# **ROOSEVELT IS BOLD IN TALK**

No Special Concessions Can Be Given, Says

CHICAGO, Oct. 2, (UP).—President Roosevelt in a bold address to 30,000 legionnaires said that the noncombatant veterans must take his chances with other citizens in earning a living.

He insisted that three principles are imperative if the country is to thrive: governmental responsibility for those injured and diseased in the war, no special class beneficiaries over and above all other citizens; federal aid for onconnected service disability case only when all other agencies fait.

The president assured those at the convention that the people of the nationa will pay taxes to carry out nationa will pay taxes to carry out these principles and that the principles would not bankrupt "your government nor throw its bookkeeping into the red." He thanked the legion for its loyalty and service and appealed for unity and elimination of sectionalism and class.

One of the queer things about American politics, when you stop to think about it, is the habit we seem to have developed in the last few years of making up our minds on things all in a bunch.


The current vote on prohibition repeal is an exam-

# NRA Programs Cause Good Care of Teeth

WASHINGTON, (UP).—Credit for marked increase in the number patients treated at Georgeclinics here is given to the NRA by university officials.

Records of the clinics indicate that people have been thinking more of their own well-being and of their teeth in the past two months than they have been for some time, says Dean William N. Cagon of the Georgetown Dental

FORT WORTH (UP).—A plan to reduce dairy cattle herds in Texas and the United States in an effort to stabilize the milk trade has been proposed by Dr. Lewis C. Crabb, chief veterinarian of the state livestock sanitary commission.

Crabb's proposal, forwarded to Secretary of Agriculture Wallace, calls for slaughter or disposal of all diseased cattle and all cattle which do not give sufficient milk to return a profit in normal times.
