"Doc" James rites

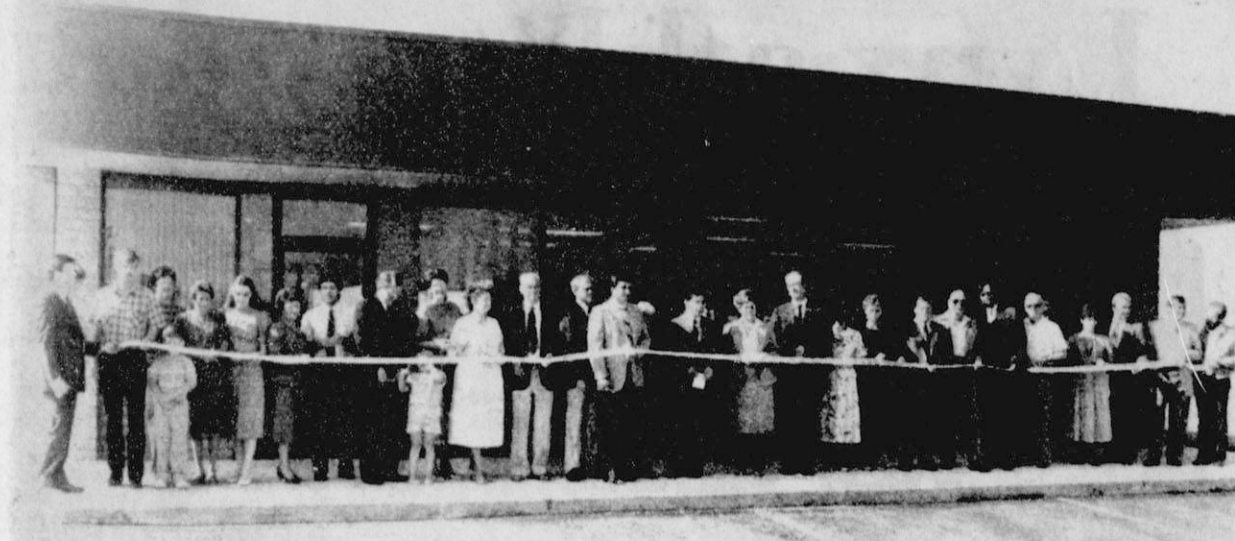
Harry N. "Doc" James, 90, of Stinnett died Thursday.

The escort contestants will perform a song during the Miss Hansford Pageant and will be introduced as couples. They will each have an interview with the judges prior to the contest.

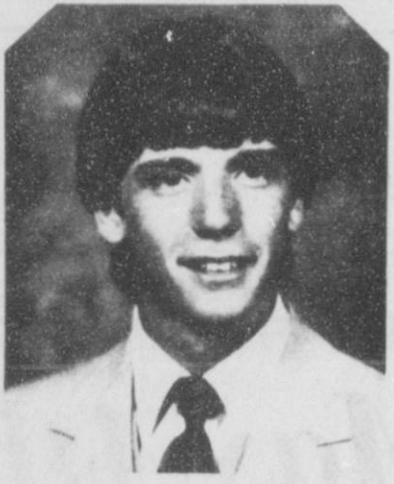

Seminar for Women Landowners

A special seminar on Farm and Ranch Business Management for Women Landowners will be held May 7-9 at the Holiday Inn in Amarillo.

The seminar is designed to help women explore income-generating and tax-saving opportunities for their farms and ranches, says Dr. Wayne Hayenga, economist and attorney with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A & M University System.

Discussions will center on income taxes, farm leases, business organization, estate planning and oil and gas leasing.

Farm leases and operating agreements take many forms, notes Hayenga, and many of these will be discussed at the seminar including benefits and restrictions to both landowners and tenants.

Regarding income tax planning, tax-saving opportunities will be explored for business growth, land sales, retirement income and helping out children and grandchildren.

A session on estate planning will deal with wills, trusts, estate tax deferrals, gifts and property titles.

Hayenga points out.

Estate planning tools which will be discussed include use of corporations and partnerships, selling part of the business, installment sales, oil and gas interests, special farm land valuation, deferred estate tax payments, life insurance and discounted estate taxes (flower bonds).

This is the second year Extension is hosting this program series. Other locations are Dallas/Ft. Worth and San Antonio if people would like to attend at one of these locations.

