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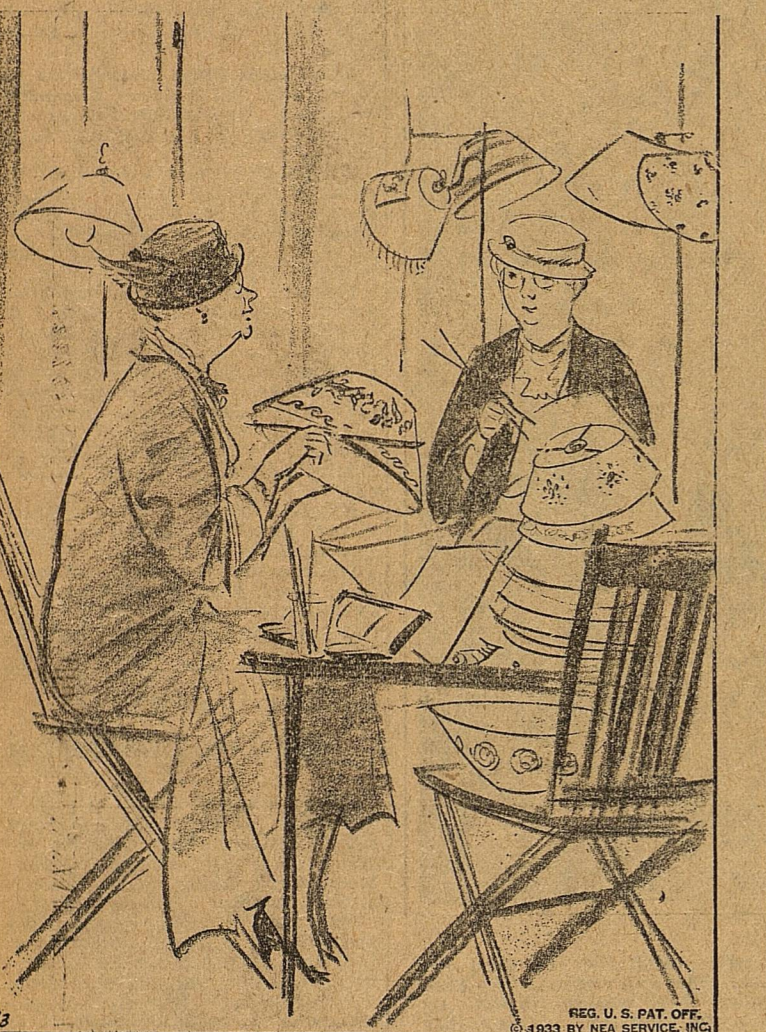
SAFETY FOR SAVINGS

