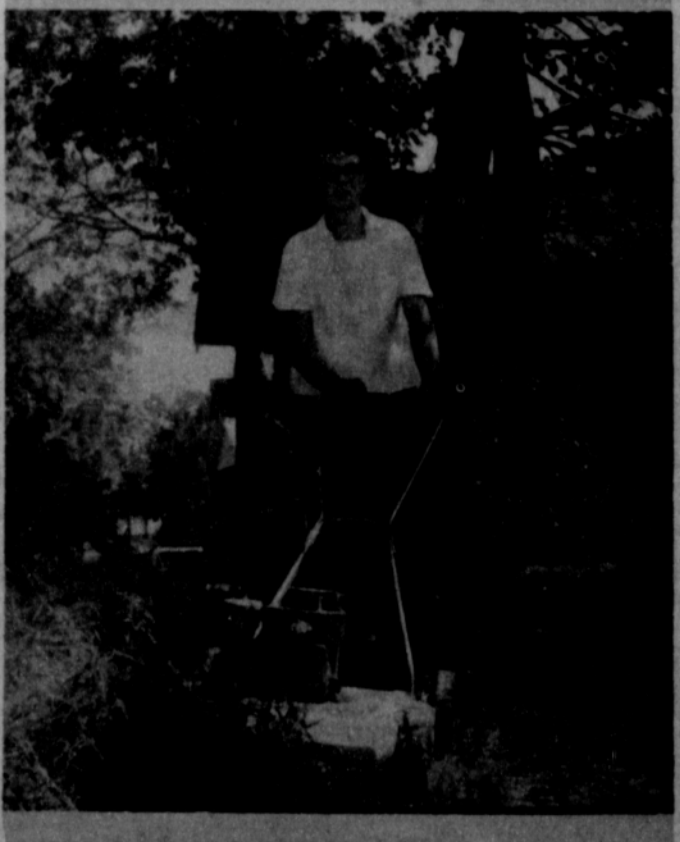

Coaching School Will Set New Record

Rita Johnson Joins Staff

Texas was humiliated when Alaska came into the union and started talking about being bigger—and proving it.

But the Lone Star State recovered well. While it doesn't have as much territory it still is the largest in just about everything else.

This goes for coaching. The Texas coaching school is the largest in the world with little prospect of anybody, including Alaska, taking over the title. It's too cold in Alaska and besides the ice leaves too little room for gridirons.

Last year at Fort Worth enrollment of the Texas coaching school went over 4,000. That should have been the very most. But hold everything folks. This year at Dallas is going to better even that.

L. W. McConachie, executive vice-president of the Texas High School Coaches Association, already finds an increase of about 50 in the advance registration for the big clinic at Dallas Aug. 1-5. And the school is more than two months away.

McConachie predicts that there will be more than 4200 at Dallas. He has all kinds of logic behind the forecast since there

now are 4,489 members of the Texas High School Coaches Association. That's the all-time high.

All of the major sports—football, basketball, baseball, and track—will have their innings. Also athletic training will be discussed as usual.

They are even adding a discourse on the question of adding weight to an athlete. Dr. Dean Miller, who works with the astronauts in the National Space Agency, is coming from San Jose State College to give these lectures.

There will be all-star football and basketball games but things haven't been worked out yet for

baseball. Baseball ends later than other sports and the boys are out of school and working at jobs that would keep them away from the coaching school. But maybe this can be overcome, too.

They have even discussed having a track meet but doubt that it ever could be handled because of the large number of boys necessary and the intense heat.

Hayden Fry of Southern Methodist and Gene Stallings of Texas A&M will lecture on football.

Don Haskins of Texas Western and Ralph Tasker of Hobbs, N. M., High School will talk about basketball.

Abe Barnett and Dolph Regelsky of the Dallas public schools will handle baseball.

Vern Wolfe, track coach of Southern California, was to have lectured on his sport but got a North and Bobby Roberts of San trip to Rumania from the State Department and had to pass up the Texas coaching school.

