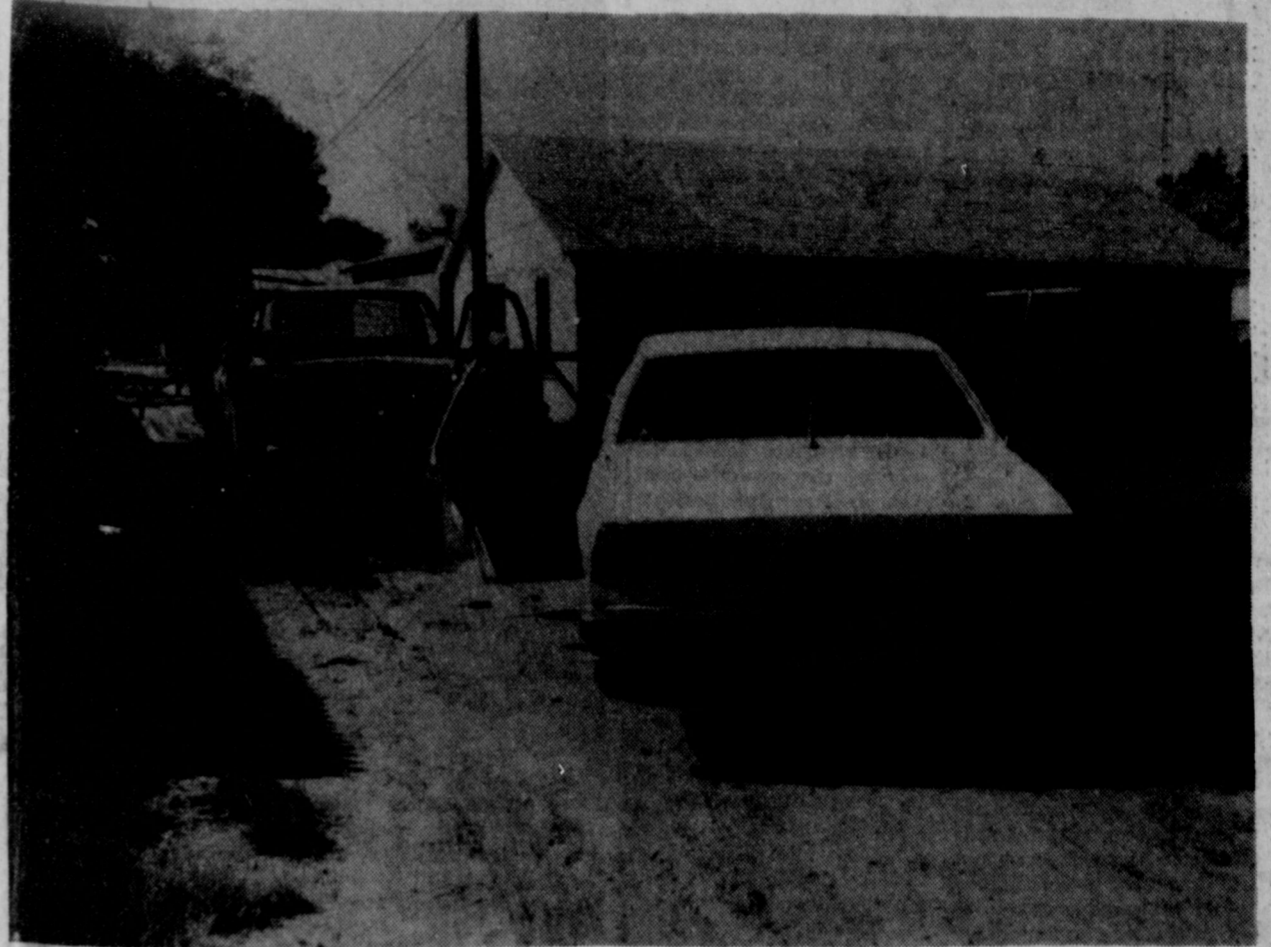


Sign destroyed

## Labor Day MD Telethon

The Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon will have a completely new look this year. A brand-new, star studded format will be unveiled Sept. 2 when the annual 2 1/2 hour supershow to benefit the Muscular Dystrophy Association goes on the air.

