TWO CHARGED IN FATAL SHOOTING MENARD RANCHER

Funeral Thursday for Tomlinson, Uncle Local Woman

MENARD, Nov. 30. (AP)—Charges of murder had been filed against H. B. Opp, West Texas ranchman, and a special guard was held over Special Ranger L. E. Trimble at a San Angelo hospital, following the death late Wednesday of Wiley Tomlinson, Menard ranchman and county commissioner.

Tomlinson was buried Thursday afternoon at Fort McKavett after services were held at his ranch home. His death followed an alleged shooting affray at the Opp ranch west of Menard Tuesday.

Trimble also was injured. Opp made bond of \$20,000 after the filing of mixed charges and it was expected that bail in similar amount would be demanded of Trimble. Walter Alexander and two sons, Hewitt and Walker Jr., were arrested as material witnesses but later released on their own recognizance.

A county attorney's statement made soon after the shooting referred to trouble arising over the camping of Tomlinson and his companions on land owned by Tomlinson. Trimble was in the employ of Opp. Witnesses were scheduled to be called before a session of the grand jury in 33rd district court Monday.

Commissioner Tomlinson of Menard is an uncle of Mrs. D. W. McCormick of Midland. The McCormick family, awaiting news of the relative's condition, late Wednesday prepared for a week-end trip to San Angelo. McCormick is employed by the Atlantic Pipe Line company.

Apparently suffering from melancholia, the girl yesterday spread towels and newspapers over her body, saturated them with rubbing alcohol, and set fire to them. She died 12 hours later in a Denton hospital.

Bulldogs Win 20-6 Over Odessa Squad

Mixing a crushing ground game with a fast and deceptive aerial attack the Midland Bulldogs continued the streak of victories over the Odessa Broncos with a 20-6 win in the Turkey Day meeting of the two clubs here.

Odessa won the toss and elected to receive and defend the north goal. Prothro kicked off to Simpson who took the ball on his own goal line and returned to his own 24 before being swarmed by a bevy of Midland tacklers. Tucker and Green alternately plowed the Midland line to pick up 15 yards before they were forced to kick. In three tries at the Odessa line they

Bulldogs lost four yards before Chandler kicked 35 yards out on the Odessa 21 yard stripe. Tucker tried to kick out and his punt was blocked and Odessa recovered on its own 8. On his next effort Tucker kicked out on his own 33.

After two line attempts and a pass had failed Coach Baumgarten sent in White and Midkiff for Jones and Walker and on the first play Midkiff shot an 18 yard pass to White to put the ball on the Odessa 15. Another pass from Midkiff, this time to McClurg placed on the Odessa 5 and on two attempts Midkiff kicked it over for the first touchdown. Midkiff went through the line for the extra point.

There was no score in the second quarter when the Broncos failed to gain in the middle of the field. Chandler was getting off some nice punts for Midland but Simpson and Green made up for their lack of distance on punts by some stirring line plunging. Odessa rang up three first downs this period to none for Midland.

Midland kicked off to Odessa to start the third period and after exchanging punts a couple of times Manning intercepted one of Tucker's passes on the Odessa 36. With Midkiff and Chandler alternately plunging off the Odessa backfield the ball was advanced to the Odessa 20 and a forward from Midkiff to White who lateraled to Manning allowed the Midland half to race the remaining 14 yards over the goal without being touched. Chandler's attempt at placement was wide.

Midland kicked off to Odessa and when the Broncos failed to gain Tucker kicked to Manning who returned 10 yards to put the ball on the 50. A 14 yard pass from Midkiff to White was incomplete but the officials ruled interference and it was another first down for the locals. A short pass completed by the same duo placed the ball six yards nearer pay and on the next play Midkiff dropped back to pass but was unable to spot a receiver then plunged straight through the center of the line for 30 yards and another score. Chandler kicked goal.