A substitute was to be named with Charlie Thomas of Texas A&M most likely. Charlie would bring his star weightman, world-

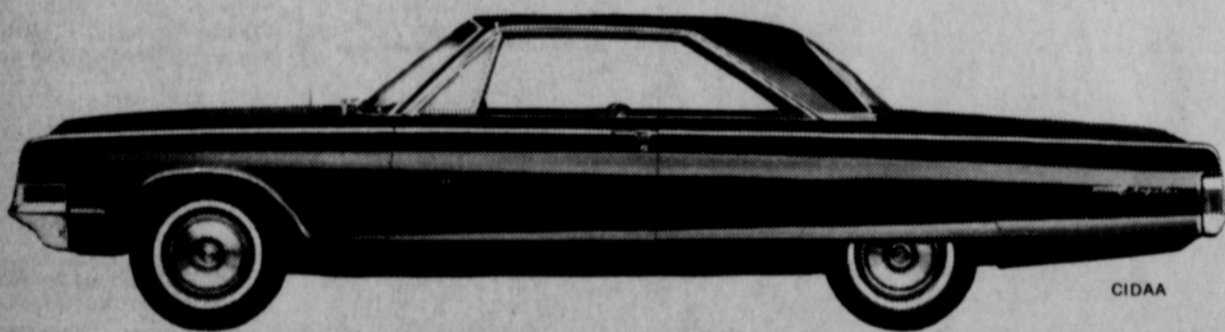

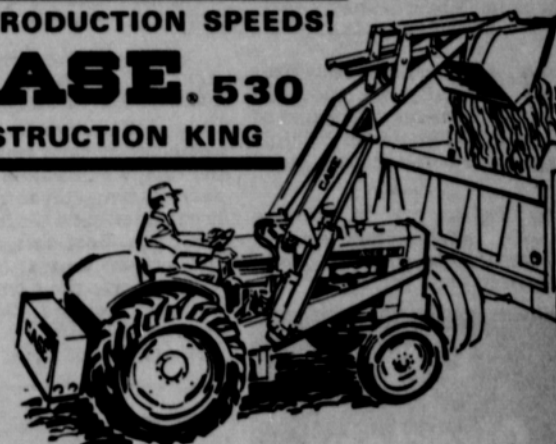

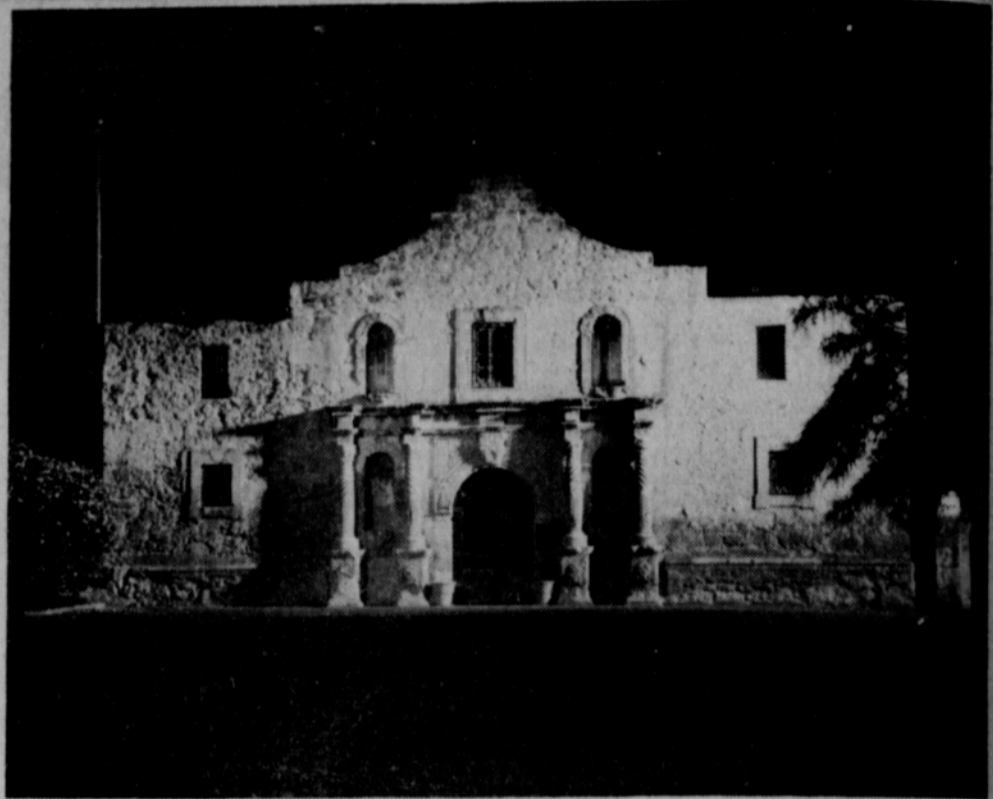

Cool Air Can Dry Skin On Some People

Are those of us who live and work in an air conditioned environment more likely to have dry skin and premature wrinkles?

And what exactly do we mean by air conditioned?

The late Dr. Willis Carrier, who first laid down the engineering principles of air conditioning in 1911, gave this definition, says Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association:

"Air conditioning is the control of the humidity of air by either increasing or decreasing its moisture content. Added to the control of humidity is the control of temperature by either heating or cooling the air, the purification of the air by washing or filtering, and the control of air motion and ventilation."

Air conditioning in large office and public buildings usually performs all of these functions on a year-round basis. However, the conditioning in many homes and apartment buildings is limited to cooling, purifying and reducing humidity. Thus, the environment may be air conditioned only during certain periods such as the summer. Therefore, few persons live in a constantly air conditioned environment.

A drop in humidity exerts a drying effect on the skin. It has been shown that constant exposure to air conditioning produces excessively dry skin in a few individuals, particularly if they are near the draft of the air outlets.

People who tend to develop excessively dry skin from air conditioning usually have a history of dermatitis, or skin inflammation. These persons also tend to wash frequently, and some of their skin problems can be prevented if they avoid over-washing.

Wheat Prospects Up Over A Million Bushels

Texas wheat production as of May 1 was estimated at almost 63 million bushels by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. This is a million bushel increase over last year.

