B and B Grain Cancels Grain Storage Agreement

B & B Grain Co. Inc., has cancelled its Commodity Credit Corporation Uniform Grain Storage Agreement, it was announced this week by B & B president C. Ralph Blodgett and the Hansford County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office.

The cancellation of this agreement means that any grains put into storage in B & B will not be eligible for price support, according to the ASCS

In an advertisement in this

issue of the Plainsman, Blodgett stated that his firm would see that no person putting grain in his elevator loses a penny because the elevator does not have the storage agreement.

Blodgett said the prices of wheat and milo are high enough that no grain should have to be put in federal storage.

Blodgett cancelled his agreement because he was "fed up" with the government trying to run his business. He said there were things under the agree-(Con't. on back page)

State draft calls, on the rise since August, when 552 men were requested, were much lower earlier in the year. The state quotas in July and June were 349 and 187, respective-

ector, said recently.

The state quota of 868 for November is the Texas share of a national call for 17,000 men, all for the Army.

More than 3,000 men over the state will be called up for pre-induction physical and mental examinations in November, also, the state director of Selective Service said.

Local board quotas for the November call already have been figured and sent to the state's 137 local boards.

The November quota will be filled mostly with men who are volunteers under 26 years old and nonvolunteers ages 19

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
