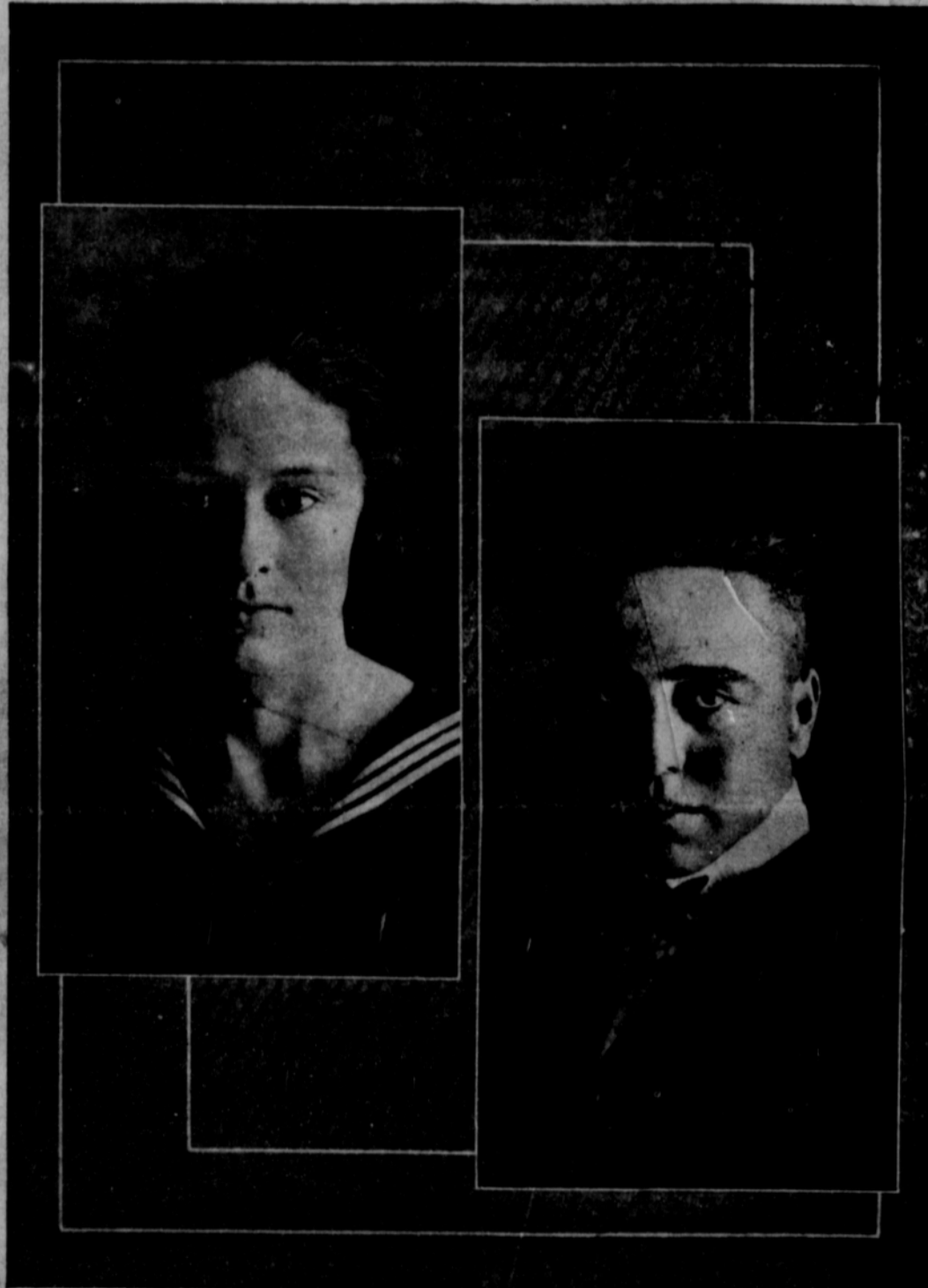

Stratford Elks Favored In Spearman Homecoming Game

A tough, hardhitting herd of Stratford Elks invade Spearman Friday night intent on spoiling the Spearman Lynx homecoming.

Spearman will crown a homecoming queen and pep squad hero in ceremonies before the game, then tackle the job of battling the Elks.

Stratford has taken on the favored spot in district 1-A running with some victories over some strong opponents.

Recently the hardnosed Elks whipped a tough Lefors team. The Elks turned the tables on the rough and tumble Pirates and sent several of them out of the game with injuries.

Stratford's largest man is all district center, Dennis Plunk at 185. The other big boy is tackle Harry Hamilton at 180.

Spearman scouts report that Plunk is a real strong man in the offensive line and on defense.

Two backs have been leading the Elk scoring attack. Halfback Terry Matthews, 155, and quarterback Charles Plunk, 150, have been the offensive standouts in the backfield.

Spearman had an open date Friday, but still have one man on the sick list, Don Archer, who has been moved to an offensive guard and defensive cornerman, has been sick two weeks. Tuesday afternoon Coach Seymour learned that Archer has a severely infected throat and will probably be out Friday night.

