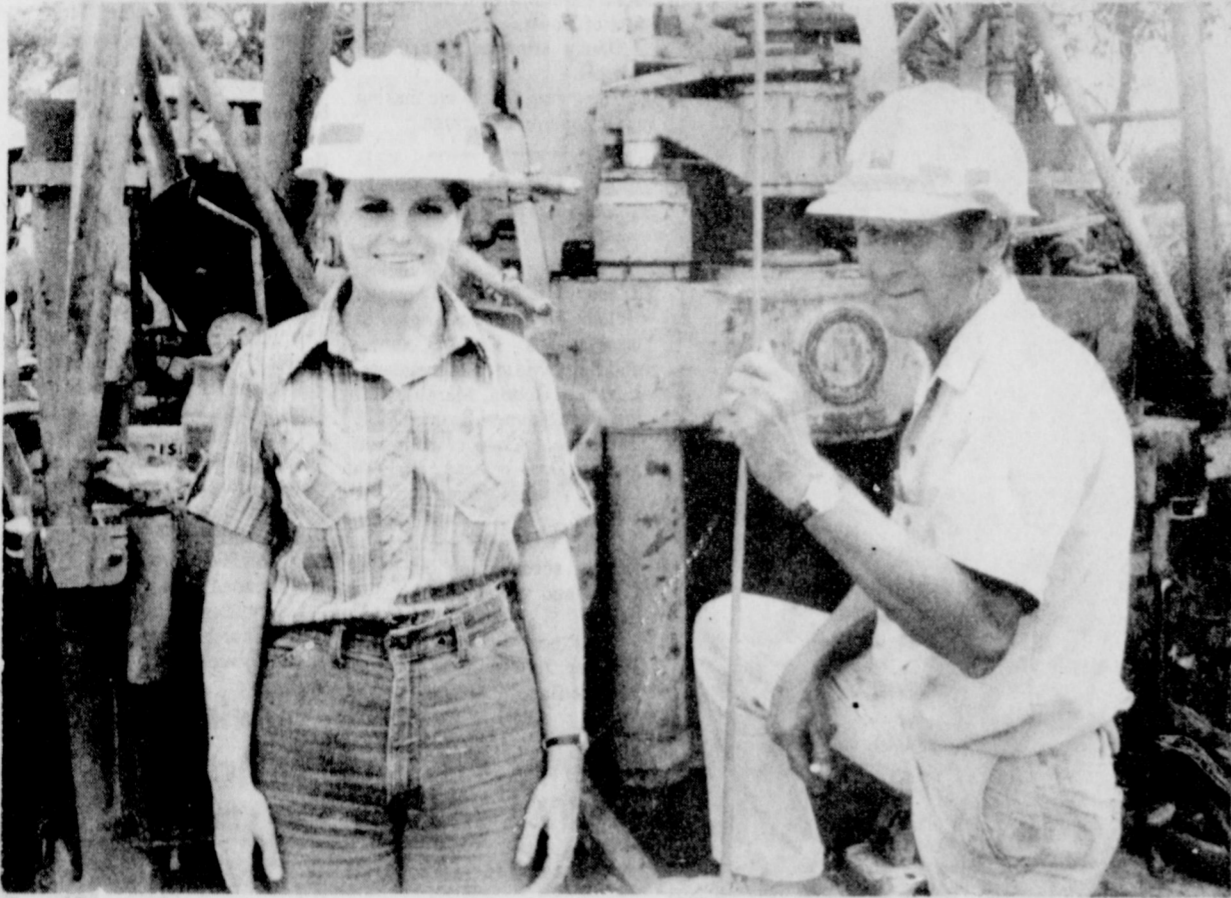

Reports coming in from the Palo Duro Dam site, North of Spearman are all very good this week! The core drilling has been finished, and there are three different heights of the dam being considered. In other words, the size of the lake will be determined by how high the dam will be when it is finished. At present the local Palo Duro group is looking at one of the largest lakes in the area, possibly as large as Lake Meredith. If this one is adopted, the water will be over 100 ft. deep at the dam!