Late in the final period Odessa got the ball on their own 44 and a long pass from Tucker to Smith was good for 24 yards placing the ball on the Midland 22. On the next play Midland was given a 15 yard pling on penalty and three line smashes ended up with the Green over the goal for Odessa. Louie McDowell, Tripp's attempt at placement was blocked. The game ended soon after with the ball in Odessa possession on the Midland 37.

Individual stats for the winners in the backfield were Midkiff and Chandler and in the line Richman and White. For the losers Tucker and Simpson in the secondary and Tripp in the line were the big shots.

"Quarter" Mares Win in Races Here

Clara Bow, fleet bay sprinter owned by L. E. Cook of Midland, handily outran Three Point, Jess Slaughter's roping horse from Big Spring, in a quarter mile matched race here Thursday afternoon. The roan paint mare from Gail, scheduled to run against a horse to romp, Ackerly, beat George Keith, Blox horse, in a quarter race which was greatly under the thoroughbred distance.

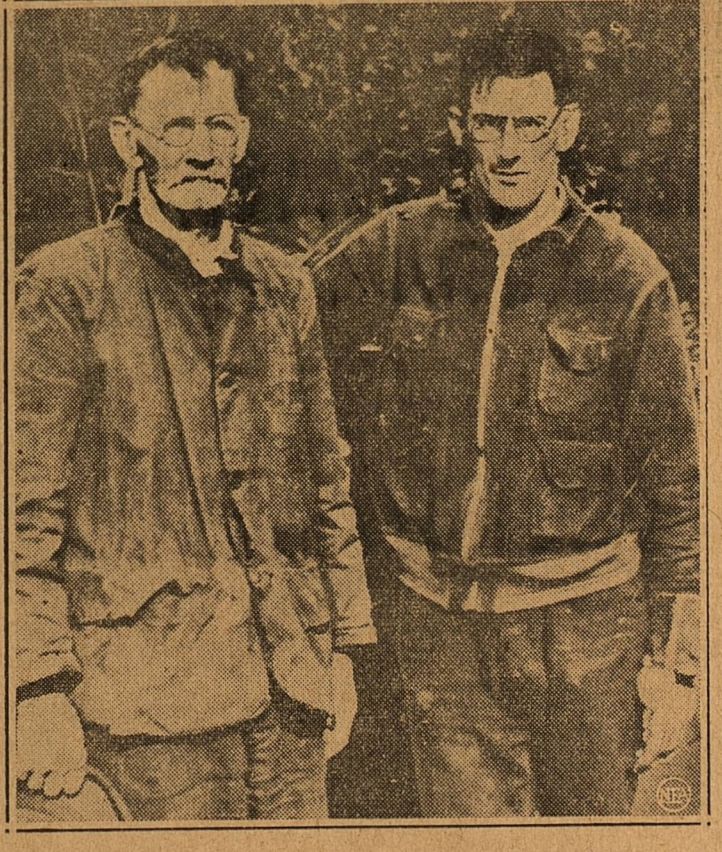

FORTY ACTIVE OPERATIONS KEEP LEA COUNTY AHEAD IN THE BASIN

Lea County, New Mexico, last week maintained its lead in drilling development in the Permian Basin with a lone completion replaced by an announced new location to keep the active list near forty.

With no oil, but seven and a half million cubic feet of gas, the Humble No. 1 Thomas was completed at a plugged back depth of 3,470 feet. Location is in the center of the southwest quarter of the southeast quarter of section 23, township 24 south, range 36 east, Cooper area.

The new location goes to the Eunice area, and will be known as the Tide Water Oil Company No. 3 State Foster. Materials are being moved in to the location in the center of the northwest quarter of the northeast quarter of section 8, township 21 south, range 36 east, a location north of the northern-most field wells date.

