All Systems Go On Tractorcade!

Tractorcade correspondent Jerry Gee reported Friday morning from Fort Smith, Arkansas that all was well with the Hansford County delegation travelling to Washington with the American Agriculture Movement Tractorcade.

Gee noted that the group had spent the night in Monroe, La. and expected to arrive in Russellville, Arkansas for the Friday Night stop.

The local Hansford County AAM leader noted that CB's were reporting to be Five to One in favor of the activity. Gee also noted that Law enforcement authorities had been cooperative and complimentary as the tractorcade moved East. They expect to arrive in Washington Feb. 2nd, at which time they expect to have over 1000 vehicles in the project.

The Panhandle group that left Amarillo last Monday now boasts a contingent of vehicles some thirty miles long. Each local entity is self contained.... mobile telephones, deep freezers, food, bedding, first aid supplies, equipment support materials and many other facets helping to make the long exodus to the Nation's capital successful. Spokesmen for the AAM reported that a Bakery in Henrietta, Oklahoma had provided the travellers with baked goods and refreshments as they moved ahead on their task. The task is to seek aggressive support from Congress for the farmer's plight.

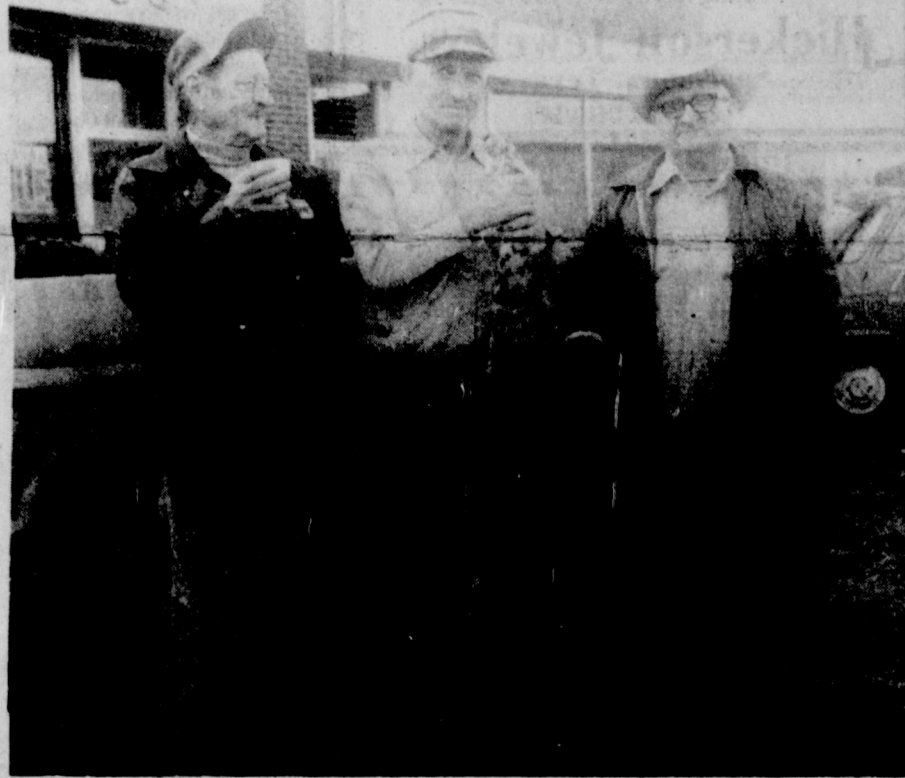

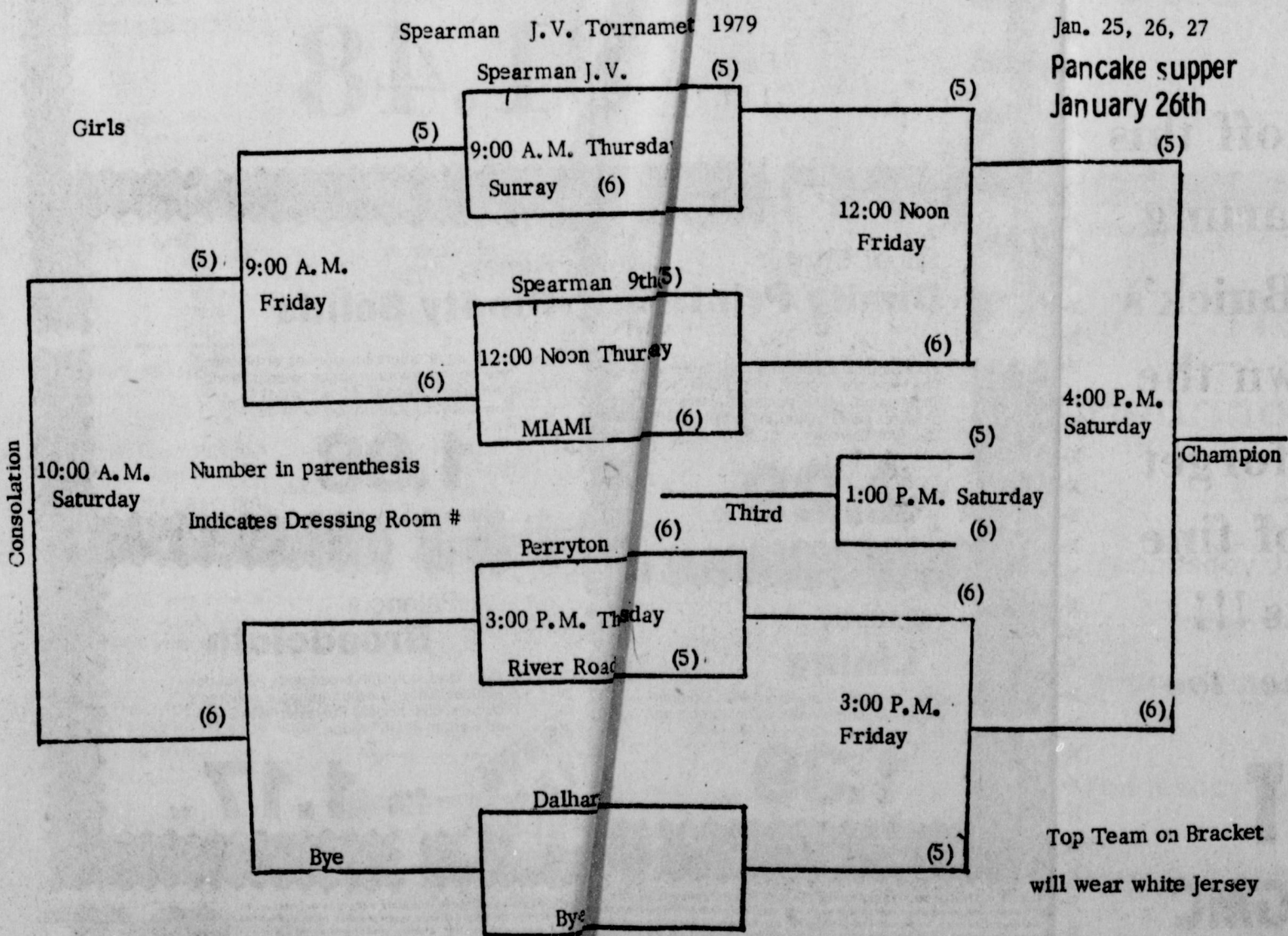

GREASE BURN

You're taking a pan of bacon unless you take immediate off the stove when you accidentally pour hot grease on your hand. The pain is tremendous. What should you do? Stick your hand in cold water. Have someone make up an icebag and keep your hand on that on the way to the hospital. Butter, oil and burn ointments are no longer recommended for first aid of burns. A doctor will have to remove these applications before he can treat the burn, and removal can be a slow and painful process. Fast application of cold water is the best way to halt destruction of tissue in first or second degree burns. Just as a roast beef continues to cook inside after the oven is turned off, so the underlying layers of skin on your hand will continue to cook

served.