Santa Fe Railway Agriculture reports the crop from south central Nebraska down through central Kansas, most of Oklahoma and into the black land and crosstimer sections of Texas is excellent.

East of this section Santa Fe says the crop suffered heavily from winter kill and poor stands make the prospects poor.

Crop prospects in the Texas Panhandle, New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle, eastern Colorado and western Kansas hinge mostly on irrigated production.

In the 12 Santa Fe served states 1965 production is estimated at 586,993,000 bushels. This is below the 604,727,000 bushels harvested last year.

Production is expected to be up in Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico and California. It is down in Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska, Louisiana, Colorado and Arizona.

Colorado prospects are only 11 million bushels as compared to 27 million last year.

Texas production is expected to be 62,760,000 bushels as compared to 61,848,000 last year.

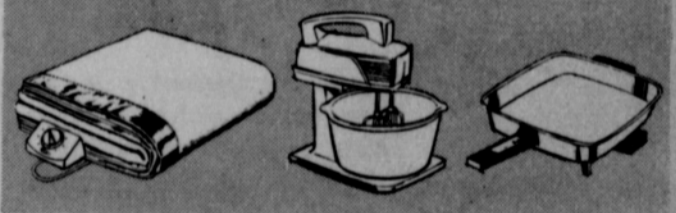

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Gathering System Being Constructed by Baca Gas

73 Students In School

Construction started today of a pipeline gathering and transportation system to offer an outlet for shut-in gas in southeastern Colorado. The pipeline is being constructed by Baca Gas Gathering System, Inc., subsidiary of Horizon Oil and Gas Co., Dallas and Spearman, Texas, of Dallas and Spearman, Texas.

Principals in Horizon are Ed and Bruce Calder. Initially 34 gas wells will be connected. The line will also be casinghead gas from Flank field.

Many wells in this area have been closed in for lack of market over four years. Initially wells in Midway and Flank fields will receive connections as well as a few wells in the Colorado portion of Greenwood field. Extensions of the pipeline projected for 1966 will connect numerous shut-in wells in Playa and Flank fields further to the west. Purchaser of gas from Baca Gas Gathering System is Panhandle Eastern Pipe Line Co. The gas will be delivered to the Panhandle at the tail gate of Anadarko Production Company's gasoline plant in Interstate field in Morriston, Kan.
