

#### **EDITORIAL**

#### But Are We?

What kind of people inhabit the United States?

The standard answer is: "God fearing, hard working, patriotic people who want to live in freedom." This is the standard description used for many years in describing Americans. But, are we really this kind of people?

There is reason for doubt about "God Fearing" when only one out of four or five attend church; when our children become drunken mobs wrecking vacation areas and towns on holidays; and when crime immorality and theft are ignored from the lowest to highest places in the land.

Hard working? Many of our unemployed will not take jobs; unions are working for a 35 hour or less work week, feather-bedding on jobs is widespread; extra long coffee breaks and lunch hours rob employers of thousands of hours of work.

Patriotic? How many hats are lifted when the colors pass?; citizens march in protest of our fighting a power determined to destroy us; students raise funds for medical supplies for the enemy; citizens deny other citizens the right to vote; derogatory phone calls are made to survivors of men killed fighting the enemy.

wanting to live in Freedom? Demands grow every day for more and more government services and accompanying controls; many seek immediate dependance on Washington for funds and solutions to local emergencies and problems; and there is a growing expectation for government to provide for us in sickness, unemployment and old age.

This does not fit the great majority of Americans. It is only fringe groups. But, if allowed, a few loose threads in a fringe can unravel an entire bolt of cloth.



#### **Chipping Away Rights**

A great many laws are being passed and a great many administrative decisions are being made these days in the name of "civil rights." It seems to be an obsession in this country that nobody is discrimated against, that everybody gets put upon

And in the process of guaranteeing everybody the same rights, some other equally precious rights are being trampled.

The U. S. Commissioner of Education has just stated for the federal government a doctrine that would employ the civil rights act to stop recial discrimination by college fraternities. rights act to stop racial discrimination by college fraternities in the selection of their members.

The fraternities and sororities have it straight: Take Negroes

into membership or have your doors closed.

The club over the fraternities' head is federal money. Colleges and universities, in the commissioner's view, would be required to compel fraternities to cease such discrimination, by race, or remove their chapters from the campus. If they don't the federal government will halt its grants of funds to the institutions where an offending fraternity has chapters.

Since all universities take federal funds, this means all are included. The universities have orders to straighten out the

fraternities or lose their funds.

This is a case in point where the federal government is stretching the civil rights act way out of line in order to compel integration of the races.

There are areas where discrimination is legal, where it is

practiced, and where it is logical.

Fraternity membership is just such an area.

A fraternity is by its nature a discriminatory organization and its right to select its membership is basic to its existence.

A college administration has the right to bar fraternities, and to exercise some control over their activities, but it does not have a right to dictate their membership policies.

This doctrine of the U.S. Commissioner of Education can probably be enforced, since the federal government is all powerful and money exercises a powerful medicine these days.

But it is wrong.

A college fraternity is a private club, and it is no less one because its members are students. A fraternity has the right to invite members on any basis they choose. There is no such thing as a "right" to fraternity membership as a lot of white students have found out when they didn't make the fraternity of their choice following rush week.

We suppose that the next step, or maybe this step is already with us, is that the Masonic Lodge will receive orders to take in some Negro members, or female members, or other groups not now admitted to membership.

We suppose that the government can make the Lions Club, the Rotary Club and the Kiwanis Club admit members on standards set up by the government instead of the clubs them-

And what about the Negro that the government wants to include in fraternity membership? Will a Negro feel comfortable as a member of an organization that did not invite him, does not want him? Will the government compel him to join whether he wants to or not? Who pays his dues? There are a lot of problems that can arise from a public policy as announced by the U.S. Commissioner of Education.







"Ten years from now, very few breeder sales will operate without this information for buyers," he predicted. "With this kind of data, the buyer can come nearer evaluating what a young bull, for example, is capable of than ever before. It's better than relying

on an ancestor pedigree."
Several major sales in Texas have used the system in the past few years, the most notable recent one being the Nine-Bar Santa Gertrudis sale at Cypress. Thirty head averaged \$7,963. Ten bulls averaged \$18,210, with the top bull going to the King Ranch for \$58,000.

Maddox said the usual infor-

mation in a production pedi-gree includes weaning weights of sire, dam and calves; gaining ability of sire and calves, complete fertility data on dams, and carcass information from a random sample of a bull's calves. He added that breeders can

gather such records on their herds in several basic ways:

(1) All major breed associa-tions have their own perform-

ance testing programs.
(2) The Performance Registry International of Denver, Colo This is the oldest organization which has accumulated production records for breeders. It was established in Texas in 1954 at a time when breed associations were hesitant about value of production records.

(3) The Texas Agricultural Extension Service offers help through local county agents. Agents have been working with breeders for the past 12



#### **Artifical Recharge Puts** Water Back Underground

The Plains of Texas has over 37,000 playa (buffalo) lakes which collect approximately 1.4 to 2.5 million feet of run-off water annually. Over 90 percent of all this water could evaporate if left in the

During a time when rain is falling and the lakes are full, this "waste" water can be economically and effectively stored and put to use at the time when it is needed.

The High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway, Texas has pioneered in what is known as "artificial recharge". This practice is putting the

This practice is putting the lake water back underground either through gravity flow or

by pumping.

James Valliant, Water Engineer for the Foundation, states: "We have recharged the equivalent of 28 percent of the total amount of irrigation water used at the Found dation for the past six years into the underground formation. This modified well can also be used as a lake pump if it is needed. Several far-mers are able to farm land previously unusable due to the lake."

With over 52,000 irigation wells on the Plains of Texas pumping an estimated 5 mil-lion acre-feet of water each lion acre-feet of water each year, the rapid depletion of the underground water supply could be cut, and the life of our water could be extended by putting what has been a waste back underground through artificial recharge.

In the Underground strata found on the Plains, there is very little lateral (side) movement of recharge water. During the hot dry summer

During the hot dry summer when more water is needed, the recharge water will still be in the area of influence of the multiple-purpose well for irrigation.

Valliant states he does not

Valliant states he does not know of any properly installed and properly maintained multiple-purpose well that has been clogged or filled.

The average rainfall for the Plains of Texas is 20 inches per year. With this little rain it will take 10 years to put one inch of water back underground by natural means. It takes 20 inches to put 1/10 of an inch into the underground formation.

The Foundation has developed successful methods of installation and maintenance of multiple-purpose wells and now a program is underway to develop a better method of clearing water for artificial recharge. The Foundation is testing grasses that can be planted in the bottom of the lakes to serve as a filter and also for grazing of cattle.
