Texas Cops Hunt Gas Tax Evaders

AUSTIN.—Motorcycle patrolmen with Texas highways day and night stopping trucks suspected of carrying bootleg gasoline. Refinery storage tanks are checked constantly to insure correct recording of gasoline produced and shipped. Both distributors and dealers are required to keep complete records of oil and gasoline bought, sold or shipped and these records open to inspection by the state's motor fuel tax division.

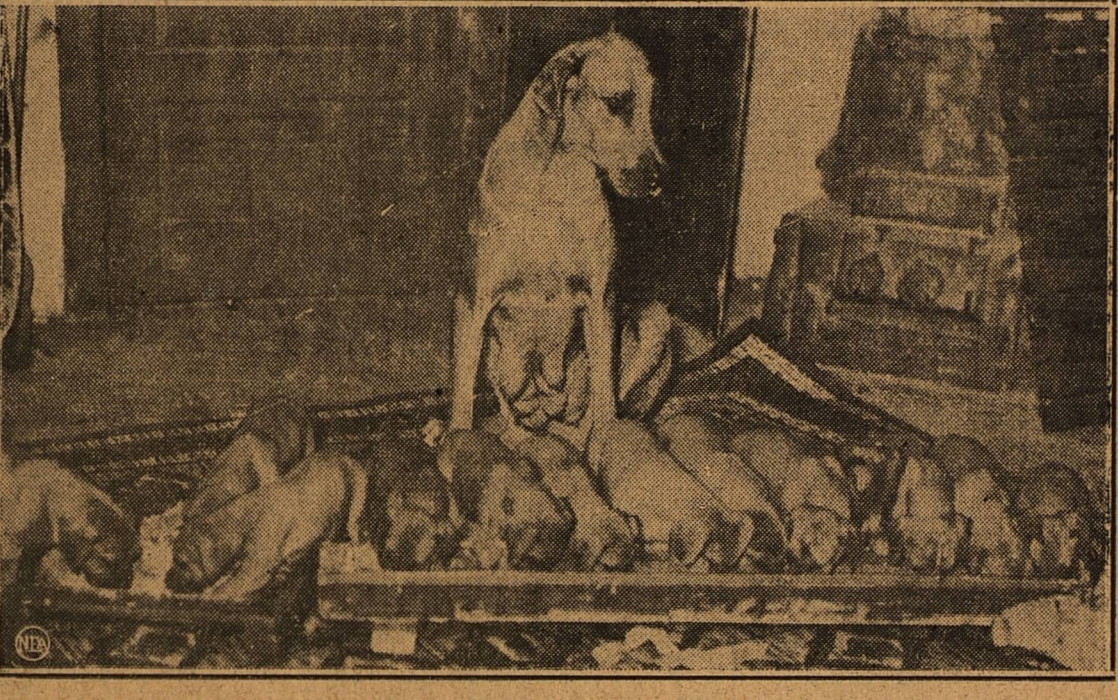
CATTLE FOR SALE TO GOVERNMENT ORDERED TO STOCK PENS TOMORROW

TULSA, Dec. 11. (AP)—Homer F. Wilcox Jr., 17, son of an oil millionaire, pleaded guilty today to charges of malicious mischief and was fined \$75. The charges were brought in connection with shooting out street lights near the place where John Correll Jr., dental student, was found slain Thanksgiving day allegedly by Phillip Kenamer, son of a United States district judge.

Great Britain Turns Down Suggestion for Parley

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11. (AP)—Great Britain not only is defaulting on the war debt payment due the United States Friday but is turning down a suggestion from Washington to talk over prospects of a debt agreement, it was revealed in a speech by Neville Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer, in the house of commons today.

Big Spring Is Made Health Headquarters

BIG SPRING.—R. G. Tulleck, district engineer for the U. S. department of health service, has been stationed in Big Spring for the purpose of organizing county health units in 26 West Texas counties. Big Spring will be health headquarters for this health program according to Mr. Tulleck.

HEAR BOND CASES

The cases were filed here, but were transferred to Houston for hearings.

FARMERS, BALLOTING FRIDAY, HOLD FATE OF THE BANKHEAD COTTON ACT

Cotton farmers, present and future, of Midland county will go to the polls Friday, along with those of the nation's entire cotton producing area, to settle once and for all the question of retention of compulsory production control from June 1, 1935 to May 1, 1936. Two election boxes will be used in Midland county, one at the court house here and the other at Stokes school. A total of 850 ballots have been received by the county agricultural agent's office for use in Midland and Martin counties but additional supplies were expected in ample time.

LANSING, Mich., Dec. 11. (AP)—More than 20 persons died in a fire which swept the Hotel Kerns here just before dawn today, it was estimated by police and fire department officials.

High Line to Red Bluff Is Completed

PECOS, Tex. (AP)—The 44-mile electric high tension line just completed for the Red Bluff Water Power Control district from Pecos to the site of the Red Bluff dam by L. E. Myers and Sons, contractors of Dallas, represents the most modern electrical equipment in the world and the line is regarded as the most modern power line in the world. It cost approximately \$68,000. Controls are automatic.

LSU EDITOR DROPPED

BATON ROUGE, La., Dec. 6. (AP)—Jesse H. Cutrer of Kentwood, La., resigned editor of the Reveille, Louisiana State University campus paper, was dismissed from the university in the row over the censorship against publication of criticisms of Senator Huey Long, a supervisor of L. S. U.

FINDS ANCIENT RECORDS

DALHART, (AP)—Men roamed the great plains of what is now Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Kansas, and Colorado more than 50,000 years ago according to evidence found in the studies of John McCarty, Dalhart editor, and Floyd W. Studer, paleontologist. The investigators say that their exhibits include weapons and tools dating back to the fourth glacial age. Polson points, which are flint weapons of extreme age, are included in their findings.



