

AUSTIN, Sept. 17. (U.P.)—General election day will not pass in Texas this year with the usual perfunctory yote. Not that any fear is felt by democrats that its state ticket will democrate that its state ticket will the second second

Eight sweeping changes in the state constitution will get approval or be rejected Nov. 6. They are: a limit on taxation; different tax rate for real estate and other property; abolishment of the fee system; combination of counties; salary fixing powers for county governments; taxation of the University of Texas' vast land areas; four year terms for municipal officers; and right of cities to change their charters annually.

The tax limit amendment pegs at \$11.25 per person the total amount of revenue the state may collect annually from taxes, licenses, permits and fees. Based on 6,000,000 population, that is approximately what the state collected from such sources in 1933. The \$68,000,000, so collected, left a big state deficit. Municipalities are especially interested in two proposals that will be voted upon. One makes it possible to have three or four year city terms of office, instead of two years; the other permits charter cities to amend their charters annually instead of biennially.


TRAGIC PROMOTION







Line Dredge Sunk In Channel Raised

GALVESTON. (A).—Linde Dredge

GALVESTON. (P).—Linde Dredge No. 5 of the Linde Dredging company, which sank in the Bolivar ferry channel during the recent gulf storm, has been raised and delivered to the dredging company.

Work of dredging the channel which leads to the Fort Travis landing of the Galveston-Bolivar ferry will be resumed within 10 days.

A new \$65,000 barge was used by the D. M. Picton company of Port Arthur in raising the dredge, which was practically undamaged.

Contract for dredging the federal government's portion of the ferry channel to the harbor line was awarded to the Linde company several weeks ago and the dredge had been engaged in work culy one day when it was sunk. All men aboard

After completing the channel dredging job, the Linde No. 5 will start on a 60-day contract to build a levee on the north bank of the intracoastal canal from Port Bolivar eastward.
