Rahutis, twice summoned before the Gary advisory board, failed to appear. His employes charged that he violated hour and wage provisions of the restaurant code. Rahutis denied these charges when Gen. Hugh Johnson withdrew his right to the insigna.

TALONS OF BLUE **EAGLE STRANGLE**

WASHINGTON.—The nether portion of the Blue Eagle is symbolic of the penalties provided for in the national recovery act, as demonstrated in the case of Theodore G. Rahutis, restaurant man of Gary Ind., first to be deprived of the NRA insignia.

H. S. Norton, chairman of the Gary Compliance board, reported that every one of Rahutis' 40 employees sustained in affidavit form repeated charges that he was vioating both the maximum-hour and minimum - wage provisions of the president's agreement he had signed. One employee was required to work 21 hours in 2 days at 14 cents

On August 31 he was notified by the local board that "there must be some misunderstanding on your part of the agreement as modified for the restaurant business." He failed to respond to an invitation to a conference and, according to the board complaints kept pouring in from his employees. In his absence, another notice was handed to sence, another notice was handed to Mrs. Rahutis and a third and final formal warning was served on him personally, which read in part: "We hope you welcome this opportunity to make a voluntary statement. If complaints are unfounded, they should be disposed of, so there is no applications of the complaints are unfounded."

Rep. Stubbeman, who was a member of the legislature for the first time, having been elected to fill the place vacated by the late Rep. B. Frank Haag of Midland, explained that the special session was called for a three-fold purpose: to vote a relief bond isssue; to amend the anti-trust laws, and to place before the law-makers a proposal to put a refrigerator in the governor's mansion.

All were attended to. The first house bill that passed provided for \$5,000,000 for relief bonds; the first senate bill was for \$6,000,000. The difference was split in free conference committee, and the conference bill adopted in both houses. The anti-trust bill was adopted to provide that defendants cited to appear and answer charges of anti-trust law violation should have a "defense" in NRA compliasance





A DICTATOR'S SECURITY

The new order of the Hitler government controlling the newspapers gives you a pretty good idea of the way a dictatorship works to cut off all possible public criticism

Under this order, all publications unreservedly must uphold the rightness of the Hitler regime. All pretense that they are organs of free opinions is dropped. They become, quite avowedly, propaganda mechanisms. Writers or editor who publish articles in defiance of this law 6. can be sentenced to death.

To get a notion of the way such a law works, imagine it in operation in this country today. No newspaper would dare criticize any aspect of the NRA program. No article intimating that there was the slightest defect in the program ever could be printed. If Mr. Roosevelt intervened in Cuba, no publication could do anything but applaud; if Mr. Farley over-reached himself in putting deserving Democrats in office, nobody could do so much as peep

Those who say we have a dictatorship in America might ponder about the things that go with a genuine European-style dictatorship. As long as we have a free press, we are safe.