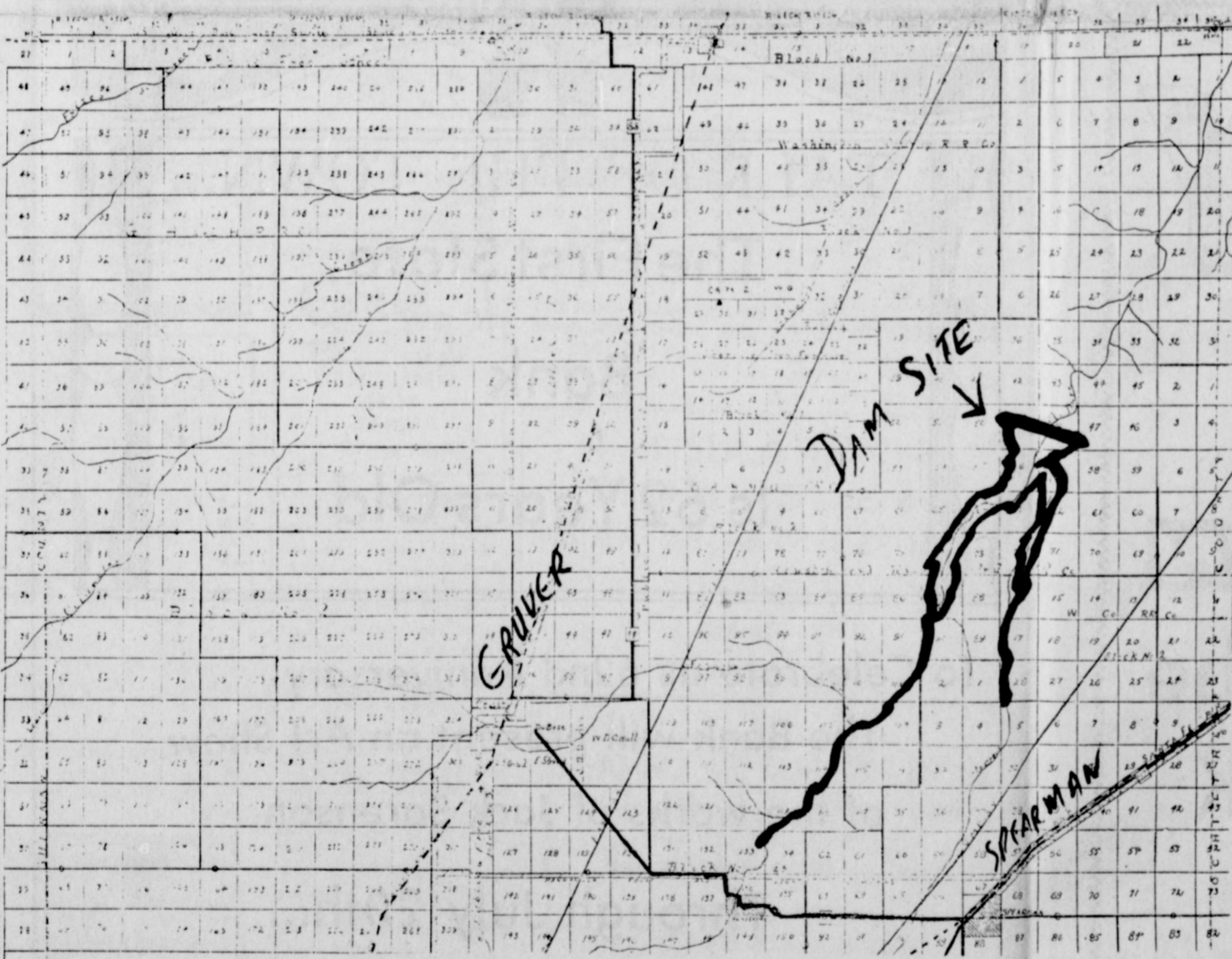

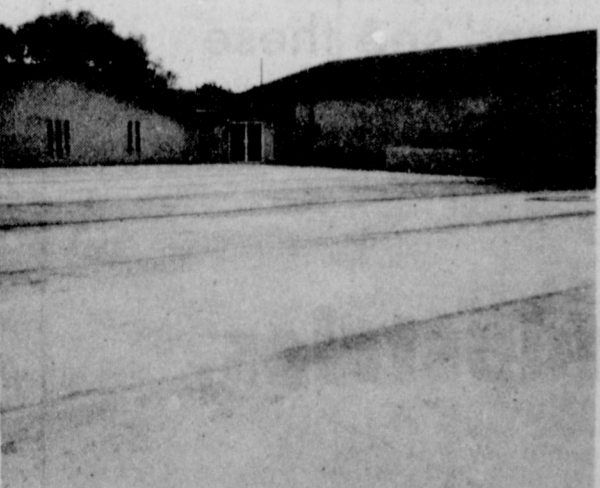

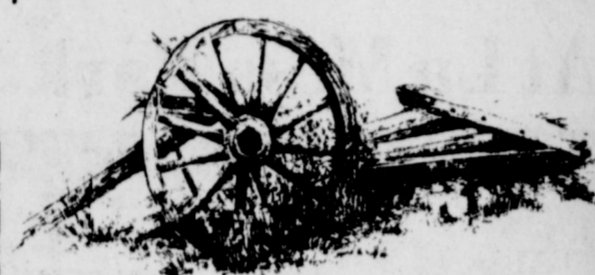
**Blackburn Chairman of

Producers who signed up for the program will soon be receiving their money back which they put down on deposit.

WHEAT HARVEST

The wheat harvest in Hansford County is nearing completion. Record yields have been reported by many farmers in the county. I have had reports from farmers of irrigated fields averaging from 60 bushels to 84 bushels per acre and dryland averaging from 40 to 54.

The price of wheat has been erratic the past couple of weeks but hopefully due to Russia's bad wheat crop, as being reported, the price will stay up

CORN AND MILO

Corn and milo crops in the county look to be doing extremely well. I have had no reports yet of any insects attacking corn or milo and doing any damage. One field of milo observed has had some problem, however, with herbicide or nitrogen carry over.

