PROMOTING CHILD HEALTH

It is encouraging to read that Labor Secretary Frances Perkins is undertaking to tackle the problem of restoring the health of children who have suffered by the depression.

Figures presented to Miss Perkins indicate that no less than one-fifth of all the children in the country are now showing signs of under-nourishment, lack of proper medical care and inadequate housing.

That statement speaks for itself and needs no comment.

Now Miss Perkins has called a meeting of child health leaders, to convene in Washington on Oct. 6 under the auspices of the Children's Bureau.

To say that this conference will have plenty of work to do is to put it very mildly. It will have to find a way to meet one of the most distressing situations imaginable. The whole country will wish it all kinds of success.

THE GRAF SAILS ON

Announcement that the German dirigible Graf Zeppelin will appear at the Chicago Century of Progress exposition on Oct. 26 reminds us once more that the Germans seem perfectly at home with these lighter-than-air liners, no matter what difficulties other nations may have with them.

This remarkable airship has, by now, a record of achievement so long that no one can recite it all without a reference book. It has flown around the world, it has crossed various oceans so many times that people have lost count, it has acted as a commercial carrier, and it has never had a really serious accident.

All in all, the career of the Graf Zeppelin is a striking example of the things that can be done with a dirigible by people who know the tricks.

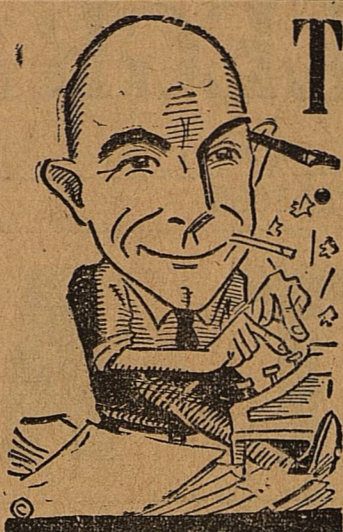

Answer to Mother's Question on School Lunches in Article

Here is an answer to that mother's question on what should go into the school lunch. It might help a lot of other women out, too, who have some difficulty in determining just what should be prepared for those three square meals a day.

A letter, full of good suggestions, has come from Miss Sammie Marie Hill, who has been making a study of this problem at Texas Tech at Lubbock and at home. You will find her letter interesting and useful. She writes:

"I have been studying and experimenting with foods a great deal and recently I have been working on the school lunch. I might give some mother a little light on sandwiches as school lunches.

"The best foods to include in the school lunch are sandwiches, dessert, fruit and a bottle of milk or some milk drink.

"For sandwiches use the most nourishing kinds of bread, such as whole wheat, oatmeal, brown, raisin or nut bread.

"Appetizing fillings may be egg, chopped meat, American cheese; fresh cottage cheese, plain or combined with dried fruit; sliced tomatoes; chopped beets; crisp lettuce; jelly; peanut butter; chopped raisins or dates.

"For dessert plain cookies, ginger cookies, date cookies, sponge cake, or gingerbread, are desirable.

"Pie, pickles and rice cake should not be included in the school lunch box.

"Stewed fruit or apple sauce or fresh fruit are attractive, desirable and wholesome in the lunch box.

