

URSCHTEL KIDNAP CASE IS BEGUN

Fourteen Storm Dead and Property Damage a Million

NORTH CAROLINA RESIDENTS AIDED BY RELIEF BODY

Eleven of Dead Were Aboard Boats Off Coast

BEAUFORT, N. C., Sept. 18. (UP)—Fourteen were dead and more than \$1,000,000 in property was damaged to the extent of \$1,000,000 in the week-end hurricane on the North Carolina coast, it was indicated today.

Captain Jones Hamilton and three sons sank with a schooner, four men were washed from a barge in Alhambra Sound, three girls and a woman died at Carteret Count, a sailor was washed from a motorship and a fisherman was drowned near N. S. Head. A negro coast guardsmen was missing.

MEXICO HURRICANE DEATH TOLL MOUNTS

MEXICO, Sept. 18.—From the battered and ravaged interior of Mexico trickled delayed dispatches today carrying a mounting toll of death and damage. Reports said more than 100 had been killed.

The hurricane that struck Tampico Friday swept inland for 300 miles and burst a dam in the San Luis River at the city of San Luis Potosi, drowning at least 80 and possibly 100 persons trapped in their homes.

Reports from Tampico accounted for 37 dead and more than 150 injured. Previously the death toll at Tampico had been reported at 11.

La Pentilla, a suburb of Tampico through which the river Panuco passes, was completely submerged, water rising more than three feet in 700 houses and stores. Many buildings were smashed by the wind.

Twenty-eight passengers and members of the crew of the vessel El Golfo, mail steamer en route to Tuxpan from Tampico, were reported rescued as the vessel sank. Dispatches described scenes in which some of those rescued attempted to commit suicide by shooting themselves.

Several skiffs attempted to cross the Panuco River at the height of the storm and eight persons were drowned. The skiffs were crushed on the rocks in high seas. The crew attempted to swim ashore. Three were drowned and five were saved.

A launch en route to Tampico was swamped within sight of the customs house. Four passengers and three of the crew were drowned.

Two tugboats anchored in port sank, drowning four watchmen. Life saving crews reported dragging from Lake Carpintero, near the river Teme fifteen bodies.

Tampico was isolated, all communications being interrupted, no planes, lighting and no railroad facilities available.

At San Luis Potosi the water poured into a low section of the city, trapping men, women and children in their homes. Others fled in panic to higher ground. Refugees were being cared for in the Municipal Building and in a theatre.

The number of homes in the path of the storm could not be estimated today, but last night had reached a reported total of several thousand. Property losses were reported to run into the millions of dollars.

The banana crop at Tuxpan, south of Tampico, was reported totally destroyed at a loss of \$2,000,000.

ROUNTREE WINS; GETS NO MONEY

EL PASO.—After being out 23 1/2 hours, a 41st district court jury Saturday returned a verdict of \$17,500 for J. Paul Rountree in his suit against the El Paso Electric company for \$35,000, and then took it away from him.

The jury found that the automobile in which Rountree was riding and which was struck by a street car was being driven at a dangerous rate of speed and the driver had failed to "keep a proper lookout."

The testimony was that C. K. Bell was driving the automobile. Rountree, automobile salesman, was demonstrating the auto and had turned it over to Bell to drive.

The case has been tried. The first jury returned Rountree a verdict of \$18,500. The electric company was given a new trial. The amount of the second verdict, which Rountree will not see, was \$1000 less than the first one.

Fletcher Injured In Traffic Crash

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18. (UP)—Chairman Fletcher of the senate banking and currency committee was injured today while en route to the capitol when his limousine collided with a delivery truck. His condition was not believed serious.

MORE THAN HALF POPULATION OF NATION REPRESENTED IN VOTE OF FIRST 29 STATES ON REPEAL ISSUE

NEW YORK, Sept. 18. (UP)—The 29 states which have approved repeal of the 18th amendment represent 58.8 per cent of the total population of the United States, a tabulation of their vote showed today.

Ten more states will vote on repeal between now and Nov. 7, bringing the total number of states passing on the 21st (repeal) amendment to 39, three more than the necessary two-thirds. Observers believe national prohibition will die Dec. 6, when the 36th state convention is held.

New Mexico and Idaho voted Tuesday, Virginia votes Oct. 3; Florida, Oct. 10; Ohio, Pennsylvania, North and South Carolina, Utah, and Kentucky, Nov. 7.

Harvey Bailey, Farm Boy, Turns Outlaw; Becomes No. 1 Bad Man

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first of two stories on the career of Harvey Bailey, notorious criminal and outlaw, who faces trial for kidnaping at Oklahoma City today.