Producers should be on the watch for insects in their milo or corn. There are several insects which will reproduce rapidly and do severe damage practically overnight if not found quickly or left untreated. Producers having questions concerning corn or milo pest and their control can contact the County Extension office at 659-2136 or 733-2901.

BEWARE OF BABY BOUNCERS

The Food and Drug Administration has come out with a warning to parents about devices known as "walker-jumpers." Investigating the safety of some of these "baby bouncer" models, the FDA says danger potentials include:

- Holes around the hinged areas of reclining models, through which a baby may insert a finger, then bruise or crush it by bouncing on the equipment.
- X-shaped pivot areas, such as cross-bars, where the scissors force might be exerted on the infant's finger.

- Heavy coil springs without guards which, when stretched, could allow room for the baby to insert one or more fingers.

- Instability, so that the entire device may tip over when the baby bounces or is otherwise active on it.

- Absence of a locking device to prevent the walker-jumper from collapsing or folding up while the baby is in it.

Farmers Must File Priority Request For Natural Gas

Martin L. Chandler, County Executive Director of the Hansford County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee, today reminded farmers, food processors, food distributors and other agricultural concerns desiring protection against natural gas curtailments to file a written priority request with their supplier no later than July 15, 1979. The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC), originally designated June 15 as the last day for this requirement but extended it by one month.

"Users of interstate natural gas have been certified by the Secretary of Agriculture to be protected up to the full requirement against curtailment", Chandler said.

The request should include: Name and Address

- Intended end user and volumes of natural gas needed
 - Natural gas purchases for most recent 12 months for which records are available
 - Documentation to support calculation of needs
 - Standard industrial classification (SIC) code numbers such as 01 for crops and 02 for livestock, and
 - Signature swearing or affirming to accuracy of the request.
- Suggested that local natural gas suppliers be contacted concerning procedures for obtaining agricultural priority. "If additional assistance is needed, our state and county offices will soon have information regarding eligible 'Essential Agricultural Uses' as well as a suggested format for filing", the ASCS Official said.

16mm Films Available At Library

What is the "reel lowdown" on how to obtain 16mm films in this area of the world? Well, you could buy them. You could rent them. Or...you could borrow them through your own local public library. More than one thousand films are available to users of the Hansford County Library. The films are housed in the Amarillo Public Library and sent to public libraries in the Panhandle as a service of the Texas Panhandle Library System. The service is free of any charge to library users except for the return postage back to Amarillo. How can you best make use of this service?

Suppose you are charged with arranging a program and you want to show a film. First of all, begin planning early. Over 250 films a month are borrowed by persons outside Amarillo alone, so the chances that you'll be able to get the film(s) you want are higher the earlier you put in your request.

Talk with the librarian and explain what you'd like to do. She will be able to tell you if you are eligible to borrow films and what the library's rules are. One major rule is that you will not be eligible to borrow these films if you are going to charge admission to see them. You must also provide an experienced operator to run the projector.

The Hansford County Library has a copy of the Amarillo Public Library's film catalog. Browse through it and note down the film(s) you'd like to receive. It's a good idea to choose a couple of alternates in case your first choice isn't available on the date your program is planned.

The librarian will contact the Amarillo library and make the request for you. In about a week, the library will let you know what film has been reserved and when you can pick it up. After you've shown the film, return it to the library promptly, pay the return postage costs, and the librarian will send it back to Amarillo.

Remember that this service is available only through your local library. If you go to Amarillo and try to borrow films, you will have to pay a \$3.00 per film non-resident fee. This film program is only one of the many services that the Hansford County Library, as a member of the Texas Panhandle Library System, provides people in your community. Libraries are a lot more than they used to be...if you don't believe it, just go to the library and check it out!

Farmer-Owned Reserve Wheat To Continue In Release Status

WASHINGTON July 2--Wheat in the farmer-owned reserve will continue in release status at least through July 31, John Goodwin, acting executive vice president of the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC), announced today.

Storage earnings stopped in all states effective June 30. Wheat was first released on May 16 when the national average market price reached \$3.31 per bushel. The price level at which wheat is released is 140 percent of the national loan rate, or \$3.29 per bushel.

It was announced at that time that on June 29 the department would review the average price for wheat, to determine if the release should remain in effect. The June 28 national average market price was \$4.05 per bushel.

On July 31 the department will again review the average market price to determine if the release will continue.

After release of a commodity, it may be sold by the farmer holding it after repaying his CCC price support loan. How-

ever, release of the reserve does not require farmers to redeem or sell their grain at this time.

Cable Tower Work To Begin

Ronnie Antalek, manager of the Spearman Cable TV, said a crew will be here next Monday or Tuesday to begin construction of a new tower for the company. He estimates that it will take approximately 3 weeks until the cable service is back up to full service. Estimated cost for replacing

the tower that was destroyed Tuesday afternoon is \$40,000.
