The lottery is a game of chance which has been held
illegal throughout the United States for several decades. Federal authorities do not allow data on lotteries to be
sent through the mails; city police spend a good deal of

icy" and "numbers" games which flourish everywhere.
All this is because the people of the country generally have come to realize that a lottery costs more than

##  LIGHTING

Students have enough problems to overcome during their school careers without the added handicap of eye-strain resulting from inadequate artificial lighting. Modern school buildings usually are well equipped with proper lighting, but what of the home? Most studying is done after dark, and unless there is a good light the result is tired eyes, ruined dispositions and poor grades.

And the remedy is so simple and inexpensive. Here are a few rules for proper lighting: Each member of the family who reads or studies should have a separate reading lamp, properly shaded, so that there will be no glare. The single-socket lamps should contain a 100 -watt globe, the two-socket lamps should have two 60 -watt globes, and the three-socket lamps should be filled with three 40 -watt globes, or better, three 60 -watt globes.

The cost of adequate lighting is insignicant when it prevents eye-strain, headaches, and possibly permanent damage to young eyes.
