DOLLAR CRUDE LIKELY WHEN **CODE GOVERNS**

Base Crude Price Is Deemed Likely by Oil Leaders

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1. (UP).— A dollar a barrel minimum crude price today appeared likely as memprice today appeared likely as members of the coordinating committee prepared to begin an industry administration Saturday, when the code becomes effective.

A report on control plans was ready for Secretary Ickes today, the committee indicated.

Authoritative sources indicated a base crude price instead of one for gasoline would be included. The base price would be established for 90 days.

With their immediate objective With their immediate objective understood to be a fixed price that would assure at least one dollar a barrel for crude petrolum, the new board of directors for the oil industry yesterday formally began its endeavors to find a solution to the problems of price and production control.

Meeting for their first time with Secretary Ickes, the oil administrator, members of the planning and coordinating committee set up under the NRA trade code moved swiftly to have a plan ready for Saturday when the code takes effect.

Before them were the basic topics of how far the government should go immediately in fixing prices and the allocation of national demand so that uncertainty resulting from unchecked flow of crude to market could be ended.

A base price of between five and six cents a gallon for gasoline at the cost of a barrel of crude by would be pegged under the ode's price section, was said reliably to be in prospect under preent administration plans.

Whether it would be recommended at once or a few days would elapse in which production control machinery could be set up formed one of the questions the committee had before it with some favoring a delay.

The present price of gasoline at refinery, that would form the base, runs around 4 i-2 cents, indicating that setting the base proposed might cause retail gasoline prices to be advanced a cent or a cent and a half to help meet increased costs of supplies to distributors.

Under the code, a barrel of crude oil of a set quality (60-36 Mid-Continent gravity) shall be set at 18.5 times the price of a gallon of gasoline of fixed quality (60-64 Octane rating) with President Roosevelt authorized to fix the base price of the gasoline for a test period.

The prices of other grades of crude oil and gasoline would be more or less than the fixed sum, in accordance with their relation to the quality bases, but would remain in an 18.5 ratio to each other.



The young woman's body was found Thursday in a cotton field in eastern Dallas county. She had been shot through the heart and it appeared that she had been beaten

appeared that she had been beaten brutally.

Assistant District Attorney Henry Tirey, immediately after confessions had been obtained from the two negro suspects, summoned the grand jury into session to investigate the case. The indictments were returned in less than three hours after the jury began questioning witnesses.

Although the negroes also admitted shooting and critically wounding Mace Carver, 27, escort of Miss Prince, the grand jury took no action in this assault to murder case. Carver is in a critical condition at a Dallas hospital with gunshot wounds in the neck and right wrist. Indications were that the negroes would be brought to trial next

Tuesday.

The double shooting occurred last night after Carver and Miss Prince had parked on the road. They were sitting in Carver's car playing the radio when the negroes slipped up. One of the negroes was armed with a nightle

pistol.
Boarding the car, the negroes drove about the country for 15 or 20 minutes, then stopped and ordered the couple out. Carver was taken into a patch of woods by one of the negroes and shot down. He was left in the woods and was not found until several hours later.

The negroes were taken before the grand jury Thursday night, hand-cuffed and chained. Heavy guards were stationed around the courthouse as a precaution against any possible action against the negroes by friends and relatives of the vic-
