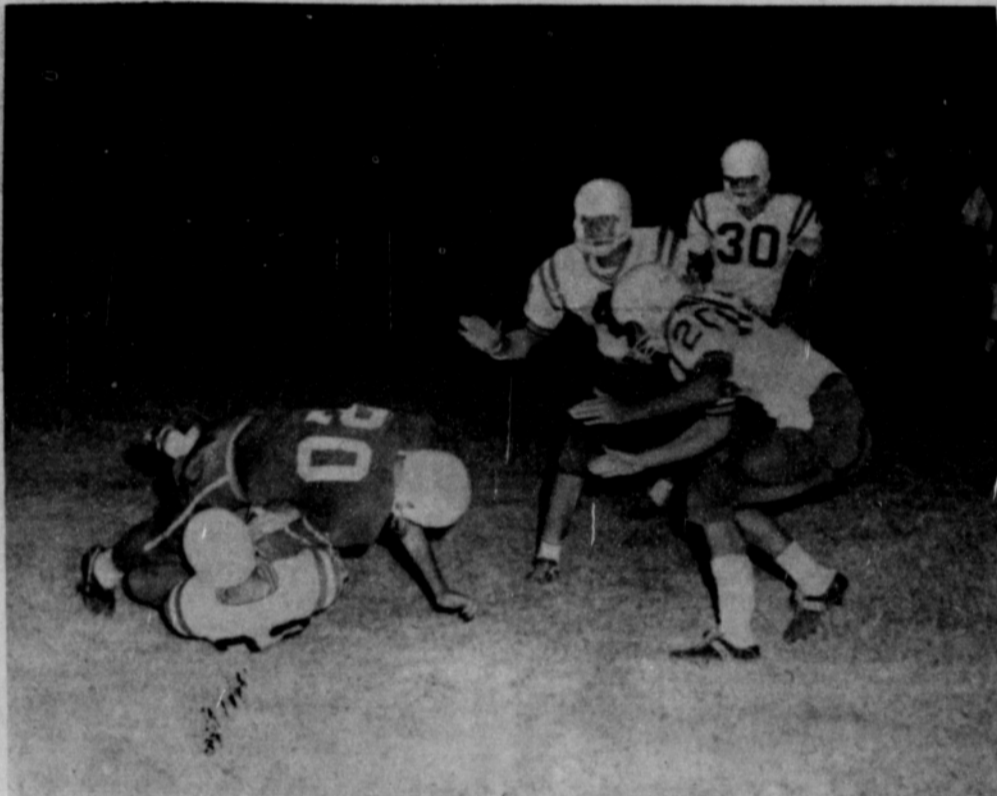

## Clayton Cochran Leads New Lynx To 56-14 Victory Over Fritch

Short dives, long runs and passes all added up to many points Friday night in Fritch as the Spearman Lynx stripped the Sanford-Fritch Eagles 56-14.

Spearman's second unit played the last 15 minutes of the game, but Fritch could not contain them and they scored twice, the last one coming with only 12 seconds left in the game.

Spearman's defensive unit held Fritch to 94 yards rushing and 102 yards in the air. They completed only two passes, but one covered 81 yards.

Clayton Cochran had a big night as he rushed for 121 yards in 11 carries, and ran the second half kick-off 70 yards for a score.

The big offensive fullback and defensive tackle had a good night on defense as he threw Fritch runners and passers for

losses totaling 18 yards on three different plays and was tough.

The Cochran led offense rolled up a total of 3-3 yards on the ground and 54 in the air. Ken Shufeldt rolled to 89 yards in 11 carries and his "little" brother, Hal, picked up 55 yards rushing with the second unit. He scored one touchdown on the ground and caught a pass and ran for another, the play covered 33 yards.

The younger Shufeldt, a sophomore, starting his second game as a defensive guard, was a rock in the middle of the line and recovered two Fritch fumbles before he switched to halfback in the last 15 minutes.

Two fumbles in the opening two minutes of the game put Fritch in the hole and it got deeper as the night wore on.

Fritch opened with a 12 yard gainer up the middle of the Lynx defense, but on the second play they fumbled and Hal Shufeldt pounced on the ball at the Eagle 47.

