#### POORHOUSES MAY GO

You can get a notion of what a federal old-age pension law might accomplish by looking at the program drawn up by Ohio authorities, who are administering a new state old-age pension law.

Just now they are classifying all occupants of poorhouses, to see how many of them are eligible for such pensions. Before long, thousands of these pitiful old paupers will be out of the poorhouses, living self-respecting lives in their own communities. Eventually, the authorities believe, the poorhouses can be largely abolished.

Such a program has two great advantages. It is infinitely kinder to the aged themselves—and it is cheaper for the community as a whole. To embody the old-age pension plan in federal law would be to take a vast step forward.

#### A MUCH OVER-RATED "MENACE"

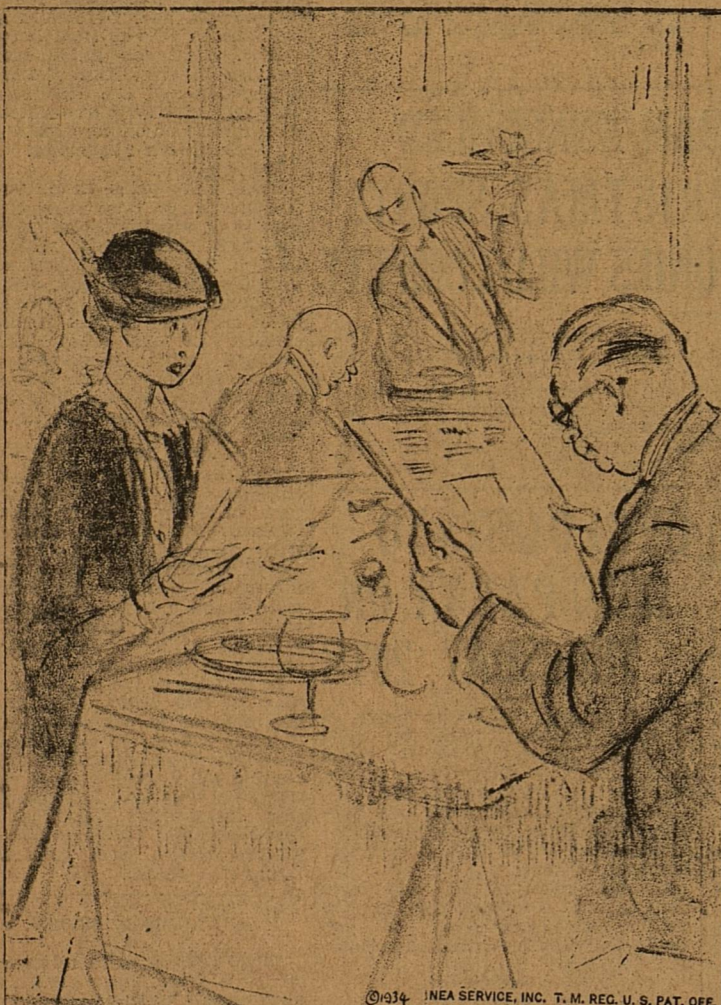
Fully 1,500,000 Communists and active sympathizers with Communism are working now to overthrow the American government and the American social and economic system, according to a warning issued by E. R. West, president of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Since it took only about 150,000 such revolutionists to accomplish the overthrow of the Kerensky government in 1918, Mr. West feels that this represents a pretty alarming menace to American institutions.

It is a little hard to share his fear, for two reasons. First, it is pretty clear that this estimate of Communist strength is greatly exaggerated. Second, the 150,000 Reds who upset Kerensky had a different medium in which to operate than American revolutionists have.


They lived in a society which had proved its own bankruptcy beyond dispute, and the overwhelming majority of Russians were so desperate that they preferred to try the wildest experiment rather than remain as they were. That isn't even remotely true in America today; until it is, the Communist "menace" can't be very alarming.

