### STATE OF SIEGE DECLARED; HAVANA DEATH TOLL 150

Reinforcements Sent

HAVANA, Nov. 10. (UP).—President Grau San Martin today issued an order declaring all Havana in a state of siege.

### SHIP LEAVES TAMPA WITH MORE TROOPS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10. (UP).—The training ship Wyoming, with a battalion of the seventh regiment, sailed from Tampa to Havana today to reinforce the United States naval squadron already stationed there.

### ROOSEVELT OPENS LITVINOFF PARLEY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10. (UP).—President Roosevelt and Maxim Litvinoff met this afternoon and were said to be discussing a preliminary draft of an agreement on terms of recognition which were worked out in the two days conference of Litvinoff and Secretary Hull.

### EIGHT CLUBBED IN MINE RIOTS

SCRANTON, Pa., Nov. 10. (UP).—Violence was renewed at the Johnson mine in Dickson City today with the clubbing of eight men and injury of twenty others.

Police dispersed 200 striking anthracite miners who were attempting to prevent United Mine Workers of America from entering the mine.

### Goes to Funeral Of Truck Victim

J. D. Hicks, night clerk at Hotel Scharbauer, is at San Angelo today attending the funeral of his cousin, Millard King of that city, who died from injuries received in an automobile-truck crash Wednesday night six miles from Ballinger.

King and C. T. Matthews, also of San Angelo, were killed instantly when they were pinned under the wreckage.

C. W. Smith, owner of the truck, who was driving just ahead of it, discovered the accident. He waited at Ballinger a short time for the truck to appear and when it failed to arrive he returned to find the cause for the delay. All of the bodies were taken to San Angelo.

This is the third death to occur in Hicks' family this year, his mother and sister-in-law having died since February.

### Stores to Remain Open on Armistice

Business houses in Midland, as in practically every other town in the country, will remain open Saturday, even though it is Armistice day. Merchants said that due to so many farmers bringing produce to town and that people come to Midland to trade from as far away as Gates county and Let county, N. M., it would be a hardship on them to find stores here closed.

Many merchants are arranging to see the football game or let part of their employees off to see the game at 2:30.

### Women Visit Men's Class Next Sunday

Men of the Hotel Scharbauer class are expected to have a large number of women visitors Sunday. The men have designated the day as one of their semi-annual women's visiting days and all women or girls will be welcomed. Many class members will bring their wives, mothers and daughters. ### Gold Price Same as World Market Today

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10. (UP).—From the first time since the gold purchase policy was inaugurated, the government failed today to post a higher price than the world open market, offering \$33.20 per ounce, an increase of only five cents since yesterday.

### Loving County Has Rare Distinctions— No Crime, Ne Debt, Not Even a Cemetery

MENTONE—Two years ago the last county in Texas was organized, when voters of Loving decided to run their own affairs ago. Born in the depression, the infant has not fed itself on the rich bottle of credit, even if oil wells are at the edge of the townsite, furnishing good valuations for bond issues. Its sheet iron courthouse has no bonded debt, built its 20x40 structure for \$3,000 cash.

There is a cream stucco school for which the countryside school district owes a small sum of money, about \$3,000. There has not been a case on the criminal docket since office holders took the oath in July 1931. An oil field without crime, a county without debt—that is something. It owes about \$6,000 on road machinery and that is all. No boys at all, none planned.

There is not a cemetery in the county, none has been necessary. The only person to be buried in the county since it was organized was Shun Dabner, a cowboy who was thrown from a horse in New Mexico and who died in the county. There is not a resident minister and only one lawyer, Judge A. W. Carls, former of Big Lake. There have been but 39 law suits filed since the county began functioning. Court is held in the school, when school is not in session but in Elliott building when the school bells ring.

### Planning for New Highway

John M. Green, the county clerk, and a former co-operative market specialist at Dallas, says the valuations this year were \$2,800,000 and the county tax rate is 95 cents. Commissioners are planning to hard surface the road leading five miles from Mentone to the Pecos-Carlsbad highway and are to build a new road to the Red Bluff dam site joining a road now known as the Kyle road. The distance is about 27 miles and half of it is already constructed. It is flat country, but that what a road means is the ground it just squats and stays there. The result there is fine range even if the land leases at 3 cents an acre and they run from 4 to the section.