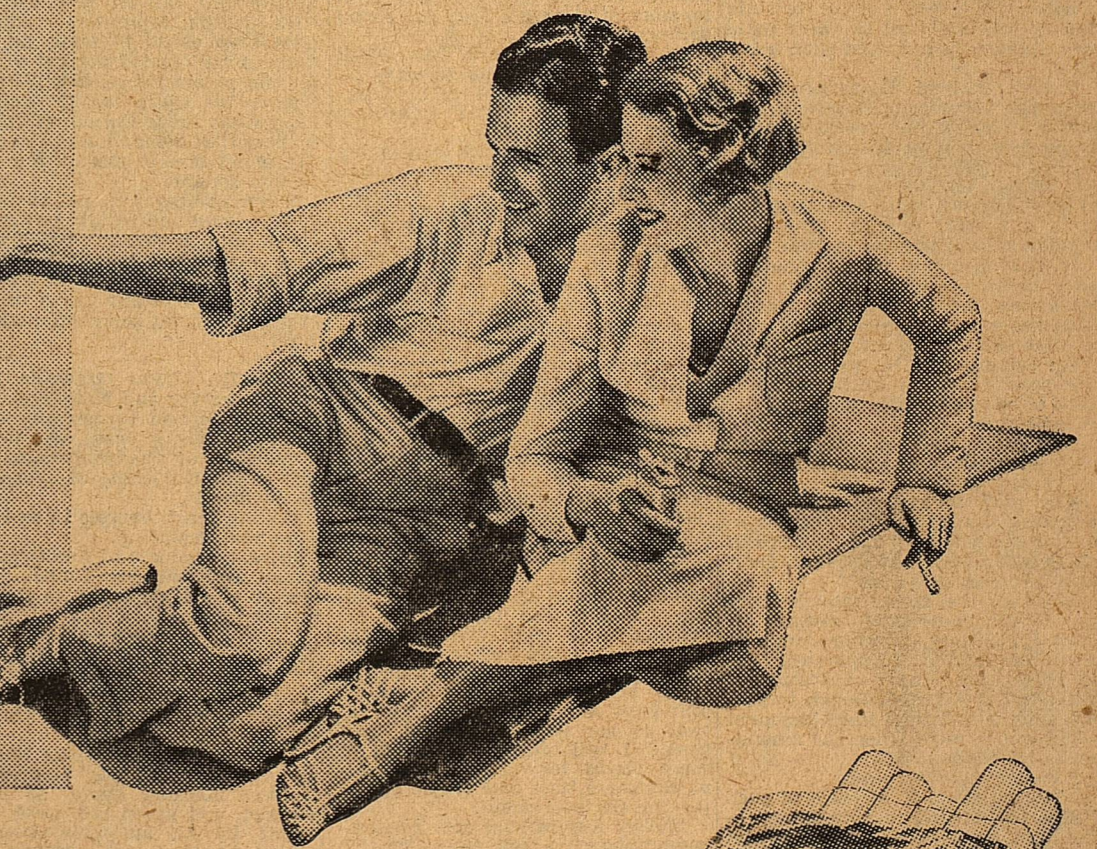

Air Workers On Increase

WASHINGTON (UP).—Approximately 500 more persons were employed by American-operated airplanes on July 1, 1933, than on the same date in 1932, according to the aeronautics branch of the Department of Commerce. The 1933 total was 5,997 employees.

Of this number, 575 were pilots and 192 co-pilots, while 2,236 were mechanics, 1,613 other hangar and field personnel, and 1,381 office employees.

Gasoline consumed by scheduled airlines during the first half of 1933 totaled 12,589,547 gallons, the department noted, a substantial increase over the 1932 figures. Oil consumed by these planes also showed an increase, jumping from 317,656 gallons for the first six months of 1932 to 470,184 gallons for the 1933 period.

All of these increases were made in spite of the fact that at the end of the period this year there were only 544 planes in operation as compared with 680 on July 1, 1932.

CHINESE BLUE EAGLE

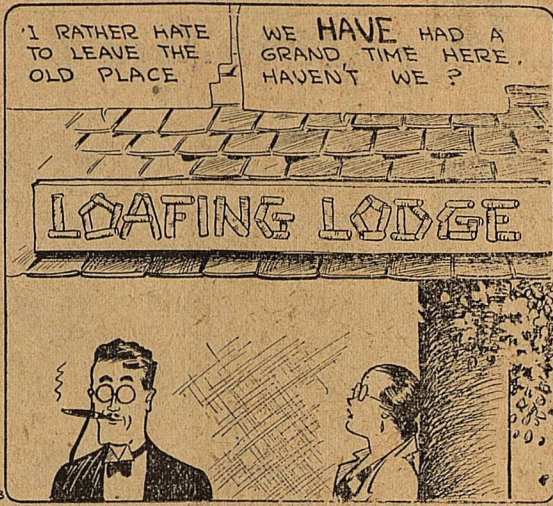
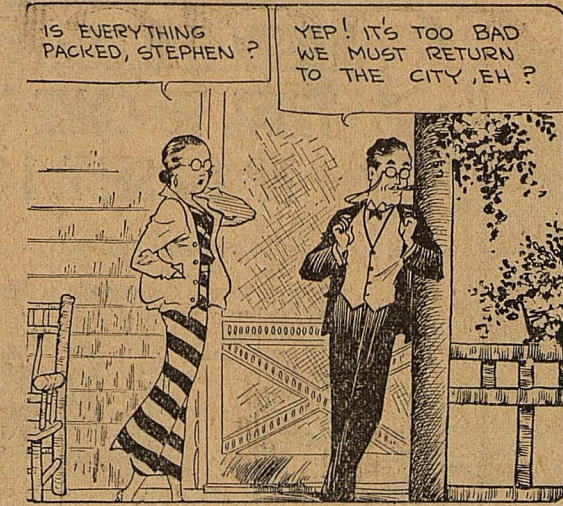