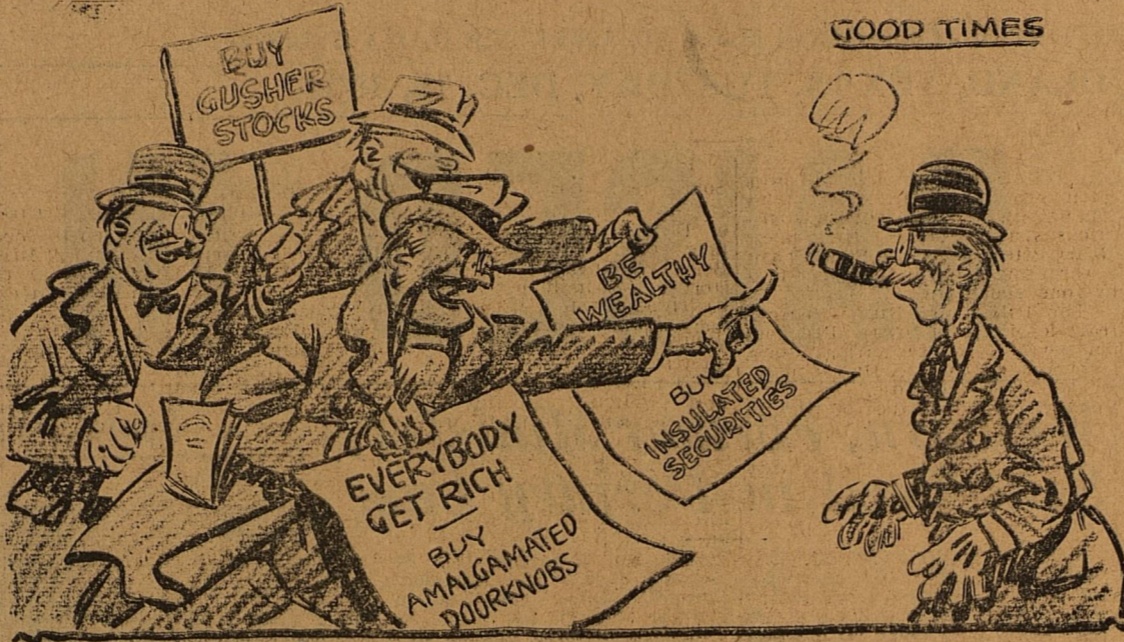

AKRON, O. (U.P.)—State Representative Gus Kasch, champion bill-introducer in Ohio's General







### Outlaw Horse at Brady Okay; Two Cars Go to Army

BRADY (AP)—Two carloads of cavalry horses, representing a revenue of about \$10,000 to local ranchmen, have been shipped from Brady to Fort Reno, Oklahoma.

These horses were purchased by Major E. C. Conant and Captain H. A. Fudge, who spent a week here reconnoitering local ranches for good saddle horses for the Cavalry Service of the United States Army at Fort Reno.

One carload was purchased from Ben Strickland, manager of the White and Strickland Polo Farms and C. T. White and Ed Gibbons, local ranchmen, while the other carload was selected from a number of other ranches in the immediate vicinity of Brady. A total of forty-six horses was included in the two shipments.

Other West Texas counties contributed fifty equestrian candidates for the Fort Reno Cavalry post.

On a previous trip in September, Major Conant and Captain Fudge purchased eighty-eight West Texas horses.

"We are buying one thousand horses in Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas," Major Conant said. "We have been buying horses here for many years and many of our best saddle and polo horses came from this section."

Major Conant, one of the army's best judges of horseflesh, was particularly enthusiastic about an 8-year-old "bronc" purchased from White and Strickland on this trip. "Why didn't you show us this animal?" Conant asked Strickland when he spied it in another pen.

"Didn't think you would want it," was Strickland's reply, explaining that this streak of wild horseflesh, although of good ancestry, never had tolerated as much as a rope around its neck.

"The army can train it," Conant said and purchased the nag, 16.1 hands high and weighing about 1,175 pounds.

"Unless I miss my guess, it will develop into one of the best show horses in army stables," he commented.

