## Control brush

Native grass production on effectively controlled by a prescribrangeland will be greatly reduced ed burn during the late winter when the range is infested with brush. Controlling the brush will increase the amount of production in the pastures.
The brush, which is considered an invading species to most native grassland, presents a competition problem for the grass. The brush will use up a great deal of water
and nutrients which could be available for the grasses. Also, the area occupied by the brush could be occupied by grass. Therefore, the control and management of the brush can be very beneficial to the rancher.
Controlling the brush can be acomplished in several ways. Mechanical, chemical, and with fire are three methods of control. It depends on the brush species to be controlled as to which method is most effective. Alse, any combination of the three methods may be such as prickly pear, can be
effectively controlled by a prescrib-
ed burn during the late winter months
the burn.
The area should be deferred from grazing during the first growing seeson after treatment. This will allow the grass to improve while the brush will be set back The deferment during the growing and the effect of the brush control will be notiogd quicker.