Thirteen drilling operations gave the Eunice a slight lead in activity over Cooper; where 11 wells are being put down. Of the 13, five have reached pay depths and are in various stages of pre-completion testing and treatment. Continental Oil Company No. 2-A-2 Meyers has run two and a half inch tubing to 3,897 feet preparatory to testing; Humble Oil and Refining Company No. 1-B State ran same size tubing to 3,951 feet, and in two hours, through one inch choke, tested 232 barrels of oil and nearly two million feet of gas; Shell Petroleum Corporation No. 1 State, mile and a half

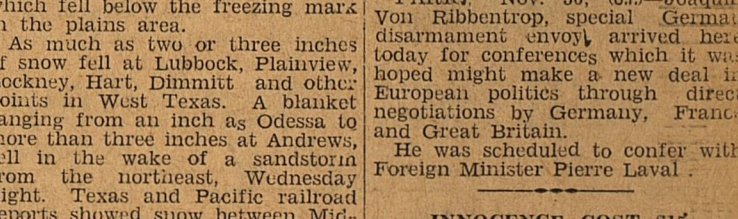
Thanksgiving Snow Boon to Pastures

Five Texas Tech Faculty Members In "Who's Who"

LUBBOCK.—The current edition of "Who's Who" lists five members of the Texas Technological College administration and faculty. This July 1934-35 edition of the publication lists Dr. Bradford Knapp, Miss Elizabeth H. West, Dr. Leroy T. Patton, Dr. James M. Gordon, and Dr. A. B. Cunningham as famous American citizens.

Dr. Knapp, president of the college, is the author of "Safe Farming," "How the Whole Country Demonstrated," and other publications of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. He also contributed to magazines on agricultural, educational, and industrial subjects. Dr. Knapp received his B. S. degree from Vanderbilt in 1892, his LL. B. from the University of Michigan, 1896, his Doctor of Agriculture from Maryland Agricultural College in 1919.

With the distinction of being the first woman commissioned as head of a department in Texas state government when she was state librarian from 1918 until 1925, Miss West, college librarian, acted as research assistant to the Library of Congress of European Mission, in charge of its work in the Archivo General de Indias, Seville, Spain. Miss West was assistant in the Library of Congress, Washington, D. C., 1906-11.

Dr. Leroy T. Patton, head professor of the department of geology and geological engineering, is the author of "Geology in Potter County," "Geology in Stonewall County," and of various papers on geological topics. He is a member of the American Association of Petroleum Geologists, Sigma Pi, Gamma Alpha, and is a fellow of A. A. A. S., Iowa Academy of Science.

Dr. Patton holds four degrees, including B. A., Muskingum College, New Concord, Ohio, 1905; B. S., University of Chicago, 1913; M. S., and Ph. D., The State University of Iowa, 1916 and 1923.

Holder of B. A. and LL. D. degrees from Trinity University, 1903 and 1919, A. M. degree from the University of Chicago, 1908, and graduate student in college administration in Columbia University, 1924-25, Dr. James M. Gordon, dean of the Division of Arts and Sciences and dean of men, has been associated with schools for the major part of his life.

He was dean of Trinity University from 1908 until 1916, president of Oklahoma East Central State Normal School, 1916-20, and president of Tulsa University.

Dr. Cunningham, associate professor of English, is an educator-teacher, having written "Manse at Barren Rocks," "Chronicle of an Old Town," "Singing Mountains," "Old Black Bass," and "Animal Tales of the Rockies." He also contributes educational articles to various magazines.

He has a B. A. degree from Muskingum College, New Concord, Ohio; a B. A. degree from Drew Theological Seminary, Madison, N. J., M. A. and Ph. D. degrees from New York University, and Litt. D. from Lebanon University.

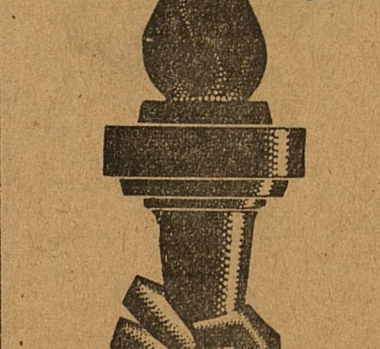