Illustrates NRA Talk with Story

WASHINGTON—National Recovery Administrator Hugh S. Johnson illustrated to a Pennsylvania audience what the government is doing under the sign of the Blue Eagle with a story of an ox who developed an idea. INTERNATIONAL TRIAL TO COME UP ON SEPT. 14

NEW YORK—An American attorney, Arthur Garfield Hays, will play a leading role in a spectacular, internationally important 'mock trial' held in London the week of Sept. 14.

Eminent lawyers from France, England, Holland, Switzerland, Belgium, Italy, America and Spain will convene at that time to 'try' the case of the five men accused by the Nazi government of having started the Reichstag fire last Feb. 27—the spark which set off the Nazi revolution and brought Adolf Hitler to power.

It is an unprecedented procedure. Never before have lawyers from seven countries made an united effort to influence justice in another country. The accused men cannot be present at their own 'trial'—they are in prison in Germany. The exact bill of accusations against them is not even known to the lawyers trying the case in England because the Nazi government will not let anyone read it. It is because these lawyers from the seven countries are convinced that the four Communists accused among the five are not only innocent but are the dupes of a deep-eyed Nazi plot, that the London trial will be held.

The lawyers participating hope that when the real trial occurs in Leipzig on Sept. 21, even if their evidence is not allowed to be introduced, their action will influence the court to declare the men innocent. Believes Men Inocent. Four of the five accused men are Communists. 'The German Communist, Ernest Torgler, has iron-clad affidavits proving he was elsewhere at the time of the fire,' Hays declared on sailing for England. 'The three Bulgarian Communists, Blagoi Popoff, George Dimitroff and Vassil Taneff are equally innocent. I think the majority of the lawyers attending the London trial is convinced that the fifth member of the accused, Van der Lubbe, is acting for and with the Nazi government. When picked up in the vicinity of the fire, he had on only his trousers and was armed with a Dutch passport and Dutch Communist party membership card, both of which were undoubtedly forgeries.' Denied Copy of Charges. Hays will play a stellar role at the London 'mock trial' because he goes armed with powerful attorney to defend the three Bulgarians. In August he went to Leipzig, endeavoring to see them, but was refused permission by Paul Teichert, one of the three Leipzig attorneys assigned by the Nazis to defend them. Teichert also refused Hays a copy of the accusations, refused him permission to take evidence for the men outside of Germany, and also refused him to attend the trial. He even refused to discuss the case, despite the fact that Hays has his power of attorney to represent the accused men. Since then Hays has received a cable stating that verbal permission has been granted for him to attend the Leipzig trial, so he hopes to go on to Leipzig after the London 'mock trial.'

For six months an international group of lawyers and others interested, headed by Albert Einstein, have been working on the case. Hays declared that they have dozens, many of them eye-witnesses, now German refugees, to prove the men innocent. The procedure will be to hear all the evidence and record it—then to appeal to the Nazi government for permission to introduce the evidence at the real trial of the men in Leipzig. Also Hays added, they have asked for protection for these witnesses in order that they may go into Germany for the trial and testify, and protection for them on their way out again. 'Even though we can't see the bill of accusations, we feel certain that the real charge will be high treason, the burning of the Reichstag the evidence of it. It is undoubtedly a political trial, not a civil one. But we all feel confident that justice may be done. For Germany, after all, is terribly influenced by the opinion of outside countries.'

EL PASO (UP)—Crooning love songs is no breach of the peace, Peace Justice J. M. Goggin decided when he released Ramon Galtan, Francisco Quinones, Jose Acosta and Francisco Besequil. Justice Goggin ordered the quartet to sing in court to test the music. They crooned a Spanish love song, with which they said they were serenading their sweethearts when arrested. 'That song doesn't disturb the peace,' decided Justice Goggin.
