Tractor School

A tractor school will be held in Spearman on May 25 with registration at 10:00 a.m. in the Home Demonstration Clubroom. This school is for the purpose of training 14 and 15 year olds in the safe operation of tractor.

Under the current U.S. Department of Labor provisions farmers must not hire youth under 16 years of age for hazardous occupations found farms which includes among many jobs driving a tractor, except under certain conditions. Some of these conditions that allow farmers to work youth under 16 years of age is as follows: the youth be at least 14 years of age, be familiar with the normal working hazards in agriculture, complete 10 hours training on the 4 tractor program, pass a written examination on tractor safety and demonstrate the ability to operate a tractor with a two-wheeled trailed implement to include backing.

Any youth age 14 or 15 who plans to or wants a job driving a tractor must complete this course and receive a certificate of successful completion. The only exception is where a youth under 16 is employed by his parent on a farm owned or operated by such parent or person.

If any farmers or youth have any questions, call the Extension Office, 659-2136. Youth wanting to take this course must be present at 10:00 a.m. Wednesday, May 25 at the Home Demonstration Clubroom in Spearman. The hours of the course will be from 10:00 a.m. till 5:00 p.m. May 25; 8:00 a.m. till 5:00 p.m. May 26. Youth must attend all sessions to be certified as having completed the course. The course will be under the supervision of the Hansford County Extension Agent, Jim Kuykendall, local implement dealers will assist in some phases of the program.

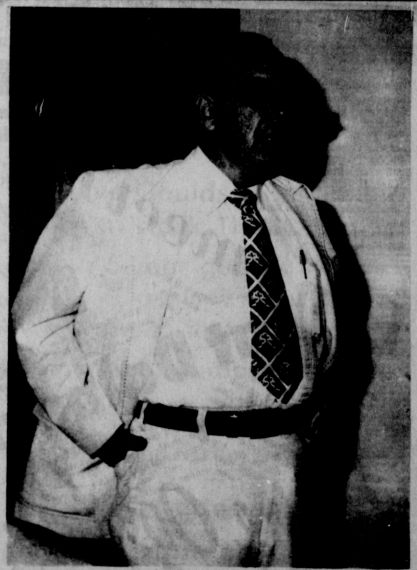

The Spearman Chamber of Commerce hosted a meeting of local businessmen, Wednesday, at Martin's Steak Garden. The purpose of the meeting was to generate interest in new business and industrial development in our community.

The guest speaker was Mr. Smith is on the industrial development committee in Borger, and mentioned some guide lines a city needs to use to promote business development in a community. Community attitude was the point he stressed most emphatically. Community attitude and community appearance are very important factors to consider when

trying to bring in new business. Mr. Smith stated that research and analysis were vital to future planning, and that local industrial financing was something that new people would be concerned with.

Building availability would be another thing that prospective businesses would be interested in. All vacant buildings and space need to be catalogued, so that when someone is interested in locating here they can call the Chamber of Commerce and easily learn what is and what is not available. When a city is prospecting for new businesses, Mr. Smith, said that the best

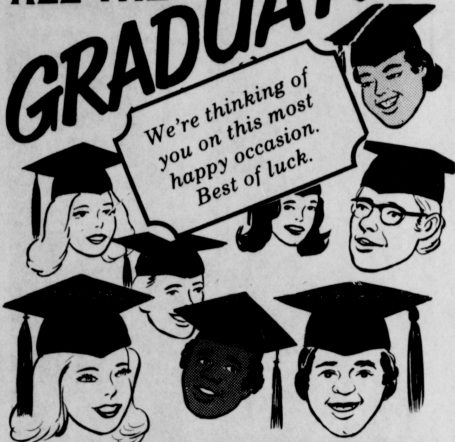
place to start is at home. Home-town people already have a working knowledge of the community and should be the first to be contacted.

New businesses would want to know what the community has to offer in the way of facilities for meetings and other activities. 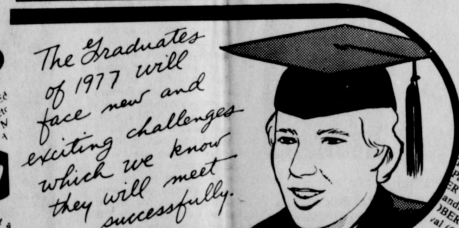

exceeded this rate of inflation is a measure of the gains that were made since then. In Hansford County, personal income rose a record level, as indicated by the market research reports covering the period. For the average local household, it went from \$5,836 in 1960 to \$15,557 at the beginning of last year. The rise was about 167 percent.

Elsewhere in the United States, it rose 130 percent and, in the State of Texas, 138 percent.

In part, the better incomes reflect the fact that wages and salaries moved upward in tandem, more or less, with living costs.

Also contributing to the rise was the massive movement of married women out of the home and into the job market. The extra paychecks enabled many families to upgrade their standard of living.

The added purchasing power showed up in the amount spent in Hansford County's retail stores. It rose from a total of \$9,679, 000, in 1960, to the \$13,491, 000 figure reported last year. According to a study by the Conference Board, the average American family has more real spendable income at its disposal today, after providing for the necessities, than it did in 1960.

As a result, its outlays for TV sets, cars, sporting goods, toys and appliances, adjusted for price changes, are up sharply since then.