Broadcast from Del Webb's Hotel Sahara in Las Vegas, the spectacular will be carried by a "Love Network" of more than 200 stations in the Continental U.S., Hawaii, Alaska, Puerto Rico and Guam 6 pm Sunday, Sept. 2 at 6:30 pm Monday Sept. 3. Ed McMahon will again back up Jerry Lewis as anchor man.

"This will be a different kind of Telethon in many ways," said Horst Petzall, Telethon Publicity Director. "We'll be using an area stage concept,

giving cameras a 360-degree range. This will enable us to involve the audience more fully in the telecast."

"For the first time, each hour will be a distinct unit with a self-contained character of its own. Each hourly special will feature live appearances of MDA's research and medical services program, human interest stories about the fight against neuromuscular disease and, for 15 minutes every hour local community participation."

The Jerry Lewis Labor Day spectacular is recognized as one of the great annual TV entertainment events, and this year again will live up to its billing.

Among the star performers expected to appear are Marty Allen, Count Basie, Bill Dana, James Darren, Chad Everett, Lola Falana, Mickey Finn and

many, many others.

Another highlight of Telethon '79 will be appearances by major rock and disco stars, including Peter Frampton, Fleetwood Mac, Kiss, Paul McCartney, Eddie Money, Rolling Stones, and the Village People.

According to the A.C. Neilson ratings, Mr. Petzall noted, last year's Labor Day Telethon was seen by an estimated 88 million viewers, with nearly 50% of the households with TV sets in the U.S. tuning in the show.

Telethon '78 also produced a record \$29 million in pledges to support the Muscular Dystrophy Association's program, which include worldwide research and free medical services. "Nearly 100% of these pledges was collected."

Mr. Petzall pointed out that

funds for MDA's fight against neuromuscular disease come almost entirely from the voluntary contributions of concerned individuals and groups. The Association neither seeks nor receives grants or fees from the government for its services.

"Telethon '79 is certain to be the finest, most entertaining and most successful spectacular that MDA has ever presented," Mr. Petzall said. Above all, the Jerry Lewis Day Telethon brings millions of Americans together in a nationwide community of caring. It's America at its best.

Locally, the Telethon can be viewed on Cable Channel 6 and heard over KRDF radio. All of the breakaways will be from the Old Beedy Building located in the Plains Shopping Center.

A Dance-a-thon will be get-

ting underway at 3 pm Sunday, Sept. 2 and will last for 24 hours. All ages are invited to join in the dance-a-thon. #### RISK MANAGEMENT

The term "risk management" is being heard more and more often in insurance circles. What does it mean? To say that it means "the management of risk" sounds like begging the question, but that's literally the definition.

These include self-insurance programs; determining

avoidable risks; possibly ignoring some of them; using high deductibles; and figuring out ways to prevent risks.

Risk management is a matter of analysis involving the realization of the consequences of a loss on a business or individual. Figuring out the sources of losses and determining the best way or ways to deal with risks are also part of the function.

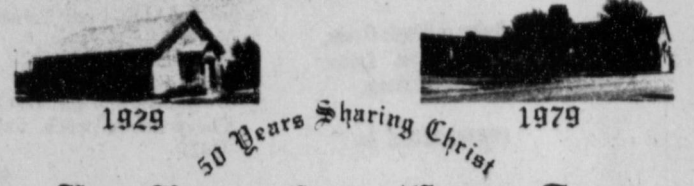
### REMEMBERING THE PAST...

A meeting was called on Sunday, December 1, 1929, for the purpose of organizing a Baptist church in Gruver, Texas. The meeting was called to order by Rev. W.H. Forbes, District Missionary, who was later called as first pastor of the church. The church was organized with 34 members, of which three are still members. On January 3, 1931, the First Baptist Church of Gruver voted to build the first building, a little white church. First service and dedication was May 17, 1931.

Bro. Herbert Hughes became pastor in November 1936. In 1939 the church voted to put a basement under the existing structure. The men of the church set to work and it was soon completed with class rooms and a kitchen. In the fall of 1941, a pastor's home was built with three classrooms in the basement. In 1948, a building committee was elected to gather materials for an educational building. Again the men of the church set to work and built the present west wing educational building. Bro. Hughes was pastor of the church until February 1951.