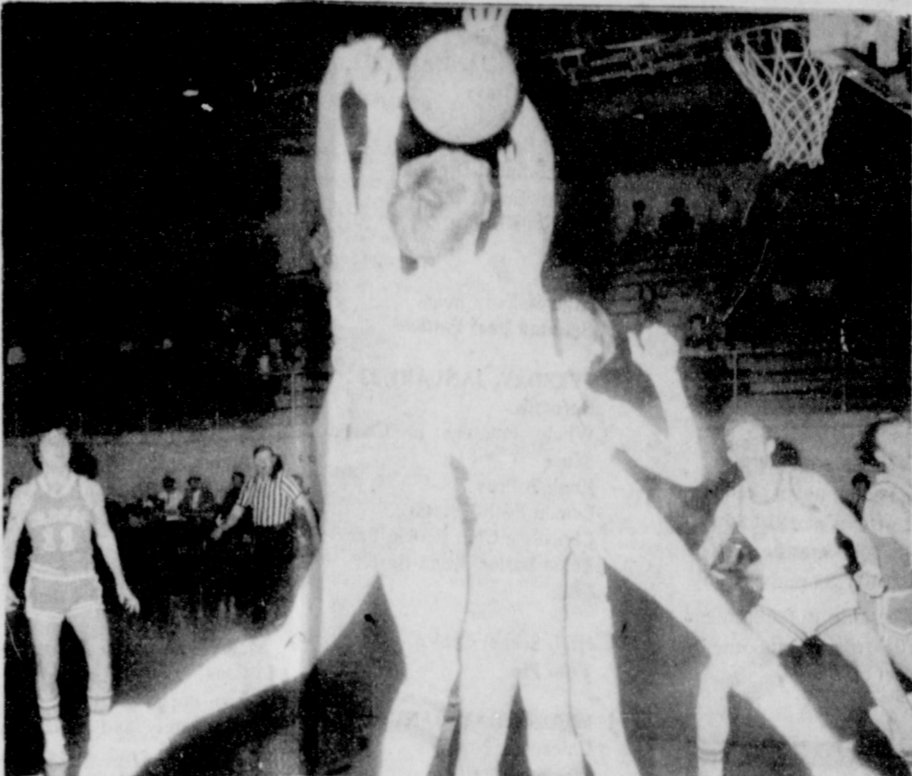

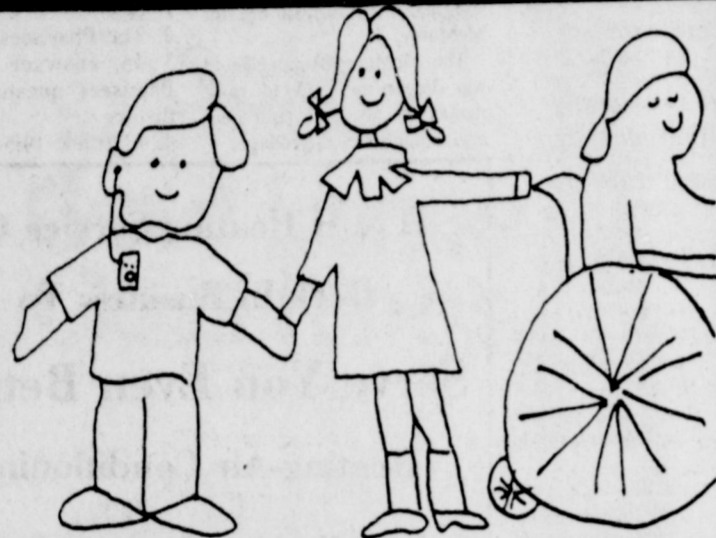

AMARILLO -- A Plainview firm, High Plains Pavers Inc., has been awarded the contract by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission to perform the work of the Amarillo District 1979 Seal Coat Program.

High Plain's bid of \$1,440,530, was the lowest of five received by the Commission, including Interstate, U. S. highways, and Farm and Ranch to Market Roads.

McKee said the seal coat--an additional asphalt surfacing material--improves riding comfort and safety and assists in guarding the road bed from moisture. 