It's a far cry from the prosaic life of a farm boy in the quiet hills of northern Missouri to that of "the most dangerous criminal in the nation," but Harvey Bailey has traveled that road and now, at 43, the law has closed in on his career of crime which has been the most spectacular the southwest has known since the days of Jesse James.

Chained to an iron cot in a cell in Oklahoma City's jail is this super-desperado, kidnap, jail breaker, machine gun killer and bank robber who is the prize catch in the federal government's new war on crime. He faces trial in federal court there on Sept. 18 for the kidnaping of Charles F. Urschel, Oklahoma oil millionaire, for whose release a ransom of \$200,000 is said to have been paid.

Uncle Sam, warned by Bailey's recent single-handed escape from a death cell in the Dallas, Tex., jail, is taking no chances this time. Not only Bailey handcuffed and shackled in such a manner that he can hardly move, but guards armed with machine guns surround the jail to prevent any possibility of Bailey's escape or his rescue by members of his band.

Looks Bad for Bailey. And what sort of a man is this Bailey—who is accused as the "brains" of a huge kidnap ring, even suspected in the Urschel case, who has been identified as the ringleader in the biggest bank robbery on record and as a machine gun killer in the Kansas City Union Station massacre and four officers and who was the leader of the daring break of 11 convicts from the Kansas state penitentiary last Memorial Day?

When Harvey Bailey is brought into court at Oklahoma City today to answer for the Urschel kidnaping, spectators and jury will see a man far different from the type that would be implied by his reputation as "the most dangerous criminal in the nation"—the description given him by Asst. U. S. Atty-Gen. Joseph B. Keenan, in charge of the federal government's war on the underworld.

Country Boy—Gone Wrong. Instead of a shifty, cowering bandit they will see a big, powerful man with graying hair and a bland smile. Attired in a tuxedo, he could easily fit into any social event and himself perfect for the home in the role of a golf togeth.

He would make a good companion for a foursome for he loves the game and plays it well.

Bailey's life story is another epic of crime. His father and mother still till the small farm on which he was born and where he grew up as a big, good-natured boy who always did well in school and made friends with everybody. He left home at an early age to take a fireman's job on a railroad.

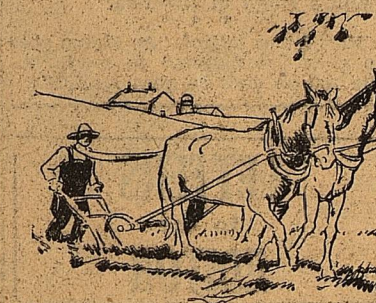
War Buddies Swerved Course. The World War came along and Bailey joined the army and went to the front. That's where he learned to play the machine gun—and there he met some young recruits from Chicago who were to play a big part in his life later on. With them, he formed some fast friendships.

Home from the war Bailey came, no longer a former boy or a young railroad fireman, but a six-foot man, weighing more than 200 pounds and well seasoned for whatever the world had to offer. After a time on the farm, Bailey developed a desire to see some of his war-time buddies. So he bought a one-way ticket for Chicago and at this point his whole career turned.

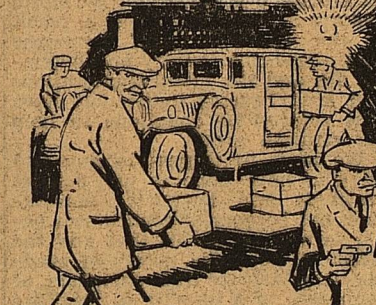
Run Runner to Gangster. In Chicago, Bailey found his former army acquaintances engaged in underworld pursuits and through them began his criminal career. He became a liquor runner for a "syndicate," smuggling whiskey from Canada by motor, and made money fast. His inherent traits of leadership soon manifested themselves and he rose rapidly to a position of power among Chicago's gangsters.

Though a member of the underworld, Bailey liked to play the part of a gentleman. His excellent English—which he seldom drops for underworld slang—stood him in good stead when he donned his golf knickers and appeared at some of the most exclusive courses in the city. He liked to live at good hotels and put on all the outward appearances of wealth and refinement.

By 1929, Bailey was deep in the secrets of Chicago's gang leaders and in February of that year came the St. Valentine Day massacre in which seven gangsters were lined up against a garage wall and

NRA COMPLIANCE BOARD MEETING CALLED TUESDAY

Organization of the Midland NRA compliance board will be completed Tuesday morning at 9:30 at the chamber of commerce office.

Employers and employees in industry, that is labor representatives, employers and employees in wholesale and retail lines, consumers, and lawyers are asked to attend a meeting, which can be concluded in a half hour.