Bro. Chester O'Brien became pastor in April 1951. In 1952 a building committee was elected to draw up plans for a new place of worship. When Bro. O'Brien resigned in May 1952, a call was extended to Bro. George Massingale. The plans were drawn up and approved. Bro. Bill Burton became pastor in May 1954 and on June 27, 1954 the first church service was held in the present auditorium.

In December 1957, Bro. A.G. Purvis was called as pastor. Under his leadership a new parsonage was built in 1961. After Bro. Purvis left in April 1964, Bro. Bill Butts was called as pastor. During this time with us a building committee was elected to survey our need of more educational space.

### BUILDING PROGRESS

## Provisions Of 1980 Wheat Program

There are three big changes in the 1980 wheat program, according to Martin Chandler, Hansford County ASCS Director. The first change is that there is no set-aside program for 1980 wheat.

Secondly, the target price is expected to be \$3.07 per bushel. Using the formula contained in the Food and Agriculture Act of 1977, the 1980 target price would be between \$2.95 and \$3.20 per bushel. The 1979 target price was \$2.98 but because of last year's 20 percent required set-aside, it was adjusted to \$3.40. The final 1980 target price will be announced by March 15. A detailed review of the target price for applicable commodities is underway to determine if legislative changes are necessary.

The third big change in the 1980 program is that there will be no disaster coverage for 1980 crops unless new legislation is enacted. This could be a big factor to farmers in the county, according to Chandler. He stated that disaster payments in the county for the past two years had amounted to between 5 & 6 million dollars. Farmers would be wise to contact their U.S. representatives and senators about this change in policy.

The 1980 wheat Loan Rate will be increased from \$2.35 to \$2.50 per bushel.

National program acreage for 1980 is 70 million acres which is the estimated number of harvested acres that the Secretary has determined will produce enough wheat for domestic use, for export, and to maintain an adequate level of carryover stocks. This acreage may, however, be adjusted based on later information which affects total usage.

Farmers who comply with program requirements and

plant no more wheat in 1980 than they planted (and that was considered as planted) in 1979 will have full target price protection. The 1979 considered planted acreage includes credit for set-aside, haying and grazing acreage for payment, prevented planting, and voluntary acreage reductions. Those who exceed this acreage will be subject to the national allocation factor.

The allocation factor is determined by dividing the national program acreage by the number of acres the Secretary estimates were harvested. This figure cannot be less than 80 percent nor more than 100 percent.

The allocation factor will only be applied to deficiency payments. Since it is based on the number of acres actually harvested, the final factor will be announced until the fall of 1980.

Deficiency Provisions-The wheat deficiency payment rate is the difference between the target price and the higher of (1) the national average market price received for the first 5 months of the 1980 marketing year (June through October) of (2) the national average loan rate.

If deficiency payments are made, they will be computed by multiplying the payment rate times the farm's established yield, times the number of acres planted for harvest. The resulting figure had planted more in 1980 than was planted and considered as planted in 1979.

Cross & Offsetting Compliance-If there is a set-aside and/or voluntary diversion program in effect for any program commodity, producers must comply with the applicable set-aside requirements for the crop to be eligible for program benefits on any other crop included in the normal crop

acreage (except for sugar beets and sugar cane). Offsetting compliance provisions have not been determined.

Payment Limitation-The total amount of deficiency payments and voluntary diversion, if applicable, which a person can receive under a combination of the wheat-feed grain, upland cotton and rice programs is \$50,000. This limitation does not apply to loans or purchases.

Fragile Lands-Administrative or legislative steps will be taken to discourage planting wheat on fragile land.

Normal Crop Acreage-Planted acreage in 1980 in excess of that normally used for crop production will not be added to a producer's normal crop acreage for subsequent years. The Department may also seek legislative changes to encourage continued good farming practices as a condition for farm program benefits.

Other provisions of the 1980 wheat program will be announced later.

Mr. Poston, born in Moshheim, moved to Gruver in 1939 from Clifton. He was a veteran of World War II and a member of Gruver United Methodist Church. He owned and operated Universal Motor Co., Universal Oil Co., and Universal Equipment Co.

Survivors include his mother, Mrs. Marie Poston of Clifton; four sisters, Mrs. Creola Lane of Clifton, Mrs. Marie Carlson and Mrs. Rosalie Grossman, both of Fort Worth, and Mrs. Sally Kidd of Houston; and a brother, Britt Poston of Lake Isabelle, Calif.
