A STRONGER LEAGUE

News that the council of the League of Nations has welcomed Soviet Russia as a member of the league means that this unwieldy and sometimes rather unreal inter-

national organization is ready to take a step which should properly have been taken several years ago.

Whatever the league may or may not amount to as an international force, it is at least obvious that it could never realize its full potentialities so long as it excluded one of the strongest nations on earth from membership.

With the United States staying out of its own desire. With the United States staying out, of its own desire, and Soviet Russia excluded like a card-sharper from an exclusive bridge club, the league was doomed from the beginning to be only partly effective.

Admission of the Soviet union does not, of course, mean that the league will immediately become all that neck, its founders hoped. But at least it will be operating on sounder basis than it has in the past. Part of its peculiar element of unreality will be gone.

GAINESVILLE. (A).—A mechanical cotton harvester which gives employment to cotton pickers but eliminates the back-breaking drudgery of dragging sacks through a field, has been invented, patented and successfully demonstrated on Cooke county farms, by A. E. Koon, Gainesville insurance man.

Koon's harvester, made entirely of aluminum, may be attached to any standard-make tractor. As many as seven pickers in addition to the driver may be employed in the operation of the machine.


The cotton pickers sit on seats attached to the machine, six inches from the ground, with comfortable footrests and a canopy over their heads if the day is hot. If the rotton is to be picked, the pickers merely touch the flexible aluminum tubing held in their hands to the boll, and suction from the blower operated by the tractor engine, draws the staple from the boll, into the blower where it is separated from the burrs, and thence to a trailer attached to the rear of the vehicle. If the bolls are to be pulled, they are jerked by hand and dropped into funnels attached to the tubing.