"Slippery Sam," crack winner of jumping records in the best horse shows of America and a prospective member of the 1936 Olympic team, was bought under similar circumstances from the L. S. McDowell ranch near Big Spring several years ago.

"We just happened to spy this 'cow pony' and recognized its possibilities," Conant remarked, confident in his judgment of "horseflesh in the raw."

Progress in horse breeding during the past two decades has kept pace with that of the automobile industry, the two army officers declared.

The United States government has played an important part in the development of improved stock through encouragement by its extensive buying program of good horses and by placing remount stations in the best horse producing sections.

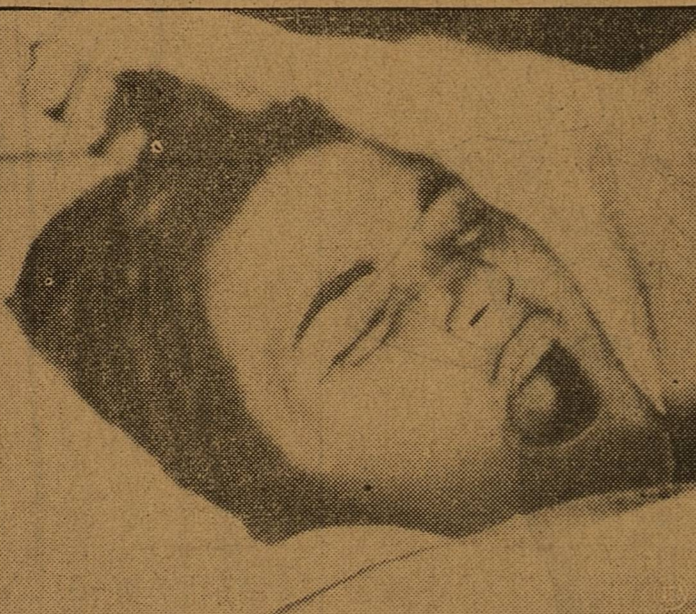

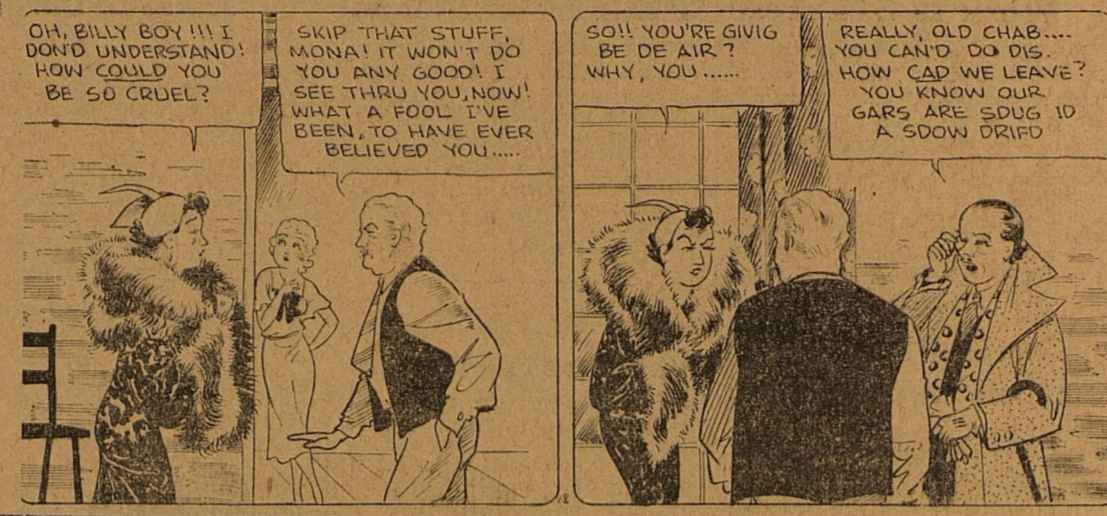
INDUSTRY SHOWS INCREASE
