"Neiher of us realized that the offens was a capital one and we are sorry it ever came up," the paper quotes Margot Ralls as saying. "Neither of us had any part in initiating the charges. The story got out and military police came to see us. We never wanted the case taken to court."

A preliminary hearing in Lieutenant Murrel's case was postponed yesterday because, his attorneys said, there was "no hope" of getting a bond figure set before Federal Judge R. J. McMillan returns from El Paso early next week.

The Express says it learned that Blanche Ralls did not make the complaint against Lieutenant Murrel but that a "next friend" filed the complaint with the provost marshal at Fort Sam Houston and it was then transmitted to the bureau of investigation of the department of justice. The paper named Charles R. Davis of the bureau of investigation as the "next friend" who filed the complaint.



(UP).—State Treasurer Charley Lockhart told house investigators today that he received nearly \$500 in cash donations from employes, believing that they were given through "love and kindness", on Christmas and other anniversaries, and not in order that the employes might keep their jobs. Cold Weather Breakfasts

You are apt to be hungrier on crisp autumn mornings when there's just a threat of frosty winter in the air. The glass of orange juice-toast-and-coffee combination, while adequate in sultry summer is not sufficient to send you off with a warm snug feeling when days grow longer—and colder! So here are some breakfast suggestions to give you that "well begun is half done" feeling.

Preserved Figs

Break the eggs separately into a saucer and slip into the ham fat. Cook over a low fire and baste with hot fat until the whites become set. Season with salt and pepper and serve immediately on the platter of ham.

Pineapple Breakfast Cake Sift together one cup flour, one eighth teaspoon salt, two teaspoons baking powder and one tablespoon sugar, and cut in three tablespoons of shortening. Add one well-beaten egg and two tablespoons of milk and pat into a round greased tin. Drain the con-

tents of an eight ounce can of crushed pineapple and spread over the top. Sprinkle with one-half cup brown sugar and dot with butter. Bake in a hot oven for fifteen or twenty minutes and serve hot.

Bacon Biscuits
2 cups flour.
4 teaspoons baking powder.
5 teaspoon salt.

Mix and sift the flour, baking powder and salt and work in the shortening. Cold bacon fat makes a good shortening for these biscuits. Add the diced bacon which has been cooked until crisp and brown. Add enough milk to make a soft dough. Turn the dough onto a floured board, roll to one-half inch thickness and cut with a biscuit cutter. Bake cut with a biscuit cutter. Bake in a hot oven until brown. In a not oven third brown.

In making scrambled eggs try adding one teaspoon minced parsley and a few drops of lemon juice. Another way to give this dish variety is to substitute tomatoes for milk.

Delicious Pies for Thanksgiving

Of course it's not absolutely necessary to serve pie at the Thanksgiving dinner — but -most people do! And it's usually mince or pumpkin pie that's chosen as most typical of the traditions of the day. Lemon Meringue Pie Prepare and bake one pastry shell.

1 cup sugar.

3 tablespoons corn starch.

2 tablespoons flour.

4 teaspoon salt.

Grated rind one lemon.

2 cups boiling water.

2 cups boiling water. 3 egg yolks. 6 tablespoons lemon juice.

1 tablespoon butter. Mix half the sugar with corn starch, flour and salt. Add lemon rind; pour on boiling water slowly, stirring constantly. Cook in double boiler, continuing to stir until thick and clear. Mix remaining half of sugar with egg yolks and lemon juice; add to first mix-ture, cook about 2 minutes longer until thick and smooth; add butter. Pour into baked pastry shell. Cover with meringue and bake.