Officials of the county are: J. C. Ramsey, former Californian and oil field worker, county judge; John M. Green, county clerk; Harlan Ross, a ranchman is sheriff; D. B. Jay, tax assessor. One of the commissioners is B. H. Hopper who runs the only legal beer place in the county.

### Two Blind Tigers in Town

There are two hoodlum joints in the town, a low average for a county seat town, one of the lowest in Texas. The other two are owned by J. C. Hall, S. M. Kyle and W. W. Brookfield. They are ranchmen. The ranchmen are sitting in the saddle. There are 250 votes in the county.

Mentone is three years old. It was founded by Jim Wheat, former of Grandfalls, who came here to drill for oil while the townsite was founded old Porterville, down on the banks of the Pecos three miles away, moved here. Site of old Porterville is easily recognized by the rank growth of some farms well established as the waters of the Red Bluff dam up the river become available. Jim Wheat has his office on the square, an old drug store building with the soda fountain still intact. There is not a vacant business building and with the announcement of the Red Bluff dam to cost about \$2,000,000 there is every belief here that Mentone will get the big play and become the town to hit 600 people now.

### Remainder Live on Ranches

The rest of the county lives on the distant ranches along windmill roads through the sagebrush and mesquite bushes about two feet high. There is a four teacher school of which White of Pyote is the superintendent. Water is a problem, most of it comes 75 miles from town and selling at 50 to 75 cents a barrel. The home wells are known as the Randau wells.

The biggest ranchman in the section is Dr. W. D. Johns of Kansas City, former Pecos merchant, who has more than 100 sections of land and who in addition leases 1,000 P. lands. Mike Kyle, W. W. Brookfield are among the other big ranchmen in the county. On the eastern side of town is the sand country, that is the road that leads to Wink 30 miles away. It is the sand country that has the fattest cattle this year, though some people say if such cattle are moved to hard land they do not do so well.

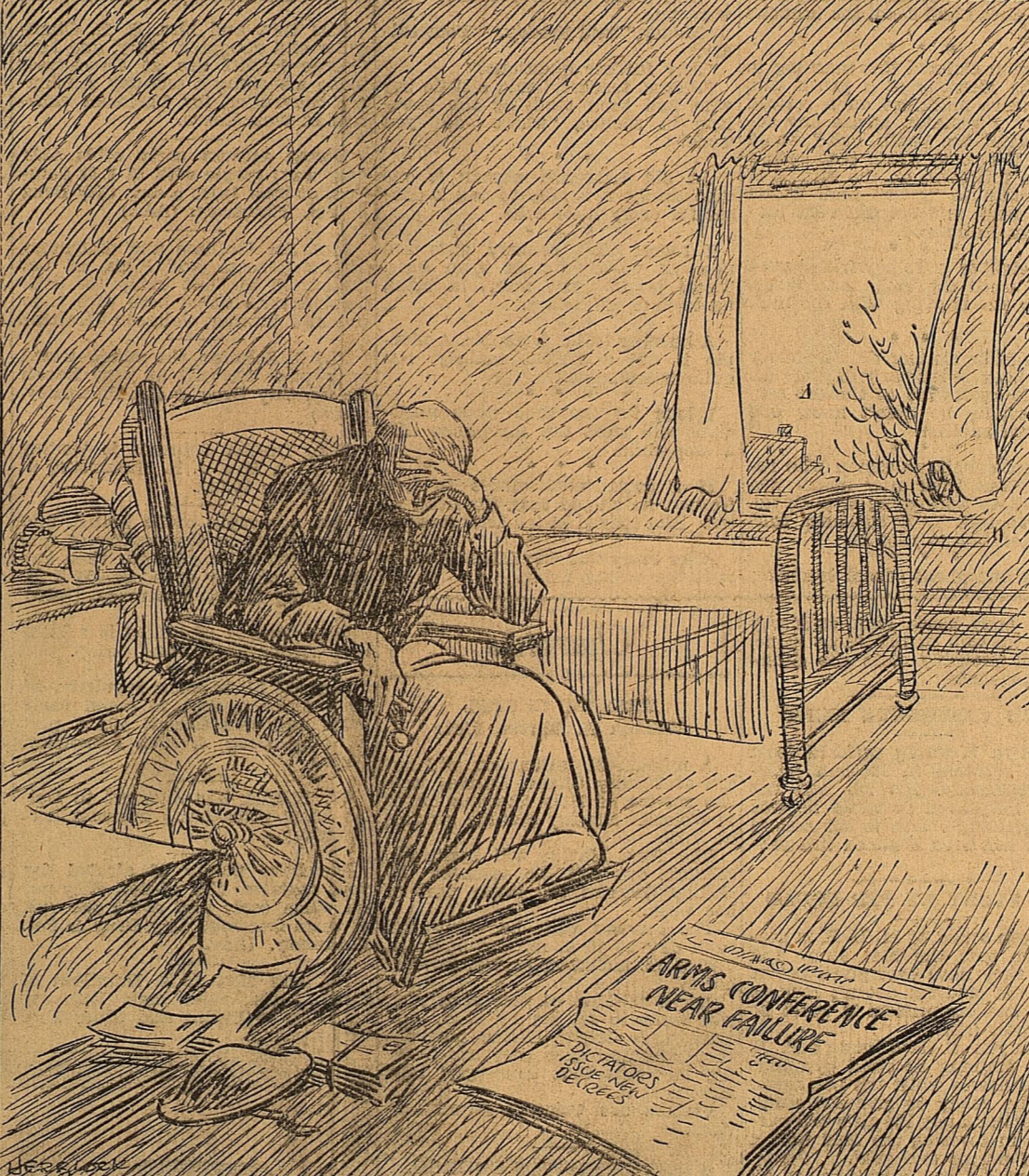
Floyd Goodrich has a good ranch here as has Jeff Cooksey, who operates 75 sections.

