### WALTER COCHRAN TO BE INTERRED THIS AFTERNOON

Aged Cattleman Led Unusual Life in West Texas

Funeral and commitment rites are to be read for W. C. "Uncle Walter" Cochran, 82, retired cattleman of Midland this afternoon Funeral services will be said at 4 o'clock at the First Christian church, with interment following at Fairview cemetery.

The life of Walter Cochran was filled with struggles he surmounted. The following, written by the cattleman a few months before his death, tells the story:

I may be considered one of the pioneers. I was born in Chattanooga county, Georgia, August the 14th, 1852. My father moved to Texas in 1853, stopping a while in Smith county. Then he moved to Palo Pinto county in 1855. He was the first man to settle in Palo Pinto county west of the Erazos. The first patent issued in Palo Pinto county was to my father in 1859. I still have the patent.

I was raised in Palo Pinto county, was there when the Indians went on the war path in 1859. I lived there through all the 16 years the Indians were on the war path, but I shall not attempt to tell my Indian.
