane collision yester—tim of the airplane collision yester day morning which killed all three occupants of one plane yesterday. Stude's plane, after hitting the other craft in stunting over the city, crashed through the roof of a laundry building. The other fell into the street, killing Pilot Ezra Wiggins, 28, of Hooker, Okla.; Frank Clay, 23, of Morrill, Nebr., and Bill Tullis, 25, of Liberal, Kansas.

Some time ago a citizen of that county was arrested for murder. He was tried, convicted, sentenced to death, and lodged in the death house of the Ohio penitentiary. For 22 months he stayed there, awaiting what looked like certain doom, with other condemned men for his only

Finally, another man confessed to the crime. The first man was exonerated and was given his freedom, all stain removed from his name. So finally he asked the county commissioners for compensation for those 22 months in the death house, and they awarded him a verdict of \$12,000.

How much money would it take to make up for so long a sojourn in the shadow of the electric chair? Does the sum agreed on seem fair to you?

#### BOLD, BAD MEN

The big shot gangsters of the modern underworld thrive on terrible reputations. They like to be known as "Machine-gun so-and-so," much as the Texas bad man of former days liked to be called "the terror of the plains." But very often their reputations are more blood-andthunder-ish than they really deserve.

Joseph B. Keenan, assistant U. S. attorney general, tells a Senate sub-committee that the notorious George (Machine-Gun) Kelly really is an errant coward who had his hands on a machine gun only twice in his whole life.



Greyhound lines, and Southwestern Transportation company, came into being as a result of a deal, accord-ing to statements made by officials

of the new company.

The three companies involved are

among the most important bus systems in America. Southland Greyhound operated lines throughout Texas; Western ran from Chicago to Los Angeles and to Dallas; and

to Los Angeles and to Dallas; and Southwestern operated from Dallas to St. Louis via Texarkana.

The new company's headquarters are in Fort Worth. The Greyhound union bus depot in that city has been remodeled and enlarged to make room for the 150 or more new people who will move to the Texas city as employes of the company. Bus men here say the new Fort Worth depot is one of the most modern in the country.

The new company will have 700 employes, altogether, and the payroll will amount to more than \$1,500,000 per year. It will run 200 busses over 6,500 miles of road in the states of Illinois, Missouri, Arkansas, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Colorado, New Mexico and part of Louisiana. The company will operate about 30 terminals on the new acceptance.