Seven members of the NRA compliance board are to be elected as follows: an employe in industry, an employe in retail or wholesale trade, an employer in industry, an employe in retail or wholesale trade, a consumer, a lawyer, and a permanent chairman.

This compliance board will hear complaints of alleged violations of NRA. The board will be expected to confer with any alleged violators of NRA, and may report infractions of the regulations to Washington, if unable to reach a satisfactory agreement locally.

This is a general meeting to which the public is invited, but particularly are business men, clerks and laborers invited.

HOUSE TO SIGN QUESTIONNAIRE

AUSTIN, Sept. 18. (UP)—The house today voted 110 to 15 authorizing a committee to draft a questionnaire which all members will be required to answer under oath, giving trade, occupation or profession and from whom they have received a salary or retainer since they became members of the legislature.

Under the resolution a report would be given to the press showing results of the questionnaire. State department heads were barred from the floor during the special session because of alleged efforts made to get appropriations and to get salaries raised.

GROUNDS AROUND COURT BRISTLE WITH MANY GUNS

Whole Day Likely to Be Required for Getting Jury

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 18.—(UP)—Examination of jurors indicated a full day is needed to select the 12 for the trial of 11 men and women in the Urschel kidnap case.

Assistant United States Attorney General Joseph B. Keenan warned that any attorney or others caught accepting money for tampering will be prosecuted as accessories.

Federal Judge Edgar S. Vaughn was guarded as he entered the court.

Sixteen armed federal agents ushered in Urschel.

The federal building is surrounded by machine guns and guards.

Harvey Bailey and Albert Bates entered calmly.

It was indicated the state will seek conviction for R. G. Shannon, his wife and son, as government attorneys questioned whether prospective jurors were farmers or were familiar with farm life.

The other seven defendants from the Twin Cities were present. George Kelly, hunted bandit, and his wife were reported here last night.

BEER HEADLINER IN TEXAS TRADE REVIEW FOR WEEK

DALLAS (UP)—Return of beer to Texas after 16 years absence stimulated widely divergent trades heading the week's business news.

Numerous branches of business benefited directly as wholesalers, companies, motor truck and automobile distributors, hotel and household fixtures and supply companies and novelty line firms.

The Texas authority estimated from 50 to 75 new motor trucks were bought for beer distributors here. One company bought five large motor trucks, the 18 or 20 other large distributors bought trucks as large or with smaller load capacities.

The largest wholesale hotel and household supply company in Dallas reported two cartloads of beer steins had been sold before the legalization of beer. Its line of counters, fountain equipments and similar stock was depleted quickly.

Newspapers, bill board and card advertising mounted quickly after sale of beer began.

In the novelty lines, companies handling steins, portable iceboxes and other drinking accessories reported good sales.

The business report, however, was not one entirely dominated by the return of beer.

The Texas mohair yield has been predicted to total 6,500,000 pounds. Farmers have sold but 375,000 pounds and are holding their yields for higher prices. A minimum of 40 cents for adult mohair and corresponding higher prices for kid mohair is looked forward to by farmers.

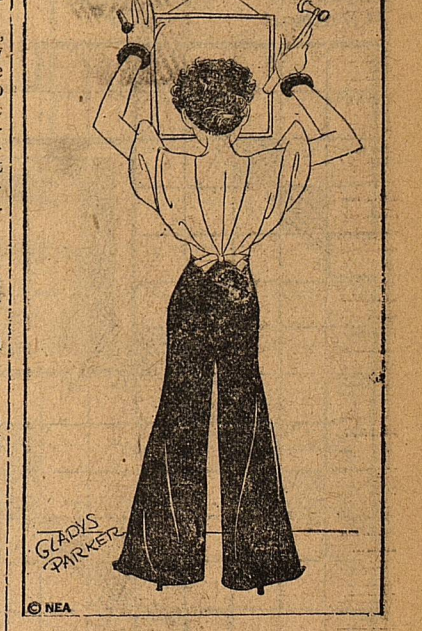

A 'NEW WORLD' IS WELCOME

Prof. Philip Cabot of Harvard tells the state convention of the Pennsylvania Electric Association that the powers bestowed on the U. S. government under the NRA program must be terminated at the earliest possible moment if the American people wish to continue the governmental forms to which they have been accustomed.

As temporary measures, Prof. Cabot says, the various emergency acts have much to commend them. But, he continues, "if we allow ourselves to be lulled to sleep by radio addresses of the president about the new deal and appeals for co-operation by the national administrator we may wake up some morning in a new world."
