## Rotate Grazing Pasture

Rotating livestock through two or more pastures in a planned sequence can be very beneficial to the cattle in a planned order and resting the pastures from grazing will allow the plants which were grazed to grow back before being grazed off again. Alllowing the grass to grow back will help make a vigorous stand of forage. Continuously grazing the grass without giving it a chance to grow and produce food for itself will make it less hardy in drought years and
freeze out easier during cold winters. Therefore, a planned grazing system will allow livestock to graze the grasses prope without damaging them.
Grazing in one pasture, then moving to another pasture is very similar to how the buffalo grazed this country years ago. Moving onto fresh ungrazed grass is very
beneficial to the cattle as well as beneficial to he cattue as well as
the grass being rested. Also, with planned grazing system and a planned grazing system and
good management it is possible that a ranch will feed more cattle, provided the initial stocking rate is within reason. The cattle usually will graze the less desirable grassos as well as the more desirable nore uniformly A planned sy A planned system should be rested, but not during pasture is rested, but not during the same example, if a pasture is rested during the spring one year, then it during the spring one year, then it
should be rested during the summer, fall, or winter the next rest period. This allows for a more complete balance of forage. Also, if a pasture was grazed during the growing season every year continuously, then it is possible that the most desirable grasses would b razed out grazing system are: a planne grazing system are: maintaining
plant cover to prevent soil erosion while properly using the forage in all pastures; improve efficiency of grazing by uniformly using all parts of each pasture; increased number of livestock, provided initial stocking rate is reasonable:
