Hauptmann Goes to Trial in Bronx County Oct. 11

ALIENISTS PLAN TO EXAMINE HIM THIS AFTERNOON

Officers Deny Story Printed in New Jersey Paper

NEW YORK, Oct. 3, (U.R)-Bruno Hauptmann will go to trial Oct. 11 in the Bronx county court on

in the Bronx county court on charges of extortion of \$50,000 from Col. Charles Lindbergh, unless New Jersey moves to extradite him for prosecution on more serious charges.

Six alienists, two for Bronx county, New York, and two for the defense, will examine Hauptmann today to determine his sanity. Their opinions have no legal standing, and effect on New Jersey's extradition plain.







WELLINGTON. (P).—The Samnorwood Rural High School, largest rural school district in Texas and probably in the nation, has opened its first tarm. probably in the nation, has opened its first term.

Composed of seven former rural schools in Collingsworth county, the district has an area of 155½ square miles and a scholastic census of over 600. Valuation of the district has been set at \$1,012,408. Three busses transport pupils to and from school

A staff of 21 teachers serve the new school, which offers a complete four-year high school course.

The school buildings are located in the center of the district on a 10-acre plot. The new building, which cost less than \$25,000, recently was submitted to the board of trustees and was accepted.


In addition to the main building, the district has seven brick buildings formerly used by the schools that were combined to create "the largest rural school district" in the largest state.

Days of "School Marm" About Gone

AUSTIN. (P).—College graduates, capable of taking charge of some extra-curricular activity, are displacing the less versatile "school marms" of yesteryear.

"I have had no difficulty in placing any teacher with a degree who could do something besides teach." said Miss Miriam Dozler of the University of Texas Teachers' appointment committee.

After analyzing demands of Texas schools for 1,000 teachers, Miss Dozler decided:

"That there is apparently a great need for teachers who can assume direction of some extra-curricular activity, such as playground work, music, dramatics, etc. They will find little difficulty in obtaining a place.

"More and more schools are willing to employ inexperienced teachers, provided they hold degrees and can 'do something' besides teach. "The teacher is needed outside the classroom as well as in it."

With these principles guiding selections, Miss Dozier placed one-third more teachers this year than last. But she attributed the high-rate of turn-over to other causes. The chief reasons she ascribed were the transfer of employed teachers to government work and the strengthening of teaching requirements.

To some extent teachers were influenced to seek other employment or obtain leaves of absence because of enactment of a law requiring all teachers in the State Public School system to hold degrees, or, if employed, to continue work toward a degree. The act motivated many schools to prohibit employment of teachers without degrees, Miss Dozier said.

Another contributing factor was adoption of rules in many schools prohibiting married women from serving as teachers.

Despite the increased demand, many schools offered neither substantial salaries nor assurance of payment, she said. Schools receiving state aid, however, were required to keep salaries at stated levels.

Most of the 1,000 positions in which the committee placed teachers offered salaries ranging from \$80 to \$100 a month.

Primary teachers were in greatest demand. Numerous requests were made for teachers of home economics, English and Spanish. The demand for athletic coaches was brisk.