"The young man who wishes to give all his time and energy to sports is quite entitled to do so, if he can afford it," says President Angell, "but he has no place in a really reputable college where intellectual development is the primary concern.

"A college institution of which this is not true is a traitor to its trust."

This provides about as good a yardstick for the measurement of "overemphasis" as you could wish. College, in other words, is a place for study, and football is a game the students plan in their spare time, for fun.

The college which enrolls students who are there primarily to play football, and who accept college work as a necessary evil, is, as President Angell says, being false to its trust.

Nothing is worse for the complexion than a cold. Aside from the fact that your nose gets red and your eyes look swollen, you'll notice sallowness and a dragged-down appearance. If you value your beauty as well as your health, better take special care not to get a cold. You need an adequate amount of sleep, for instance. When you feel the slightest soreness in your throat or a heavy, uncomfortable feeling in your nose and head, plan to get nine hours sleep each night for a week. Drink ten glasses of water a day and watch your diet. Naturally, it's a good idea to see your doctor.

Don't forget to take some exercise. If you don't walk, ride or go straight-up exercises in the morning. They stimulate circulation and help the digestive tract to function properly.

If you take a warm bath in the morning, finish with a cold shower. Wear warm clothes, of course but be sure they're loose and comfortable. Coat sleeves that are too tight, a dress with an uncomfortable neckline and gloves that pinch the hands can make you more tired than you realize.

Get plenty of fresh air during the day and sleep with the windows open at night. However, don't let air from the open window blow directly on your head. If you can't move the bed away from the window, use a screen or a curtain.

Miss Roberti feels free to admit that she doesn't rise early. She'd much rather sleep and she does whenever she has the opportunity.

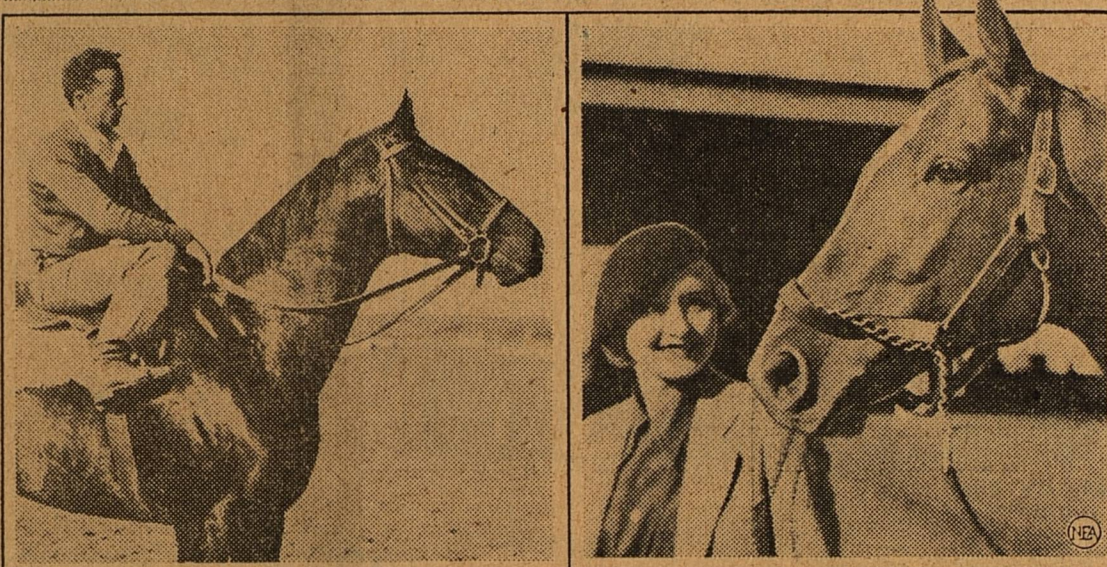
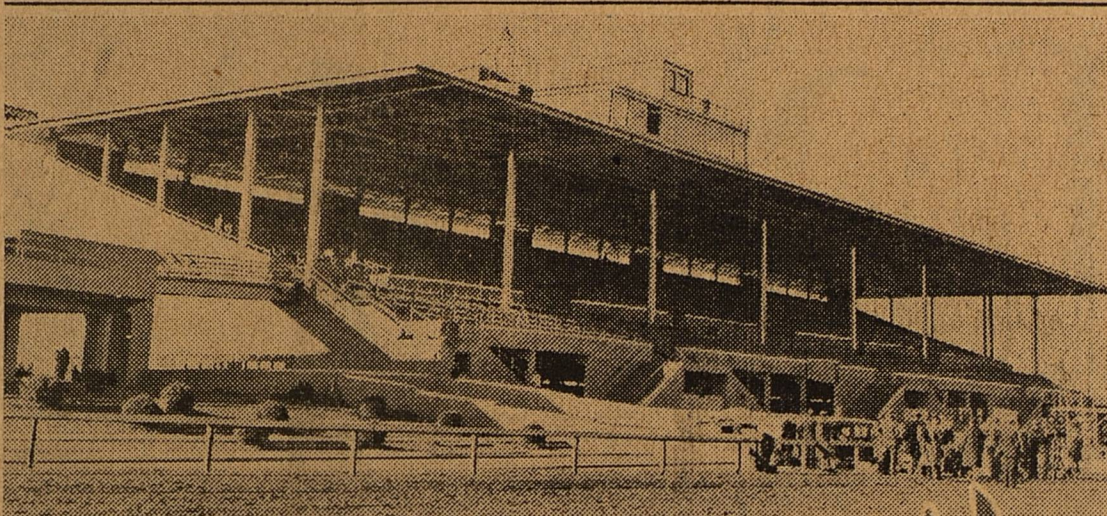