### Ranch Taxes \$1.50 Acre

Ranch land is taxed at \$1.50 an acre; irrigable river land, \$5. Cattle are taxed at a strict cow country with no sheep and few horses. Many of the people who live in Mentone say they do not know who owns the lot on which they build their houses, one man told of erecting a house last week at a cost of 65 cents for materials and labor.

Mentone has two hotels, the Porterville and the Wheat. There is one large lumber yard, two drug stores, four grocery stores, four cafes, not a single dry goods store. Oil production in the county, at a depth of about 4,200 feet, hits about 350 barrels daily of 40 gravity oil. The townsite has not been leased. The county has seen some improvements lately, as Mrs. Kyle has built a neat stucco residence on her ranch. Mrs. Alline Brazzell is the postmaster. A big part of the county is owned by non-residents. There is a large body of University of Texas land here and some unsold

### CHARGES FOLLOW FATAL SHOOTING OF YOUNG BRIDE

DALLAS, Nov. 10. (UP).—Tom G. Woolley, 28, was charged with murder today in connection with the shooting of his bride two months ago.

The coroner's verdict was accidental death. It was believed that a shotgun the bride gave her husband discharged while he was cleaning it. District Attorney Robert Hunt said possession of the gun was evidence, although circumstantial, and was sufficient to warrant the charge.

### Believe Letter to Urschel Unfounded

DALLAS, Nov. 10. (UP).—A Wise county farmer who wrote Charles Urschel that he had a part of the \$200,000 ransom fund was questioned by federal agents here today. Agents said no charges were contemplated, believing the letters were unfounded.

### Lone Star Seeks Injunction Order

HOUSTON, Nov. 10. (UP).—The Lone Star Gas company tomorrow will ask the three judge federal court for an injunction to restrain the railroad commission from enforcing the order reducing the gate rates at 250 north and central Texas towns.

### Accused Freed of Swindling Charge

FORT STOCKTON.—The court instructed the jury to return a verdict of not guilty in the case of W. L. Leeper, charged with swindling John L. Trent, prominent Pecos county rancher, of \$5,000 given in payment for 250 shares of stock in the Dixie Cotton Chopper Machinery Co. and five royalty shares in the same company.

### Complaint Blanks Should Be Signed

Business men of Midland who believe that some of their competitors are guilty of unfair competition, or believe them guilty of violating any phase of the code, may obtain blanks for complaint from the post office or from the Midland compliance board and send their complaints to the U. S. department of commerce office at Houston.

### EMPLOYERS FAIL TO OBSERVE PROVISION

Some employers in Midland are neglecting to observe one of the new NRA rules which requires all employers working under the retail code to elect which hour schedule they will operate under then post this fact and the schedule of employment working hours, a statement issued Friday by the Midland compliance board said.

### COMMISSIONER ALSO HURT IN ACCIDENT

FREDERICKSBURG, Nov. 10.—County Judge Henry Webb, 67, of Ector county, was killed and two county commissioners were injured last night when the automobile in which they rode struck a concrete culvert on the highway near Stonewall, 15 miles east of Fredericksburg.