Ken Shufeldt was stopped for no gain and quarterback Dave Clement went to the air twice, but failed to connect. Larry Butts punted out of bounds on the Fritch 13 and disaster hit the Eagles quickly.

Skipper Robinson and Charles Shieldknight clobbered quarterback Terry Aderholt and he fumbled. Robinson recovered on the Fritch 11.

Cousins Butts and Clements took only three plays to score. Butts hit for five. Clements went over the backs of Robinson, Lynn Buzzard and Mart Brillhart for five more and a

forced two Fritch tacklers to knock each other down.

He was free at the 35 and outran Fritch defenders to the end zone. Jerry Holton blasted over for the extra points to make the score 33-6.

Late in the third quarter Spearman added another eight points. Cochran was the big gainer in this 60 yard drive. He went 45 yards on one dash. Butts and Shufeldt moved it from the 15 to the four and there Clement skirted his own left side and dived through two tacklers to score. Hal Shufeldt added the points as the second unit took over for the extra points try.

The second unit played the rest of the game.

After forcing Fritch to punt the gold unit started on what looked like a scoring drive. Hal Shufeldt and Jerry Holton rolled down to the Fritch 28 behind good blocking. At the 28 and facing fourth, Shieldknight bobbled the snap from center and tried to force out the needed three yards. He was stopped just two inches short.

Tackle Harrell Adkison put Fritch in a hole when he dropped Aderholt for a 14 yard loss.

Fritch punted out to the Fritch 38 and Spearman went in to score.

The drive took six plays. Hal Shufeldt covered 16 yards in one ballp, then two plays later Shieldknight hit Shufeldt on a flat pass for 19 yards and a first at the one.

Shufeldt lost five on the first try. Thenscored from six yards out. Shieldknight was smothered on his passing attempt and Spearman led 47-6.

Two plays after the kick-off Harbison broke free at the 49 and raced 51 yards for Fritch's second touchdown. Steve Kuykendall ran over the points to make the score 47-14.

After Spearman fumbled on the Fritch 40, the defense held and took over on the Fritch 39. Phillip Renner made the big defensive play when he dropped Aderholt for a nine yard loss.

It took Spearman only two plays to score. Shufeldt ran for six, then Shieldknight hit Shufeldt with a pass of about 15 yards and the receiver legged the rest of the 33 yards for a score.

Mike Babbs crashed over for two more points and the final score was 56-14.

first at the one foot line. He repeated the act on the next play and Spearman led 6-0. Cochran failed on his try for two points.

Led by tackle Randy Moore the defense stopped Fritch and they punted to the Lynx 37 and Spearman was off again.

Spearman covered 63 yards in four plays. Shufeldt got 30 on the first and 18 on the second, then Cochran went 17 more. Shufeldt scored from one. Clement kicked the point and Spearman led 13-0 mid-way of the first quarter.

The third touchdown was started on the last play of the first quarter. Cochran capped it off four plays later with a 36-yard run for a score. Clements missed the try for the extra point and Spearman led 19-0.

Midway of the second quarter Fritch got on the scoreboard with an 81-yard pass and run play.

Halfback Ronnie Adkins on an apparent running play, threw long downfield to end Herschel Kime. He was far behind the Lynx secondary and raced about 40 yards to score. John Harbison tried to kick the extra point, but missed.

If anyone lingered at the concession stand at the half they missed 13 points.

Fritch kicked the ball to Cochran to open the half and 11 seconds later was in the end zone after galloping 70 yards. His blocking exploded him free about mid-field and he just out-hoofed the Fritch speed to the goal. Clement missed on his passing attempt for two points. Spearman led 25-6.

Fritch ran four plays and Spearman scored again.

Fritch punted from their 40 to Gary Cates at the Lynx 25 and the little safety man redeemed himself for letting the Fritch receiver get behind him in the second quarter and catching a pass for a touchdown.

Cates headed up field behind early blocking, but at mid-field he was apparently trapped on the sideline. He squirted through a pack, only to find more trouble, then as three men closed in he cut back and
