"Every week or so when someone "comes back" to Midland, as so many are happily doing these days, the question is asked: "And what ever happened to the Little Theatre?"
Back in early 1929, the Midland Little Theatre was organized, and for three years it enjoyed a healthy, normal growth. Some 19 patrons and patronesses supported this civic achievement, and more than a hundred played in the well directed casts. Really, it was quite all right, and many who came the first time to gaze at some brave neighbor who had joined the band of amateur actors reing legitimate stage plays.
It used to be that there was a "Little Theatre Season" during the winter, and townspeople looked forward of the three plays given. For example, curtains of the Grand and hater the Yucca Theaters rose on: "The Brat",

To those who wish to "play in", what a splendid chance to follow a hobby, uniting with others in creative endeavor, playing beside, perhaps, one who has done considerable work along the line elsewhere, relaxing by working at something outside their daily grind. To others, who heartily endorse the movement but don't want to act, Little Theatre provides another civic endeavor to work for, something to make them even more proud of Midland. And to the rest, the audience at large, a touch of culture, a pulse to bring them beauty and refinement. These are the why's.

But let those who would again like to see a Little Theatre band together-there are many among the old and the new here who are interested. Let them discover talents—there is bound to be talent among citi-zens of the calibre of Midland's. 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

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
