Short dives, long runs and pas-ses all added up to many points Friday night in Fritch as the Spearman Lynx stripped the Sanford-Fritch Eagles 56-14.

Separman's second unit played the last 15 minutes of the game, but Fritch could not contain them and they scored twice, the last one coming with only 12 seconds left in the game.

Spearman's defensive unit held Fritch to 94 yards rushing and 102 yards in the air. They completed only two pas-ses, but one covered 81 yards.

Clayton Cochran had a big night as he rushed for 121 yards in 11 carries, and ran the second half kick-off 70 yards for

a score. The big offensive fullback and defensive tackle had a good night on defense as he threw Fritch runners and passers for

losses totaling 18 yards on three different plays and was tough. The Cochran led offense rolled up a total of 3-3 yards on the ground and 54 in the air. Ken Shufeldt rolled to 89 yards in 11 carries and his "little brother, Hal, picked up 55 yards rushing with the second unit. He scored one touchdown on the ground and caught a pass and ran for another, the play covered 33 yards. The younger Shufeldt, a sop-

homore, starting his second game as a defensive guard, was a rock in the middle of the line and recovered two Fritch fumbles before he switched to halfback in the last 15 minutes.

Two fumbles in the opening two minutes of the game put Fritch in the hole and it got deeper as the night wore on.

Fritch opened with a 12 yard. gainer up the middle of the Lynx lefense, but on the second play they fumbled and Hal Shufeldt pounced on the ball at the Eagle 47.

Ken Shufeldt was stopped for no gain and quarterback Dave Clement went to the air twice but failed to connect . Larry Butts punted out of bounds on the Fritch 13 and disaster hit