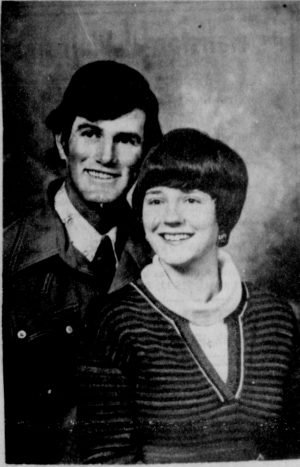

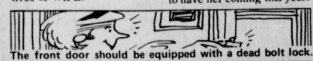

LIVESTOCK ASSESSMENT

While there is often a question as to the fairness, tax laws in the State of Texas are very definite as they pertain to livestock. Thus, we have no alternative but to adhere to the laws as they now exist.

Livestock is assessed for tax purposes according to its location on January 1st, regardless of the owners residence. All livestock in Hansford County on January 1st then must be rendered by the owners or those in charge or possession. Taxes will be due the following Fall and payment should be made to this office.

PERSONAL PROPERTY IN THE CHARGE OR POSSESSION OF SOMEONE OTHER THAN THE OWNER SHALL BE ASSESSED TO THE PERSON HAVING IT IN CHARGE OR POSSESSION. (Arts. 7160, 7152.) Therefore, if you have cattle on your property or if you are looking after someone's cattle you are responsible to this office for the owner's name and address and the number of cattle. And if ownership is not confirmed, then these may be charged to you.

Since by law, the rendering of property is the responsibility of the owner, it is hoped that livestock will be properly rendered to the Hansford County Tax Office by all owners. A 100% count is expected.

WHENEVER THE TAXPAYER REFUSES TO MAKE RENDITION OR TO SUBSCRIBE TO THE OATH, THE ASSESSOR SHALL PROCEED TO ASSESS THE PROPERTY OF SUCH TAXPAYER, AND THE ASSESSMENT SO MADE SHALL BE AS LEGAL AND BINDING AS IF RENDERED BY THE TAXPAYER. (Art. 7193.)

An intense effort has been made by the Hansford County Tax Office Personnel this year, to count the livestock on every section of Hansford County. Naturally there will be human errors, so the correct rendering of livestock by the owners, will greatly reduce this occurrence.

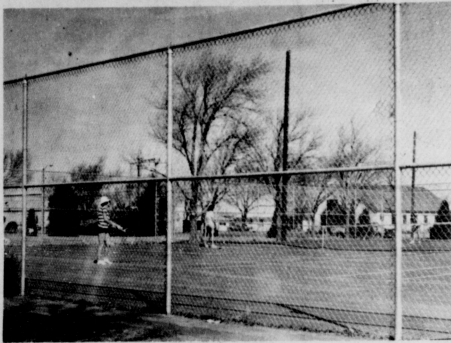

Two County Accidents Investigated

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for April, 1977 shows a total of 462 accidents resulting in 10 persons killed and 273 persons injured, as compared to April, 1976, with 510 accidents resulting in 10 persons killed and 318 persons injured. This was 48 less accidents, seven more killed, and 45 less injured in 1977 at the same period of time.

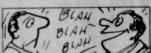

USDA Sets Dates For Referendum Loans

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has announced June 6 as the beginning of a two-week registration period for the Beef Research and Information Order referendum and issued rules for the referendum.

Anyone who is a cattle producer during 1976 can register to vote, either in person or by mail, at local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) offices between June 6 and June 17.

A list of those who register will be posted daily at ASCS offices and a final listing will be posted five days after registration closes.

Those registered can vote between July 5 and July 15 at their ASCS office. For approval of the Beef Research and Information Order, at least 50 percent of those registered must vote, and two-thirds of them must favor it.

The Order that producers will consider in the upcoming referendum would authorize a research and information program administered by a Beef Board of up to 68 producers. Board members would be appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture from nominations submitted by

Each state or geographic area would be represented in proportion to its cattle production.

The Beef Board could initiate a broad spectrum of projects to improve beef production, distribution, and marketing. Such a program could include consumer education and information, and research.

During the first three years of operation, the Board could collect assessments of up to three-tenths of one percent of the value of all cattle sold. After that, the rate of assessment could be changed but could not exceed five-tenths of one percent—maximum amount permitted under the Beef Research and Information Act. Producers not wishing to participate in the program could have their assessment refunded.

The rules for conducting the referendum are scheduled to be published in the May 17 Federal Register. Copies will be available from Program Operation Division, ASCS, U.S. Department of Agriculture, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 20013.

Emergency loan funds are available from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) county office in Perryton, Texas, J. Lynn Futch, FmHA State Director announced today.

The request for emergency assistance from the Farmers Home Administration came as a result of losses sustained by local farmers hit by the drought. The drought has affected a large number of farms, and those stricken have suffered severe losses.

Farmers in Hansford County can apply for assistance at the FmHA county office at 408 Amberst, Perryton, until September 30, 1977. To be eligible for a loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster and be unable to get credit from other sources.

Loans covering actual losses are made at an interest rate of five percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability. Loans beyond actual losses can be repaid in various periods, depending upon the purpose of the loan. The interest rate for short-term loans for farm operating purposes is eight percent. Long-term loans are being made at an interest rate of eight percent also.
