Expert Identifies Hauptmann Handwriting on 14 Notes

OSBORN SAYS ALL CORRESPOND WITH RECORD SAMPLES

Regarded as Strong Prosecution Link In Evidence

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jan. 11. (P). Bruno Richard Hauptmann's handwriting today was identified by Albert S. Osborn Sr., state expert, as that on all of the kidnap ransom notes received by Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh after the theft of his twenty months old baby.

Identification of the handwriting had been called by the prosecutors one of their strongest links in the chain of evidence through which they hope to send Hauptmann to the electric chair for murder of the baby.

When shown a specimen of Hauptmann's handwriting, Osborn stated: "My opinion is that the ransom notes all were written by the writer of the various papers signed (Richard Hauptmann'."

Examining all of the 14 ransom notes, Osborn said each was written by Hauptmann. This included the note found in the nursery near the empty crib.

The defense closely examined Frank Wilson, special agent in charge of the intelligence department of the United States department of internal revenue, upon the mysterious exchange of Lindbergh ransom gold notes and the subsequent suicide of J. J. Faulkner.