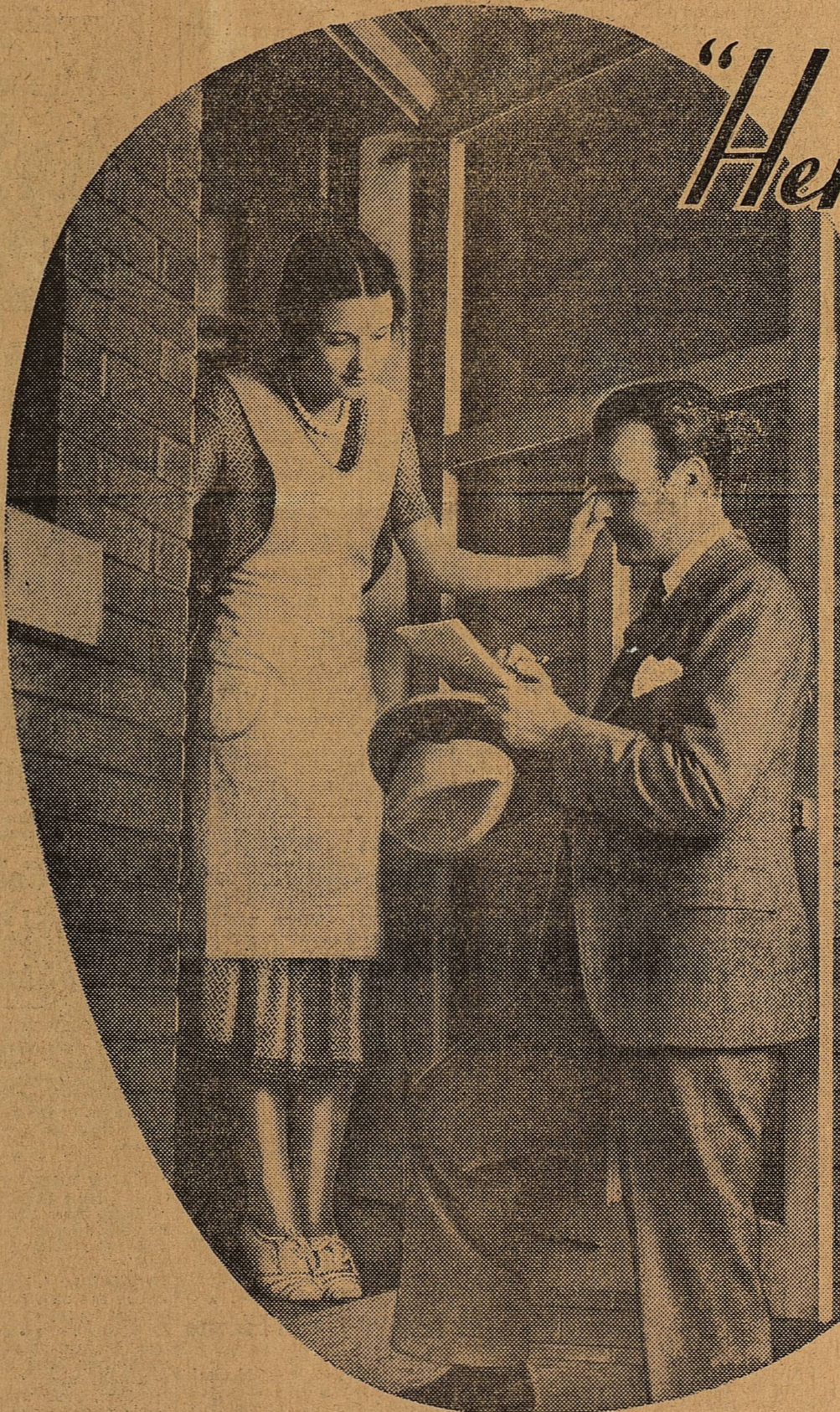

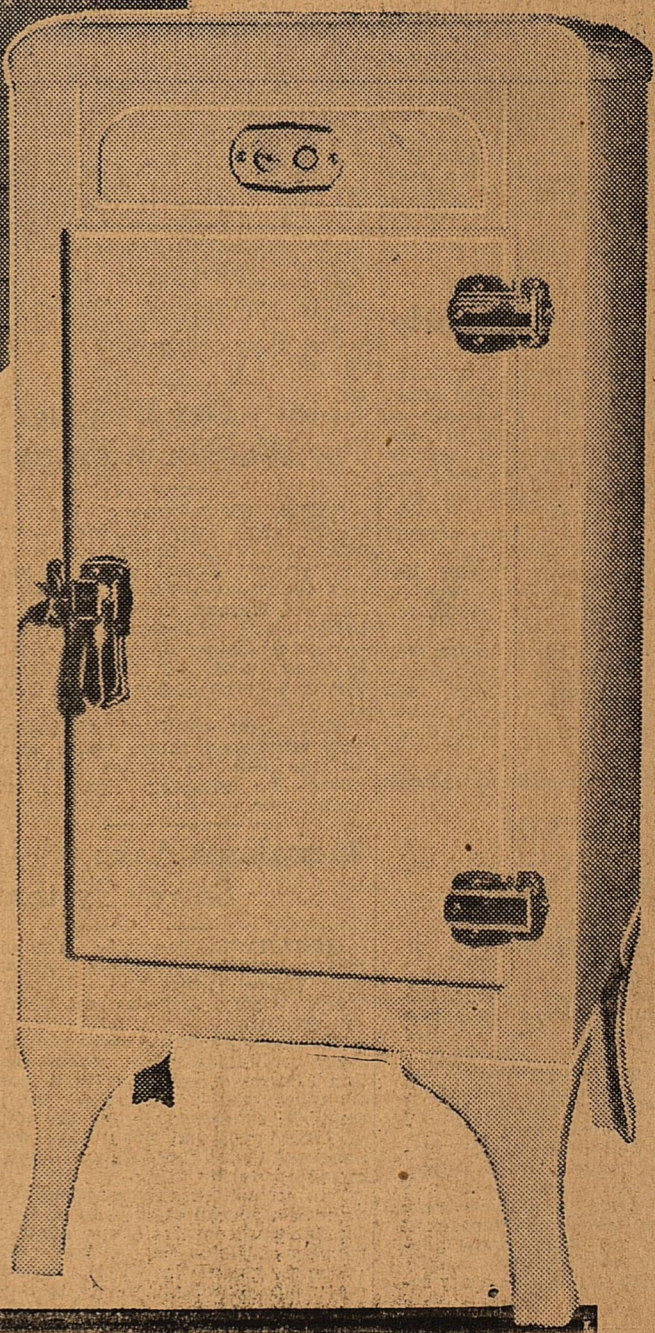

EDMONTON, Alberta (UP)—Airplanes have not completely supplanted dog teams in the far north, veteran trappers and prospectors assert.