A registration fee of \$80 will be charged, which includes the cost of meals and materials. For registration information, call Karen Harruff at 659-2030 or 733-2901.

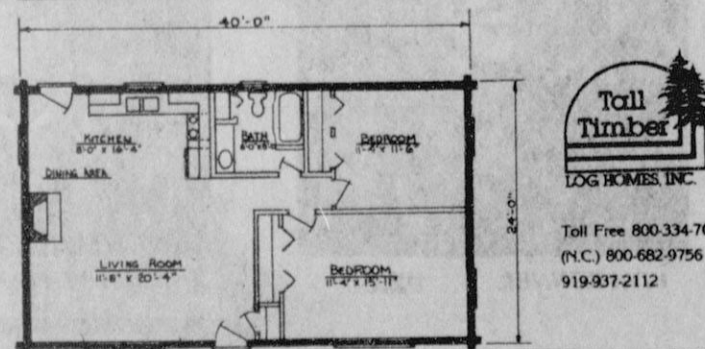

Working and living in different countries is nothing new for people in the U.S. armed forces. The call to duty may send a serviceman or

woman to the ends of the earth and almost anywhere in between.

For Army Staff Sgt. Garland M. Nichols, Jr., 39, son of Cora Nichols, 214 S. Snyder, Spearman, the call for duty came in the form of an assignment in the Central American country of Honduras.

"When I first arrived in Honduras, I was disoriented and sort of out of focus," said Nichols, a medical readiness exercise supervisor with the 47th Field Hospital. "This is a natural feeling when traveling for many hours and then landing in a foreign environment. I was more fortunate than some, however, because I'm bilingual and several friends met me at the airport."

Life at Palmerola could best be described as 'austere.' Service members live in temporary, prefabricated wooden buildings called C-huts. And while these buildings are a step above the tent city which occupied the area a year ago, the remainder of the facilities on the camp are a far cry from the modern

facilities found on most military posts today.

"Our C-huts are half-screen, half-wooden buildings with corrugated tin roofs," said Nichols. "They're not bad for a field environment. But in this environment, we have to learn to make do sometimes, improvise or just do without. This is especially true on the long rural missions into the interior of Honduras while we're on medical readiness exercises."

By supporting military exercises such as Big Pine III, service members not only gain valuable experience in their job specialties, they also learn how to cope in an environment that is beautiful, harsh, and sometimes unpredictable.

"My job as the medical readiness exercise supervisor keeps me from getting bored," said Nichols. "I'm gone from Palmerola more than I'm here. But it is lonely. There's always loneliness when I'm separated from my family. I miss my wife, Natividad and my child-

ren, Corita and Garland. But our moral support telephone calls each week help me tremendously.

"When we go out on the medical exercises, I help with the reconnaissance of villages, and the planning, coordination and execution of those exercises. Working and living here is a great experience. In my job I have a great deal of close interaction with the Honduran military and federal police and certain members of the health community. And from my experience, most of them have a desire to learn and improve themselves and their country. I would recommend this assignment for anyone else. If nothing else, it would make Americans, especially American soldiers, appreciate what they have at home."

Duty in Honduras has another face, one of learning about different cultures. The "Yanks" stationed here have the chance to sample the Latin pace of Tegucigalpa or visit the serene and stately ruins of the ancient Mayan city of

Copan. "Coming to Honduras has opened another page in the history book of the Americas for me," said Nichols. "The opportunity to visit places such as the Mayan ruins at Copan and the legendary ports at Puerto Cortes and Trujillo, is great."

A 1964 graduate of Spearman High School, Nichols went on to attend Panhandle A&M College, Goodwell, Okla., before entering the Army.

Texas Most Wanted



JAMES RANDY JONES

Amarillo, Texas -- James Randy Jones is known to acquaintances as "Big Bird."

Possibly he got the nickname after he flew the coop at the Potter County correctional facility in Amarillo in September, 1984.

More likely he received the appellation as a result of his size -- 6 foot-4, 220 pounds.

Now Texas law enforcement officials would like to clip Jones' wings. This week he has made the Texas Most Wanted list. A \$1,000 reward is being offered for information leading to the capture of Jones, who is wanted on federal warrants charging him with 15 counts of possession of forged and altered money orders as well as escape.

In addition to his imposing size, Jones has a number of highly identifiable tattoos on his body -- including tattoos of three teardrops under his left eye and more tattoos running from the wrists to the shoulders of both arms.

