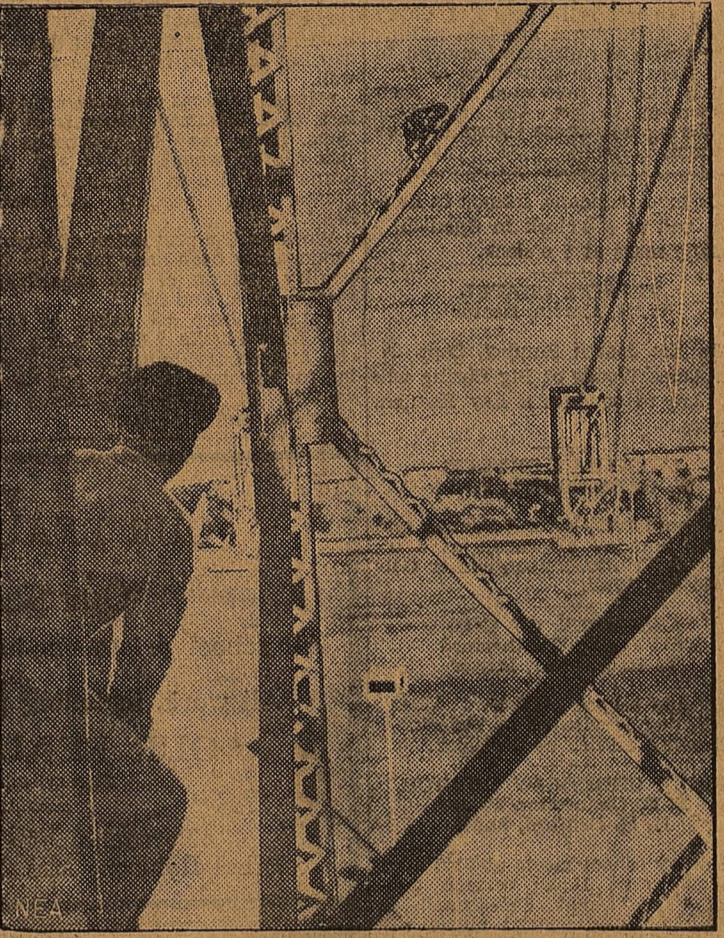

SECURITIES LAW SAVES

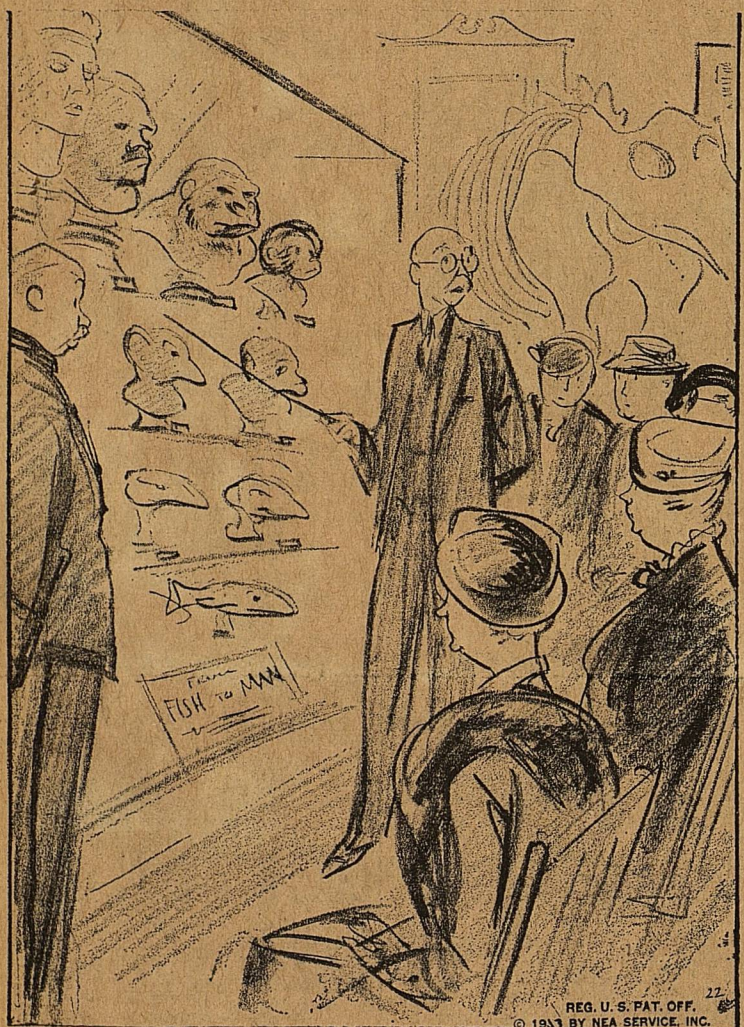
Dispatches from Washington indicate that the new "truth in securities" law, passed by the last Congress amid wails from the financial district, has already saved American investors a good many millions of dollars.

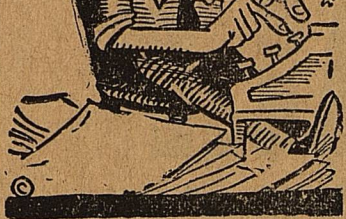

Slipped Tendons in Fowls Noticed Here

Farmers and poultry raisers in this section of West Texas have been bothered lately that their flocks have been bothered with slipped tendons, causing them to be unable to walk well.

Slipped tendons are caused by the lack of a balanced minerals in rations. They may be prevented by using gray wheat shorts and rice bran and lesser amounts of oat groats, and possibly cottonseed meal.

Work on the prevention of slipped tendons has been done lately by the poultry division of the experiment station at A. and M.

Farmers here are asked to consult Miss Myrtle Miller, home agent, and request bulletins on "Feeding for Efficient Growth" and "Prevention of Slipped Tendons in Chickens and Turkeys."

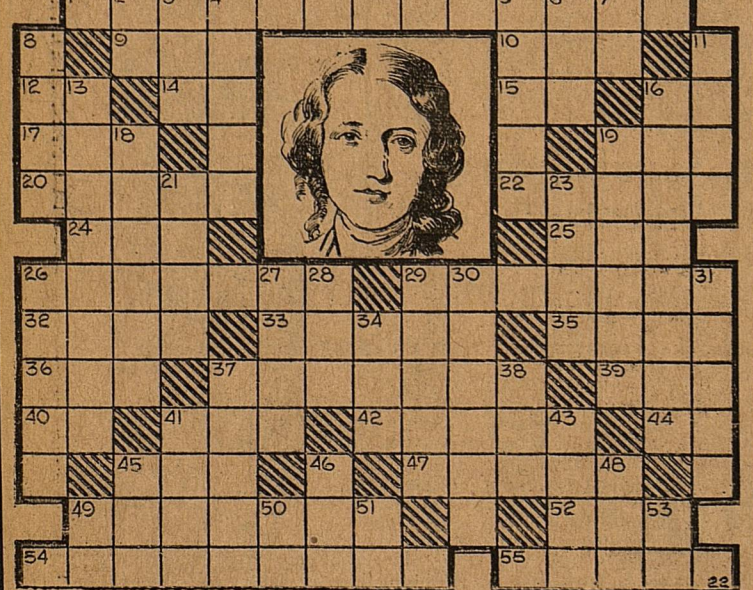