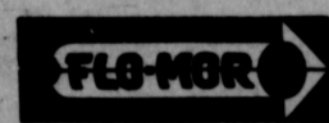

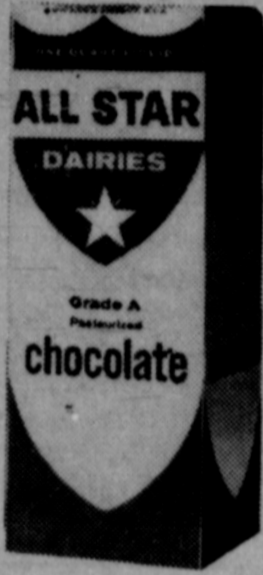

Draft Quota Up for November

The state draft quota for November calls for 868 men, compared to 847 for October, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said recently.

State draft calls, on the rise since August, when 552 men were requested, were much lower earlier in the year. The state quotas in July and June were 349 and 187, respectively.

The state quota of 868 for November is the Texas share of a national call for 17,000 men, all for the Army.

More than 3,000 men over the state will be called up for pre-induction physical and mental examinations in November, also, the state director of Selective Service said.

Local board quotas for the November call already have been figured and sent to the state's 137 local boards.

The November quota will be filled mostly with men who are volunteers under 26 years old and nonvolunteers ages 19

through 25. Most be 22 and 23 years

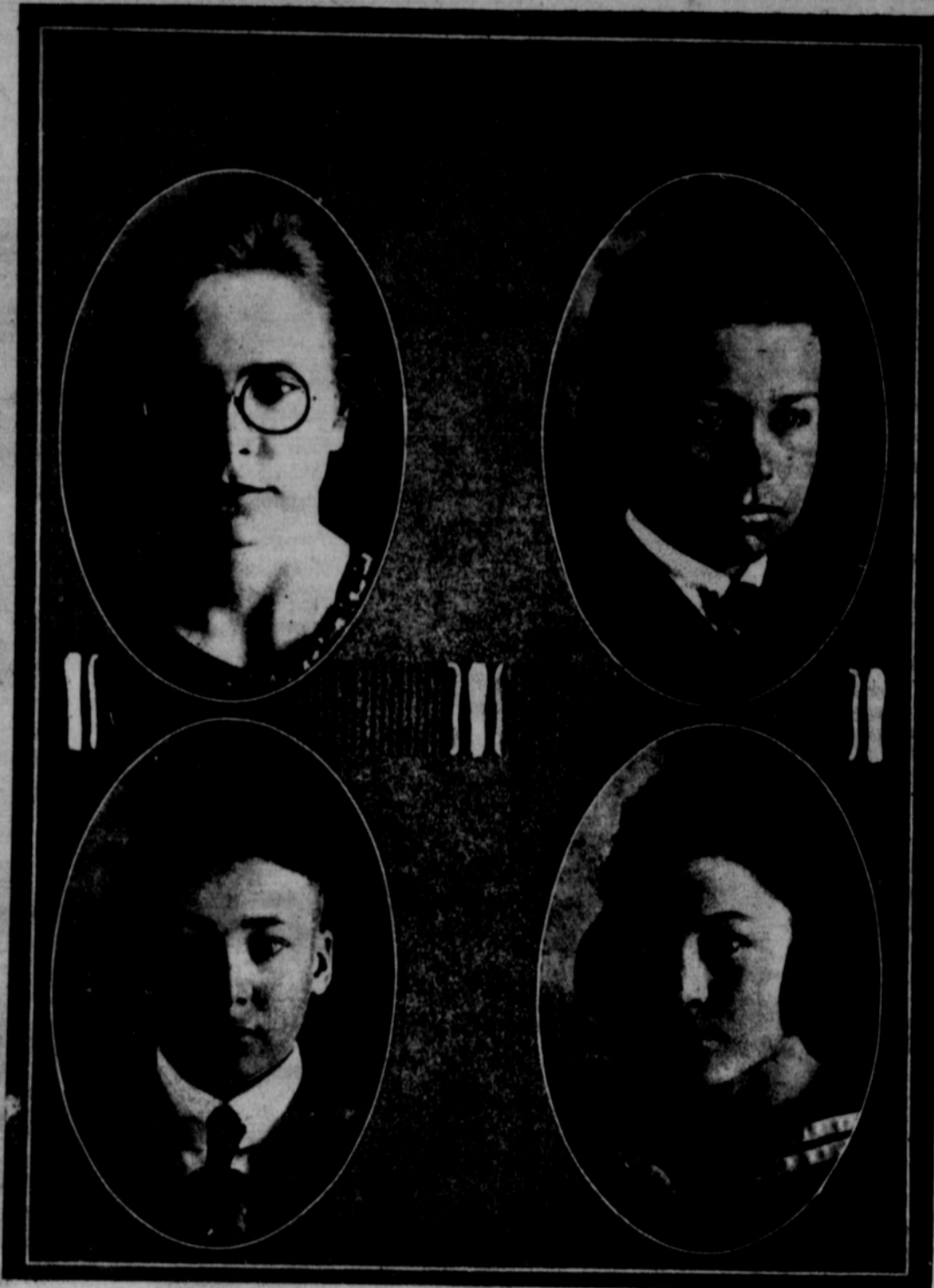