Commissioner Lee Johnson, riding in the back seat, suffered a fractured skull, concussion of the brain and a serious spinal injury. Commissioner Oso Pool, riding in the front seat with Judge Webb, who was driving, was hurt slightly.

### NEPOTISM PROBE COSTS JOB FOR WOMAN AT AUSTIN

AUSTIN, Nov. 10. (UP).—Mrs. Ovid Ransom, who testified before the legislative nepotism committee yesterday, told Chairman Ben Canney today that she was struck by a woman employee of the Texas Relief commission after she testified.

She also said that she was informed that her discharge from the commission, scheduled for November 15, was now effective immediately. Canney said he will put the matter before the committee which adjourned until Wednesday.

P. T. A. GIVES KIT

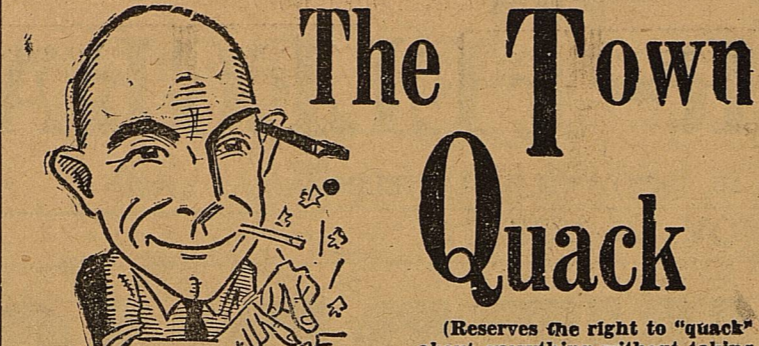

Belmont Bible Class, Active in Welfare Work, First Included Only That Addition

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second of a series of articles on histories of Midland clubs and church organizations. Presidents and reporters of these organizations are asked to gather material for the histories as soon as possible.

The Belmont Bible Class was organized October 8, 1929 by twelve residents of Belmont addition. Charter members were Mmes. D. F. Holster, E. W. Hough, C. E. Vaughan, Ray Mack, J. S. Noland R. L. Mitchell, C. F. Gairson, J. M. King, C. E. Strawn and C. F. McCargo.

Mrs. Florence Richardson was selected by the class as the first teacher. Mrs. Noland was elected first president, and Mrs. Mitchell secretary and treasurer.

The class memorized the books of the Bible as a first project and then took up the "Introductory Bible" course from the Moody institute at Chicago. Five members received diplomas at the end of this study.

Mrs. Richardson as teacher and served two years or until moving away. The present teacher, Mrs. J. M. King, was elected in July of 1931 and Mrs. T. O. Mickiff as her assistant.

From time to time the class has entertained various ministers and their wives. The Revs. E. B. Chancellor, Cole of Des Moines, Kenneth C. Minter, Winston G. Oates, Big Spring and Winston F. Borum have delivered addresses at special meetings. The Reverend Cotton, Miss Sprague, aided the class in their work with Mexicans here.

The class has been active in all types of welfare work. It has given two Bibles to persons who needed them. Food and clothing have been given the needy at various times. Work with the Mexicans, however, has been the class' outstanding project.

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War Bonuses

An Old Story

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (UP)—The bonus for former warriors is as old as the Indian wars of the early settlers, according to Howard Bradstreet, who reviews the fight between the English settlers in Connecticut with the Pequots, which occurred in 1637.

The Pequots, most feared tribe in Connecticut, had subjugated the other Indians and the determination of the white settlers on a war, though they were inexperienced in Indian fighting, was a "remarkable action to take," Bradstreet writes.

The General Court decided on the war at Hartford, May 1, 1637, and by July 13, the same year, the Indian power had been broken. The white men struck quickly, killing men, women and children as they drove the Indians from the state, Bradstreet relates. Then came the aftermath, just as it has in modern days.

The Indian fighters, he says, demanded bonuses and were given bands in the former country of the

Pequots, now New London County. Taxes were increased and increased interest in preparation for other wars was noted. The leaders the fighting wrote their memoirs, and alterations arose as to who won the war.

Mathias Sepiss, writing of Connecticut tribes for the historical publications committee of the Tercentenary Commission of the state, says the Dutch were the first white people seen by the Connecticut tribes. They sailed up the Connecticut River 3 years before the English arrived to settle the state. At that time there were 17 different tribes.
