PARIS POLICEMEN RELEASED BY TWO KIDNAPERS, HOME

Bandits Identified As Nix and Gooch, Holdenville

PARIS, Tex., Nov. 27, (U.R)—News Baker and H. R. Marks, Paris policemen who were kidnaped early thur Gooch, Oklahoma fugitives, yesterday by Ambrose Nix and Arthur Gooch, Oklahoma fugitives returned today, tired and hungry after their 24 hours abduction.

They were kept prisoners all day yesterday in the Buzzard creek bottoms near Nashoba, Okla.

Baker, weak from loss of blood from a hip wound sustained while scuffling with the outlaws, was taken to a hospital. His condition was not serious.

Marks said the outlaws drove north into Oklahoma after an encounter at a Paris filling stationand at 7 o'clock yesterday evening left them out in the woods and continued northward.

Nix and Gooch escaped jail at Holdenville a month agp. They were held there as robbery suspects.

The policemen were taken captive at 3:40 a. m. Monday when they went to a service station to question two men thought to have been involved in a \$11 sandwich stand hold-up near Tyler. The suspects suddenly covered them with pistols and forced them into the patrol car, then sped away to the north.

The abductors abandoned a stoler, car here, identified later as having been taken from Oscar Caldwell of Durant, Okla., on Oct. 31. In the car were found narcotics and some hypodermic needles. A physician's case containing narcotics was stolen from a Holdenville doctor shortly after Gooch and Nix, along with two other men and two women, made their escape Oct. 25.

WAS CONVICTED IN SLAYING OF 2 INSPECTORS

Is Final Chapter in Famous Ross-Good Cases of 1925

AUSTIN, Nov. 27. (U.P.)-Milt Good, convicted slayer of two cattle asso-ciation inspectors in 1925, was par-doned by Governor Ferguson today. The pardons board had recom-mended the pardon on the grounds that Good is a "reformed man."

CONVICTED JOINTLY WITH TOM ROSS

The famous Ross-Good cases figured prominently in the nation's news a few years ago, following the conviction of Tom Ross, Seminole cattleman, and Milt Good, cattleman and rodeo performer, in connection with the fatal shooting of Dave Allison and H. L. Robertson, inspectors for the Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers' association.

The shootings occurred in the small lobby of an old frame notel at Seminole, the night petore the inspectors were scheduled to appear against the others on cattle theft charges. Mrs. Robertson, wife of the inspector, fired at the pair as they fled from the hotel, Ross being wounded sufficiently that the two gave themselves up shortly afterward.

Four trials followed, two at Lub-

Four trials followed, two at Lubbock and two at Abilene, in which Dayton Moses, cattle raisers attorney, led the prosecution and got sentences of approximately fifty years against each of the defendants.

Some time later the two escaped the prison at Huntsville, Ross getting over the Canada line and Good being captured in the Osage hills of Oklahoma. Ross, later, took his own life just before being taken by Canadian police at an outlying ranch where he worked as a cowboy.

Good was given a parole for 90

Good was given a parole for 90 days last year. Many efforts have been made to secure his pardon on the grounds that he is a reformed man and that his family needs his support. He is said to have been a model prisoner since his return to Huntsylle. He has been prominent in the staging of prison rodeos each year.

MAKING MATTERS WORSE

One of the complicating factors in the budget difficulties which are assailing local units of government these days seems to be an ever-growing readiness on the part of voters to cut off needed funds at the source.

In many states the power of amending the state constitution by referendum petitions has been used to limit the tax rate on real estate, to exempt autos from personal property faxes, and to restrict use of gasoline tax funds to highway construction.

In addition, emergency tax and bond issues are being turned down at the polls with monotonous regularity.

The result, in many cases, has been to cripple city and county governments unbearably. Schools are closing, poor relief work is being cut, police departments are decaying-all because the voters are adopting an unexpectedly hard-boiled attitude toward local finances.

While the effort to keep taxes down is natural and right, the consequences are rapidly becoming extremely
