FIXING OF OIL PRICES BALKED AT BY JOHNSON

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—Advocates of federal regulation of petroleum prices were told last night by Hugh S. Johnson, the industrial administrator that he would not recommend any price fixing to Provider Process. trator that he would not recommend any price fixing to President Roosevelt until the effect of production control had been determined.

Hearing Begins

Johnson's statement was made as committees representing the various factions of the oil industry assembland with himster transfer to the control of the oil industry assembland with himster transfer.

factions of the oil industry assembled with him to work out a trade practice plan. They began their sessions with a tentative draft submitted by Johnson after the oil men were unable to agree.

Wirt Franklin, president of the Independent Petroleum association and spokesman for the emergency national committee of 54 set up under the auspices of the American Petroleum institute, insisted price control was necessary.

troleum institute, insisted price control was necessary.

The committee for which Franklin spoke recently voted 27 to 18 in favor of price regulation.

Franklin asserted price control will be necessary if we are to meet increased cost." Johnson answered:

"I do not think so if we get production under control."

"That has not been our experience," Franklin said.

"That is my opinion," shot back Johnson.

"That is not the fact," said Frank-

Johnson said in answer that the only successful Johnson said in answer that the only successful price control attempt he knew of was during the war when both the supply and demand for a commodity were under control and that all other attempts were failures. "I am not willing until the theory of production control is established to recommend any price fixing to President Roosevelt," Johnson said, explaining that he believed control of production in itself would affect prices.

Two committees were accepted

Two committees were accepted from the membership of the emergency national committee of 54 set up under the code advocated under austices of the American Petroleum institute. One faction favored price regulation and the other opposed it.

No Backing Up

Informed that E. O. Thompso's, member of the Texas railroad commission, and other state officials were opposed to federal regulation of production, Administrator Johnson at a press conference had said, "There will be no backing up" on the code's provision for regulation.

Johnson said he and interior department representatives agreed "all the way down the line" in formulating the tentative code offered the oil industry.

Asked why there had been no price control provisions put into the plan Johnson said prices could not be egulated unless production was also

controlled, adding:
"When production control is established that in itself will control prices. Then the only price control needed would be a maximum to protect the public."