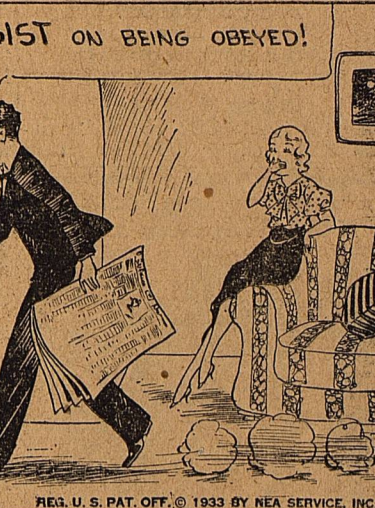
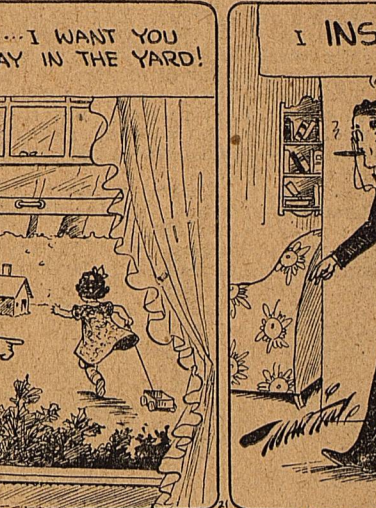
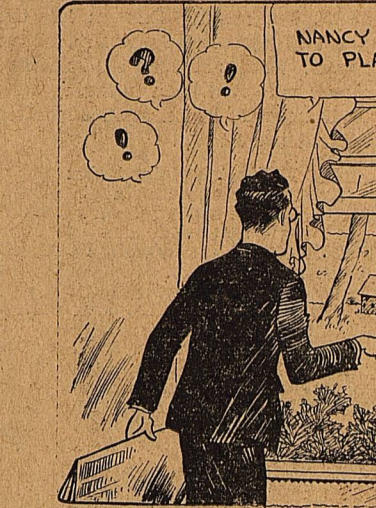
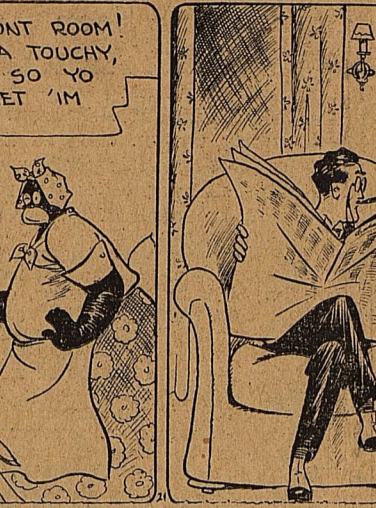
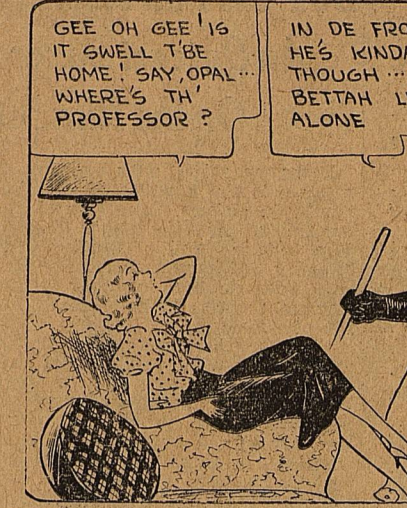

Consequently Schmidt is expected to give much attention to the line. In the one-sided game with Austin college the line play was ragged with the opponents breaking through repeatedly to smear ball carriers.

Cy Perkins of Oney, is a veteran and strengthens one side of the line at tackle. At the other tackle there are several promising candidates but none with very much experience. Of these, R. Allison, Dallas, is the most experienced. He has yet to make a letter. His chief competition is from three new men, Willis Cannon, Fort Worth, Judy Truelson, Dallas, and M. Godwin, Hot Springs, Ark., each weighing around 220 pounds.

Two lettermen guards, L. Bassinger of Fort Worth, and Bud Taylor of Austin, got first call against Austin college. Each weighs around 180. P. Hill, 220-pounder from Pampa, is a promising heavyweight for a guard post. If the tackle problem is solved, Schmidt may be able to shift one of the heavier tackle candidates to a guard post. Darrel Lester, a 200-pound sophomore from Jackboro, looks like the best bet for center, although Hepp Floore, a Fort Worth player with the squad last year, is a strong contender. Both lack polish and need experience.
