

SAARBRUECKEN, Jan. 14. (P).— With Germany generally conceded

With Germany generally conceded to be winner, the actual counting of ballots in yesterday's Saar Basin territory plebiscite began at 5 o'clock this afternoon.

Announcement of the result was not expected until 2 o'clock, eastern standard time, tomorrow afternoon.

Doors of the Wartburg auditorium were shut and locked, imprisoning the 140 foreigners, chosen for their neutrality, who were charged with the task of accurately tabulating the votes of more than a half million Saarlanders.

Outside, troops stood guard to assure no interruption in the counting.

ANTI-NAZI GROUP CONCEDES DEFEAT

SAARBRUECKEN, Saar Basin Territory, Jan. 14, (A)—The "Common Front" in the Saar, anti-Nezi organization opposing reunion with Germany, virtually admitted defeat for their cause at the end of voting in the plebiscite to determine the territory's future status.

Max Braun, leader of this opposition, said he would protest to the League Council that the plebiscite was neither "free, uninfluenced nor secret."

The ballots were cast to determine whether the Saar would be returned to Germany, become a part of France, or remain under the jurisdiction of the League of Nations.

1935 WILL HAVE TO HURRY

By BRUCE CATTON

The figures on automobile accidents for 1934, just released, make horrifying reading. To learn that our automobiles killed nearly as many Americans as German guns killed during the World War is to realize that our motor traffic situation has become one of our most pressing major problems.

And yet, terrible as the figures are, we don't really get horrified by them; we don't really realize that the problem is great.

The situation doesn't come home to us, somehow; it is someone else who gets killed, someone else who gets injured, someone else who passes through a needless tragedy. We ourselves-well, we're the lucky ones. It won't happen to us.

So we accept these traffic fatality figures with the most amazing complacence—and calmly go along rolling up a death and injury list which future generations will probably find the hardest single feature of our civilization to understand.

Suppose we start adding up the figures, to see what

Slightly more than a million people were killed or injured in auto accidents in 1934. There are approximately 25,000,000 autos in use in the United States. Figure it out for yourself. The chances are about one in 25 that you will be killed or injured in an auto accident

If some epidemic were sweeping the country at that rate, causing a million cases of illness and 36,000 deaths in 12 months, and you knew that you had one chance in 25 of catching it, wouldn't you demand that your health department take the most drastic kind of measures to get it under control?

Why, then, be so complacent about auto accidents?

Luckily, the traffic problem isn't altogether insoluble. Although the death list for the country as a whole increased by 16 per cent last year, there were a few states which actually reduced their fatality lists.

It is worth noticing that most of these states have strict financial responsibility laws—such laws as forbid there. The train had just bumped persons who have been involved in serious accidents to into a car. crive until they pay any judgments against them and prove their ability to compensate for any future damages they may cause.

They are also, in the main, states which have adequate highway patrol forces and strict drivers' license

By attacking vigorously along such lines, we may hope to reduce our traffic death list. There can be no excuse for failure to take such action.

The present situation is absolutely intolerable. A drastic and far-reaching program of preventive action is long overdue.

THE RED AND THE BLACK

Oddly enough, it is the party which is in power by the greatest majorities in recent years that shows a deficit in the party finances.

Official statements filed with the House of Representatives show the Republican party to have a surplus of \$184.76 as it enters the new year. But the Democratic party owes \$529,282, and has only about \$6000 in cash en hand to pay.

Thanks to recent contributions of \$20,000 from members of the Mellon family and \$5000 from John D. Rocke-Teller, the G. O. P. starts 1935 from financial scratch, while the Democrats must look forward to a heavy deficit as they approach the 1936 campaign. They owe more than \$60,000 to John Raskob alone.

These figures are interesting because they show clearly what everybody knew anyway: that when it comes to supporting the actual machinery of parties, both lean heavily on rich men who can make large contributions to party funds.

Figures like these will set many to wondering whether the base of support of both parties might not will be




