POST AT IRKUTSK, HOURS AHEAD Half-Inch Rain Here Allows Farmers to Plant Crops

TOTAL FOR TWO DAYS .81 INCH; **MORE FORECAST**

A half-inch of rainfall Monday afternoon and evening raised the to-tal here in two days to .81, with the fall at Sloan field being gauged at 36 inches Monday, or a total of .51 for the two days, and the Gulf Pipe Line company, west of town, report-ing a rain of .83 inch from 7 o'clock Monday to 7 o'clock this morning, making the two-day total there 1.38. As farmers were celebrating the first rainfall in several weeks, en-couraging reports came in from throughout the general area. Dis-patchers at the T. & P. Railroad company said El Paso had a hard rain from 8 until 9 last night, Pecos received a hard shower, Monahans and Toyah sprinkles, Odessa a light rain and Stanton a quarter to a half-inch. No precipitation was re-ported for Colorado and Sweetwater. The dispatcher at the Atlantic Pipe Line company said the rain extended approximately 20 miles east and 20 west, according to early morning reports. A half-inch of rainfall Monday

Light showers at Wink and a three quarter inch fall at Crane were listed by the dispatcher at the Gulf tank farm, with cloudy wea-ther being reported at Rankin and Iraan. 

BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT DOESN'T MEAN RECOVERY HERE

When you look at the figures in the current business revival, you get a picture of a nice bright sunrise which has an ominous fringe of black, thunderous-looking clouds all around it.

Co-eds' feet are a size and a half larger than those of her mother, says an orthopedist. Is it substan-tiated then that the new genera-The monthly report from the Department of Commerce begins by listing the encouraging factors.

Textile production is higher than at any time since Vance. November, 1929. Steel production is the highest in two years. Auto production is likewise above any figure recorded since July, 1931. Electric power production reflects extensive gains in manufacturing activity; lumber on the dancing floors. production is improving; the major lines of consumers' goods are steadily booming.

So much for the sunrise. Now for the clouds. Employment and payroll gains are lagging behind.