Jones, who was born September 26, 1957, uses a variety of aliases, including Jimmy J. Jones and

Larry Berry.

The blonde-haired, blue-eyed Mississippi native ran afoul of the federal government for his alleged propensity to alter money orders.

Investigators say Jones would purchase \$1.00 postal money orders, then alter them to read \$51.00 or more.

Jones was apprehended and then compounded his legal problems by escaping from the Potter County correctional facility on September 24, 1984.

He hasn't been seen since.

Anyone with information concerning Jones' whereabouts is asked to call Texas Crime Stoppers toll-free at 1-800-252-8477, or their local Crime Stoppers program. In all cases, callers may remain anonymous.

Texas Most Wanted is a cooperative program between the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council and the Department of Public Safety. It is designed to generate information on the location of persons wanted for major crimes committed in Texas.

Cash rewards are offered on a regular basis by the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council and the 127 local Crime Stoppers programs throughout the state for information leading to the arrests and grand jury indictments of major crime offenders and the capture of wanted felons.

As of April 22, 1985, the Department of Public Safety reported that James Randy Jones is wanted on the following warrants:

Federal Warrant #CR 284-0002; Possession of Forged and Altered Money Orders (15 counts); Amarillo, Texas.

#1047 - b; Escape; Issued by Potter County Sheriff's Office.

Members of the board of directors of the honored district are: Kenneth Cudd, chairman; Lewis Anderson, William E. Miller, Larry Don Smith and Phillip LaMaster, all of Perryton.

The Ochiltree SWCD which is a political subdivision of state government was established to assist farmers, ranchers, and local communities within the boundaries of the district solve soil, water and related resource conservation problems through local initiative and voluntary assistance programs.

Runner-up in the "Outstanding Conservation District" category is the Upper Colorado SWCD headquartered in Snyder. Members of the board of directors are: Charlie

To be eligible for this award the recipient must be a resident of the district and carry out his farming or ranching activities within the SWCD from which the entry was submitted. Gordon was nominated by the Roberts SWCD headquartered at Miami.

Runner-up in the "Resident Conservation Farmer" category is Roger Kitten of Slayton, Texas. He was sponsored by the Lubbock County SWCD headquartered at Lubbock, Texas.

Receiving the first place "Resident Conservation Rancher" award is Ricky Day of Meadow, Texas. To be eligible for the award the rancher must meet the same requirements as the resident conservation farmer. Day was nominated by the Terry SWCD headquartered in Brownfield.

An "Absentee Conservation Farmer/rancher" award will be presented to E. B. Clark, Jr. of Denver, Colorado for outstanding land management and conservation systems applied on his land. The award is presented to individuals who do not actually reside on their land or within the SWCD submitting the nominee nor who depend

fully upon their land for their livelihood. The Dallam SWCD headquartered in Dalhart sponsored Clark.

Two educational categories, an essay contest and poster contest, have enabled students to demonstrate creative artistic and writing skills relative to the conservation of soil, water and related resources.

In the essay contest individuals 18 years and under demonstrated research and writing skills on the subject "Soil and Water Conservation". First, second and third place winners in respective order are: Tonia Bible of Wayside; Jamie Thayer of Floydada and Joyce Schilling of Dimmitt.

Control brush

Native grass production on rangeland will be greatly reduced when the range is infested with brush. Controlling the brush will increase the amount of production in the pastures.

The brush, which is considered an invading species to most native grassland, presents a competition problem for the grass. The brush will use up a great deal of water and nutrients which could be available for the grasses. Also, the area occupied by the brush could be occupied by grass. Therefore, the control and management of the brush can be very beneficial to the rancher.

Controlling the brush can be accomplished in several ways. Mechanical, chemical, and with fire are three methods of control. It depends on the brush species to be controlled as to which method is most effective. Also, any combination of the three methods may be used. For example, some species, such as prickly pear, can be

effectively controlled by a prescribed burn during the late winter months then aerial sprayed after the burn.

The area should be deferred from grazing during the first growing season after treatment. This will allow the grass to improve while the brush will be set back. The deferral during the growing season will make the grass respond and the effect of the brush control will be noticed quicker.

Harvesting the grass and selling it in the form of beef is how many ranchers make a living. Helping the rangeland to produce more by controlling brush and grazing will pay off in the long run.
